A Fortune From Broomcorn.
Harry Wood, the broom-corn king, was in from his ranch at Wheelless Wednesday and says his broom-corn is turning out very well and that he has forty men now pulling it. He has about 700 acres on his farm there 100 acres east of Boise City and 500 acres in Beaver county and reports that he will make over 200 tons this year and has been offered \$200 per ton for it. Say, that is \$40,000. He says that he expects to realize \$50,000 or better out of it or will hold it and ship it. He is a three judge of broom-corn and knows the market about as well as the buyers and will just about get its value or start a factory of his own. He says his crop has not been very expensive to raise and that his clear profit will be enough that he will have to pay income tax on it. His crop in this country will clear him around \$20,000 this year and on land that he bought three years ago for \$5 per acre. He bought three sections here for about \$10,000 and will more than make enough on 700 acres of it this year to pay for it twice. No, he doesn't think he overpaid for the land and would buy more if he could get it. He means to double his crop another year and thinks the price will be good again. He is already famous as a broom-corn raiser and will also make the country famous if he keeps going. Boise City (Okla.) News.

State Poultry Meeting Here.

Amarillo has secured the state meet of the Texas Poultry Breeders Association which in reality is the State Branch of the American Poultry Association. Now this is the biggest thing that a poultry club can land, and should mean a great deal to the association that is honored with the meet.

Here are some of the things that we want to do. We are going to give a free show, that is throw the doors open to the public so as to give the exhibitors as much advertising as possible. We want everybody to see the show this year. The breeders will be requested to bring breeding birds as well as their fine show birds, so they will have something to sell the breeders in this part of the country. So if you want a Rhode Island Red Barred Rock, Orpington or any other kind of a Male for the next breeding season that will be the time to get it. It is much more satisfactory to the buyer as well as the seller, if he can see just what he is buying. When you have to send to a distant breeder you have to take whatever he gives you.

Some of the features of our premium list are: Potter County Commissioners have put up a premium list so as to insure the home exhibitors of securing enough premium money to pay all or part of his expenses although the big down state breeder does come and win the best premiums. The home man has the advantage in this way, he has the same chance to all the premiums as the visitor, and then he still gets his premiums if the visitor wins the regular premiums over him. Another big feature will be the egg laying contest. You can enter your pen of thorough bred birds they don't have to be show birds, and stand as good a chance as any one to get the big prizes offered in this department. We would like to see the boys and girls particularly interested in this egg laying contest. You enter five females to the pen, and as many pens as you want to, the birds in each pen must be of the same variety but not necessarily the same age. It would be a good idea to per the birds up at least a week before the show, so as to have them used to the coop and ready for business when the show opens, which is December 4th and closes December 8th.

It is desired to have every one that is interested in the raising of poultry to get one of the catalogues and premium list.

Holsteins as Dairy Cows.
Henry Einkle, formerly of near Camp, but now Farm Demonstrator of Major county, Oklahoma returned to Texas county for a short visit Friday, and returned home Saturday. Before returning, he visited the home of J. H. Deakin, south of Guymon, to whom Mr. Einkle had sold his herd of registered holsteins, before leaving Texas county. Mr. Deakin expressed himself, well satisfied with his purchase of the holsteins, and stated he would not take \$1000 profit on his investment. He is just completing one of the most complete cow farms in the county. Mr. Deakin has a winning combination in milk cows and hogs, and makes a practice of selling \$2,000 worth of hogs a year from his skim milk. His Holsteins produce milk in almost unlimited quantities, as he has one cow that has tested nine gallons of milk a day by weight. He has many other high producing cows, and his herd is perhaps the largest herd of registered milk cows in the country, and will do much in advancing Texas county to the front rank in the dairy line. Mr. Deakin has two pit silos, and will add two more to his equipment. His farm has every indication of being a success, and has as its basis the cream check, which has saved many a home in the country from bankruptcy.—Guymon (Okla.) Democrat.

WILL DEMOCRACY FAIL?

We are fighting a race of people given to efficiency and organization, disciplined for fifty years in development and preparation for an hour of world domination. If our individual liberty and action, cannot be coordinated in such a manner that we may defend ourselves, our independence will surely not survive for another 25 years.

The Germans have not only estimated our disintegration, but they have calculated upon us as a people incapable of organization. They have put 10,000,000 into the field from a population of 65,000,000 and they have supplied them with food supplies from an area not much larger than the state of Texas, and they have maintained their civil population in health and devotion during the same time. They have been able to do this by their willingness to discipline on the one side and their imposition of authority by the rigor of law on the other. Every German farmer today plants exactly the seed and exactly the field in which he is directed. On harvest, at the instructed moment, he hands over his products at prices fixed for him and receives back his foodstuffs on tickets which are allowed him from day to day.

organization. It is against every instinct of our people and it is opposed to the instinct of democracy. To adopt it would be to yield ourselves to autocracy within our borders. There is another solution. There is a solution. Democracy can voluntarily organize itself from the bottom up; that by inspiration as to the problems with which it is confronted, and as to the methods by which they may be solved by self-imposed discipline, by self-elected leadership and organization, it can find solution and defend itself. 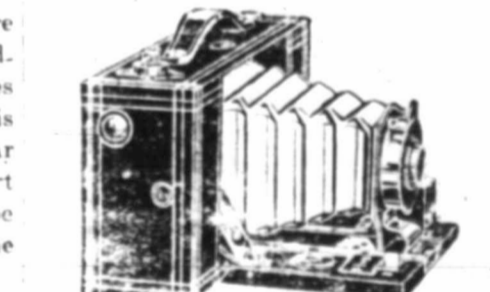

H. C. Jackson Dead.

The funeral services were held on Saturday afternoon at two o'clock at the family home, conducted by Rev. L. F. Fronabarger.

Mr. Jackson was born in Polk County, Arkansas on April 14, 1854. He came to Canyon from Hood County about a year ago to make Canyon his home. He was a member of the Christian Church.

Those surviving him are his wife, seven children, all but two of whom are married, and his only brother, Irl Jackson, who lives in this city.

The body was laid to rest in the Dreamland cemetery.

Postage Rates Raised.

Cost of Growing Heifers.
 "What does it cost to raise a heifer-calf to the age when she commences to produce—two years?" is a question frequently asked. We admit that some farmers grow them pretty cheaply, but dairy heifers grown in the open lot on grass and straw alone are handicapped during their entire lives. The Massachusetts Experiment Station finds that it costs them \$74.24 to grow a two-year-old heifer, while the Connecticut Station did it for an average of \$66. The Wisconsin Station fed three different lots, using different feeding methods for each, and the average costs for the three lots were \$58.47, \$61.06 and \$64.74 per head. The farmer who grows a good dairy heifer for \$65 is dollars ahead of the man who has to buy them for his herd—and he knows what he is raising.

The state board of education at a called session, at which all members were present, fixed the state per capita apportionment for the year 1917-1918 at \$7.50 per pupil, an increase of 50 cents over last year's apportionment, says an Austin dispatch. The apportionment was made on the basis of 1,274,918 children of scholastic age, 7 to 17 years, inclusive. The total appropriation for the year is \$9,561,885.

A single gallon of gasoline will do wonders almost anywhere, but no where it has been applied to better purpose than on the farm. It will milk 300 cows, bale four tons of hay, mix 35 yards of cement, move a hay truck 14 miles, plow three-fifths of an acre of land and make enough electricity to keep eight lights going in a farm house 30 hours.

Approximately 6000 acres of rich valley land on the Trinity river in Dallas county will be reclaimed from overflow with the building of a levee row in course of construction in Dallas county. The land to be reclaimed is some of the most fertile cotton and corn land in the state and will add approximately \$2,000,000 to the taxable values of the county.



A "Gift of God."

One sincere little letter received by A. B. Conner of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station from a 13-year-old farmer's boy is typical of the attitude of the producers responding to the efforts of the Committee on Seed Stocks to mitigate as far as possible the shortage in seed for planting. Mr. Conner is chairman of this committee.

"Dear Sir: I have read your article on seed shortage in the news paper and I would like to do my part in relieving the seed shortage," reads the letter, in part.

"I have about 35 pounds of selected feterita seed which is very fine, very carefully selected and cured. I want 20 cents per pound. It is really worth more than that but I let it go at that so as not to make the calamity any greater. The 35 pounds will plant 20 acres and more and that will help the suffering farmers. It is a gift of God and produces well here on our farm. It fills a place that nothing else can fill. I am a farmer's son, 13 years old. My papa has given me some of this feterita seed and I want to sell it to some of those drought-stricken farmers. I have the seed ready to ship any time." The unselfish "gift-of-God" view of

the little Texan seems to have been widely adopted in a very practical form.

The producers' reports cover a high grade quality of seed, and in some cases selected, hand-picked seed which is really worth more money than the owners are asking.

One hundred fifty-six producers have reported to the committee the amounts of seed they will be able to furnish Texas farmers. The information covers seed available for 13 crops. Forty-one producers of corn have reported 12,574 bushels of seed on hand. Twenty-two cotton producers have listed 88,902 bushels of seed. Twenty-nine farmers will be able to furnish seed wheat; 43, oats; four, cowpeas; two, clover; two, rye; one, alfalfa; five, sorghum; three, peanuts; one, sudan; two, barley; and one, emmer.

The supply of seed reported as available is far below that which is needed.

Few requests have thus far been received for the seed. This is because the farmers living in the regions most needing the seed won't do their planting until next spring. The committee on seed stocks is urging that producers having seed send in all information concerning it.

No Time for Hog Cholera.

Burning \$16-hogs that have died of cholera is no pleasant duty. The nation, moreover, cannot afford the food loss involved. During the year ending March 31, last, hog cholera caused losses in this country of more than thirty-two million dollars.

Every hog raiser can aid in preventing so great a loss from cholera recurring this year. Keep the hogs healthy. Clean pens, clean water and right feeding increase the hog's resistance to disease.

Effective control of hog cholera requires more than individual effort.

It requires neighborhood cooperation. When cholera appears in a vicinity all hogs on neighboring farms should be promptly treated with serum or serum and virus.

Quarantine of the premises where there is cholera or where herds have been double-treated should be enforced for a reasonable time. Hogs dying from cholera should also be quickly burned or buried, and a thorough disinfection made of the yards and pens before the quarantine is removed.

America's Champion Dairy County.
 Green county, Wisconsin, lays claim to the title of America's champion dairy county. There are 154 cheese factories in this one county, and few farms are located over a mile from the factory. The average number of patrons is 12 and the average milk receipts are 4000 to 5000 pounds. No American cheese is made in the county, the varieties being confined to the brick, Swiss and Limberger, and nearly all of the cheese makers are native Swiss. Green County is also a great Holstein county, nearly every farmer owning a herd of these cattle, and, since January 1st, 4000 Holsteins have been sold and shipped to other states. Good grade cows are selling for an average of \$150 and farmers often refuse much more than this for the best grade cows. The county is exceedingly prosperous, great crops are being raised on land that is kept in an excellent state of fertility, and nearly every farm has one or more silos.

Secretary Baker in his weekly communique says the Germans are still powerful, tho shaken. Well, they will have to be well shaken before taken, perhaps.—New York Morning Telegraph.

WAR WORK HELPS MORALE OF MEN

TEXAS ORGANIZED TO AID IN RAISING \$35,000,000 WAR WORK FUND

Greater Good Than Red Cross, Says One Worker, Because Makes Men Better in Spirit

What the Red Cross is to the imperiled bodies of our soldiers the Y. M. C. A. war work is to their endangered morals.

In every training camp, at every post, along the front line trenches, the Young Men's Christian Association has its workers, its buildings, its equipment for varied wholesome amusements and its uplifting spiritual influence.

Texas is being organized to secure its allotment of the \$35,000,000 national war work fund of the association. Under the direction of L. A. Coulter, Dallas, representative men are being secured for departmental conferences to be held in every section of the state, following the state gathering at Dallas on Oct. 22. The campaign will continue through Nov. 11-19, and the budget planned will maintain the war work to July 1st, 1918.

Raising Morale of Men

Napoleon used to say that morale is to other factors in war as three to one. The Y. M. C. A. War Work Council proposes to devote itself exclusively to raising, strengthening and preserving the morale of our men and of the Allied countries.

An outstanding leader of the Red Cross said: "One reason why I believe your Y. M. C. A. work is even more important than ours is that you are not only supplementing what we do here and there for the bodies of men, but you are dealing also with that more vital factor, the morale, the spirit of the troops."

It costs no more in time or labor to keep a good bull than a poor one. No more expense in time or labor is required to raise a good calf than a poor calf, and far short of fulfilling the requirements of a loyal American citizen is the one who now persists in using any other than the best of sires procurable.

If every scrub sire in the United States were sent to the butcher, the beef supply of our nation would be favorably enhanced; and, if the places of these sires were filled with good purebred dairy bulls, the milk and butter production of the United States would be doubled within the next five years. Moreover, the cost of producing milk and butterfat would be so largely reduced that profit would accrue from the business even where losses are now truthfully claimed. We sympathize earnestly and sincerely with the dairyman unable to profit from producing milk and butterfat even though he has been using good purebred sires for a number of years, but our sympathy is not unbounded for those who have persistently and consistently used scrub bulls simply because he could buy them cheaply or borrow them from his neighbors.—Kimball's Dairy Farmer.
