Very few people in Canyon realize what the coal situation has meant to the big consumers of coal in Canyon. The matter of a raise in prices of coal to the average family means but a few dollars per year, but to the big consumers it means thousands of dollars every year.

Mr. Bent states that coal is not only prohibitive in price, but it is next to impossible to get delivery. The power plant uses a cheap coal which a few years ago sold at the mine around a dollar per ton and the freight rate was around a dollar.

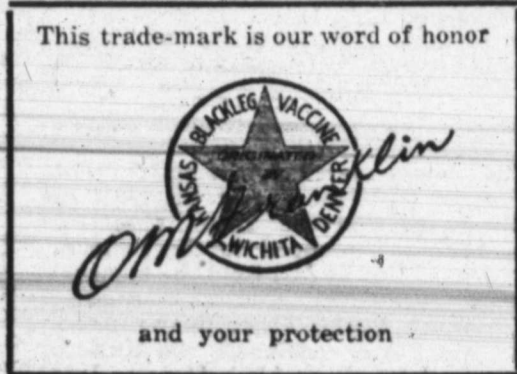

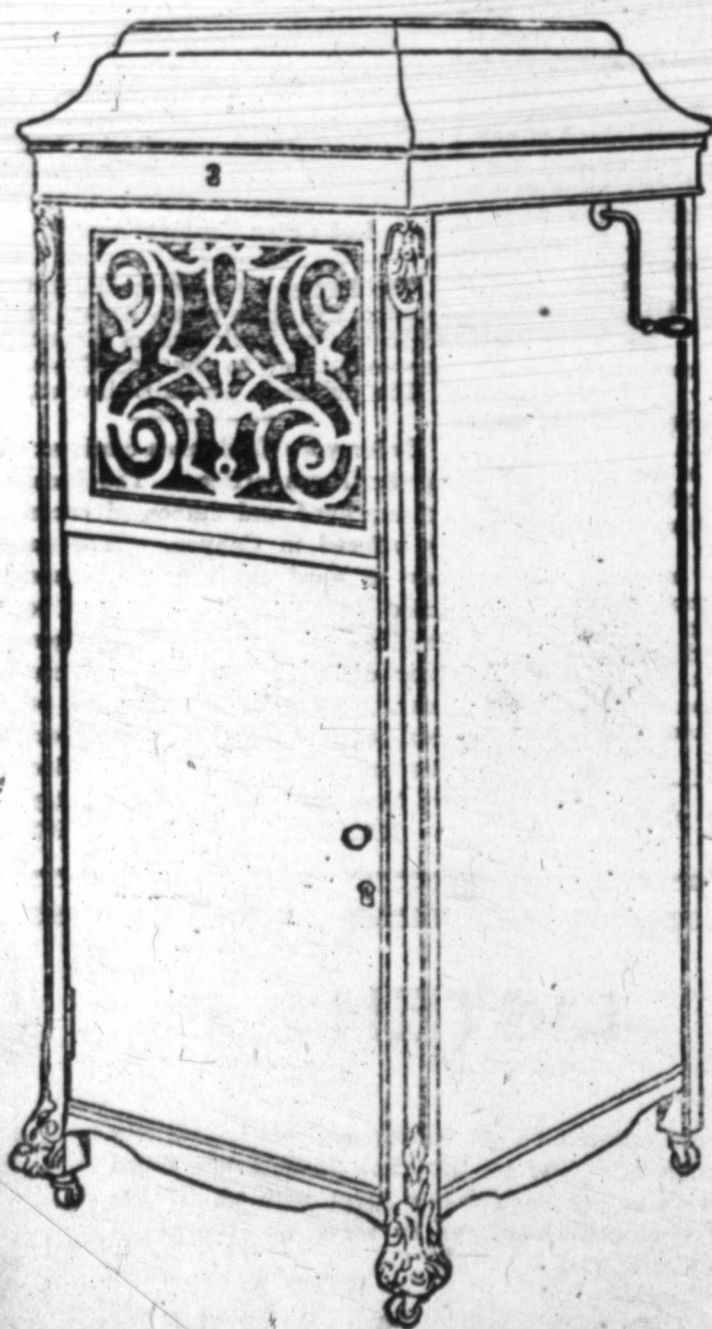

### RIGHT IDEAS OF FARM LIFE.

Saturday, August 25th, the Chicago Tribune, composed of some of the leading citizens of that city, paid a visit to the famous Thaxton Farms near Dundee, Ill., owned by James Brown. On that occasion Hon. Dundee Marshall made a stirring address which contained some good thoughts that it would be well if the farmers of the county would thoughtfully consider and make the basis for the early education of their children.

Mr. Marshall is Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Alberta, Canada. The gist of his remarks was the right training of the farm boy by his father and mother in the home circle. He rightfully claimed that many a future farmer could be saved to the cause of agriculture if he was only wisely and rightfully instructed in his youth and stimulated to make a study of the possibilities of the farming life. He spoke of the wonderful pastoral progress made in Belgium before it was so brutally overrun and despoiled by the German army. He claimed that this progress was largely due to the primary education of the children. He told how in the ruins of the farm home in that country was found by the Canadian soldiers a school primer which had little practical lessons like the following:

"My father has a good horse."  
"The horse is strong because he has a short back."  
"The horse can draw a heavy load all day because his feet are sound and strong."

Here is a simple way the Belgian primary school took care that the logic of a sound, strong horse should be presented and taught at an early impressionable age. The Belgian farm boy will never forget the wisdom of those early lessons. The little book was filled with such pithy, simple statements that give the young and growing mind a desirable bias.

Mr. Marshall said the greatest trouble with our farm work is that the average boy has had no "intelligent and sympathetic directions. He has been driven to see only the seamy side of a garment of rural life. He has in reality been educated to think that all clever people strike out for business or professional careers only."

We have often wondered how many of our farmers really strive to induce their sons to become farmers? How many so shape and surround their young lives that they may become attached to farm life and develop a pride in following it?—Hoard's Dairyman.

**LUCKY HYLAN?**  
John F. Hylan has been elected mayor of America's greatest city. He was chosen by the well-known "overwhelming majority," defeating Mayor Mitchel, who stood for re-election and who had the backing of some of the country's greatest men in all parties. And this John F. Hylan is the same John F. Hylan who began his career as a track layer on the old Kings County elevated railway at the salary of \$1.50 each day. From a position so lowly to one which may class as second only to that held by the president of the United States is "some jump," and the election of Judge Hylan will cause many to remark that he is a "lucky guy."

But is he?  
To begin with, he did not long remain a track layer. He earned promotion and soon was running a locomotive. And while he was at this job he was preparing for another promotion. He was studying law. An inspector caught him reading Blackstone when he should have been doing something else and Hylan was fired. If there is anything lucky in the career of Judge Hylan the fact that an inspector happened around when he was studying law and fired him is the lucky thing.

Had he been satisfied with his first job, Hylan never would, have been given an opportunity to be an engineer. And had he been content with his second job, he never would

have studied law and never would have been fired. And if he had not been fired, he might be an engineer today and not the mayor of America's leading city.

The rise of Judge Hylan should serve as an object lesson to every young man. It should teach that discontent is not always to be condemned.—Beaumont Enterprise.

### Troops Here Advised What They Should Take Abroad.

Officers and enlisted men at Camp Bowie have received bulletins from divisional headquarters advising them what articles to take with them to France. Each soldier is allowed to take an army locker and he is told "to load up" with handkerchiefs, tobacco, face and laundry soap, two towels, fountain pen, shoe laces, stationery, flashlight, wrist watch, U. S. stamps fleecy-lined leather gloves, pocket knife, trench mirror, chocolate candy and one novel.

"At present," says the bulletin, "\$1 equals 5.70 francs. Caps are good on the ocean but are not worn in France. Get flint wheel and tinder cigar lighter and waterproof boots. Take tobacco and money for two months. Trench coats in England or France sell for \$35 at the best. Bring coffee. There is plenty of tea in England but they don't like coffee as we do. Have extra hats for those blown overboard. Take sweaters, mitts and woolen helmets galore."

The notice closes with this significant statement: "There are no women, plenty of professional gamblers and much cordial in France. Settle all business before you leave here as it is a long time between drinks and mail. Americans in France have the same rations as at home."

It is declared that the sheepskin coats which hundreds of officers at Camp Bowie are wearing will be of little value to them in the French trenches because during the winter there is a continual cold rain which would soak into the coats. The oil skin slickers are said to give good service in the trenches.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

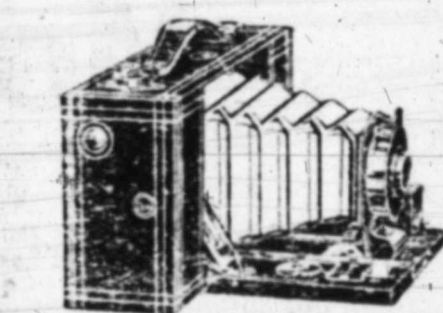

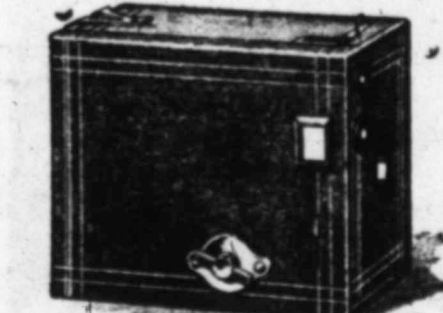

### Saved His Herd From Starvation

Last winter J. B. Cook of Wilcox, Arizona, saved his herd from starvation by a little ingenuity. He procured a large second hand gasoline cutter and a six horse power gasoline engine, took them out and installed them upon his range near Stockton Pass. He employed Mexicans to gather soapweed which was chopped up and fed to the cattle. To eliminate all dry leaves covering the soapweed they took the long, dry flowering stem, lit it and using it for a torch set fire to the outside covering near the ground; and in this way burned off all the leaves. Two strokes of an ax chopped out the body of the weeds which were then hauled in like so many fence posts. A small circle saw was arranged and two men cut the stems into lengths of about fifteen inches. A chopping block, similar to a butcher's block, then used, upon which the sawed pieces were split with a broad ax. The split pieces were then fed into the ensilage cutter and sliced like pineapples. These were piled into enormous troughs, well salted, where the cattle were allowed to eat them to their hearts' content. For three months Mr. Cook employed a force of men to gather and prepare the soapweed, feeding from ten to fifteen and twenty tons of it a day. The cowboys were continually riding the range rounding up poor and weak cows, and working them towards camp. Many of them were so weak on arrival that after lying down they were unable to get up and had to be helped to their feet for many days after. Altogether over 600 cows were treated in this manner and saved by utilizing the soapweed. The only additional feed given was a limited ration of cottonseed cake.—Field And Farm.

### Do You Want Cattle?

Agents of the U. S. Department of Agriculture at work in the drouth area of the Southwest report that there is an increasing demand for the breeding stock of the Southwestern ranges. Many enquiries are coming to them from the farmers and stockmen from all over the Central Western and Corn Belt states asking about the cattle of that country. The big demand is for the best heifers and young cows of that section and it is expected that many of these good breeding cattle will be saved from the packers and kept in the country for breeding purposes.

The predominating breed of cattle in the southwest is Hereford, but there are some Angus and Shorthorn cows and heifers available. These cattle, especially the Texas cattle, are very well bred as it has been the custom of the ranchmen of that section to run best bulls they can get with their herds and better range cattle will be hard to find. These cattle are of course thin, due to the continued drouth, but the breeding and quality is there and they will make excellent breeding stock no matter where they are taken and men who have stalk fields or roughage, or feed of any kind will not make a mistake in securing some of these cattle.

As most of the cattle in the range country are owned in rather large bunches men who only want one or two cars should do one of two things: Thousands of the cattle are going to the Kansas City and other Western markets and the men wanting small bunches can either go or send to these markets and buy these cattle in any size bunch. They can get the same cattle and at about the same price as they could on the range. However, if several men wanting small bunches will pool their orders and send one man to the range and let him buy all the cattle wanted in one lot they can get better cattle and at probably a less cost and the expense will not be so great. County Agricultural Agents are generally glad to assist in getting these orders together and assist in every way possible. If over one hundred head are desired excellent bargains can be secured on the range.

T. Pryse Metcalf, Agent in Animal Husbandry, Amarillo, Texas, is in touch with the cattle men of the Southwest and will be glad to furnish information or put men wanting cattle in touch with the ranchmen of that section.

### Hagira a Good Plains Crop.

F. V. Williams reports that his experiment in growing Hagira, a new sorghum feed crop that the government is developing, has been a splendid success and that he will give it the preference over all other crops on his place. His Hagira crop this year made a ton of grain to the acre and good feed and far outdistanced all other crops. Hagira seems to be closely allied to the cane and kafir crops and yet is different from all of them, and Mr. Williams says it is superior to any crop he has ever raised. The grain is softer than kafir and the stalk is very tender and sweet. Hogs, horses and cows eat the stalk, leaves and all.

The head is shorter and is larger in circumference than is the kafir head, the largest part being in the middle of the head.

Two years ago Mr. Williams received a small package of Hagira seed from the government with the request that he plant it as experimental crop. He did so in 1916 and the result was so satisfactory that he saved all the seed that the stock did not get to this year. This year he planted the Hagira in April and it came up and made a good growth before the dry weather came in June. Then it just stood there and waited until a rain came before it grew any more, in fact that seems to him to be the reason that it is the best drouth resister. When other crops die from lack of moisture Hagira just stands with an arrested growth until rain comes, when it starts to growing again. The grain again. The seeds again. The grain does not shatter like feterita does, and Mr. Williams sates that he is hereafter going to make this his principal crop.

The government is introducing this crop, and there is much publicity being given to it.—Slaton Slatonite

The imperial German government is the owner of a \$50 Liberty bond. A local attorney handling funds of German estates in and about Philadelphia in settling one account recently had a balance of \$60 which belonged to the imperial German government. He applies \$50 of that amount to a Liberty bond to help the United States to win the war.

### Future Electric Service.

Some predictions of the coming universality of electric service are made by Dr. Charles P. Steinmetz, expert of the General Electric Company, as quoted in an article in The Public Ledger (Philadelphia, July 15). Says Dr. Steinmetz:

"When we use nothing but electrical power for heating as well as for other purposes, the supply will come thru transmission-lines from big central stations of many million horse-power wasteful process. —hoge.—eeeblyt These stations will be located wherever power is available, such as at waterfalls, coal-mines, and oil and gas-wells. This will do away with the wasteful process of hauling coal from the mines to the relative small power-houses scattered all over the country. It may be that at the coal-mines, instead of taking out the coal and burning it the way we do now, power will be generated in the mine itself by setting the coal in the veins on fire. No—this is not beyond the dream of possibility. It has already been seriously proposed by an eminent English scientist. Stratling will be the changes effected by such a supply of electricity. Electrical power will be used so generally that it is very likely the cost will be on basis of a tax, like our water tax. For example, so much a plug, as we are now charged so much a faucet. It will be very cheap and it will not pay to install meters and have them read and keep the accounts in the offices of the electric companies. To-day water is used universally, and no one would think of making a charge to a friend or even a stranger for any amount of it. If you make a call in your electric vehicle, the vehicle will be run into your friend's basement and the batteries will be recharged while you are making your call. It won't make any difference whether you get your electric current from your friend's plug or from the plug in your own home—the tax will remain the same"

### Siftings.

Deputy Manuel Garcia in Chamber of Deputies at Mexico City has declared that the Allies are fighting for democracy and against supreme autocracy and that, in view of what has happened in Mexico during the past half a dozen years, Mexico should take her stand on the side of the Entente Powers.

The Mexican government has deposited 15,000,000 pesos in a New York bank to cover the purchase of 3,000,000 bushels of American corn to be used in relieving the Mexican food situation. The corn will be delivered at Laredo at the rate of 200,000 bushels every 20 days. A 50 per cent discount in freight rates has been ordered by President Carranza as a means of reducing the price in Mexico. Flo rida corn is being placed for the first time in competition with western corn on the grain markets of the country. A large expenditure of money has been made by the wholesale grocers who compose the Florida Grain Elevator Company to erect a grain elevator and to get a market for Florida corn. The elevator has been in operation for more than a week and many cars of grain have been bagged and reshipped to grain markets.

Through E. A. Peden, food administrator for Texas with headquarters at Houston, warning today was issued to railroad and wholesale officials of the state of possible impending destruction to be wrought upon food supplies in storage or transit. Precautions were advised by Mr. Peden against fire in warehouses and elevators and railroad officials were expected to redouble vigilance over the transportation of all foodstuffs, with particular attention being paid cattle shipments.

It is also shown that there are altogether 53,000,000 men today actively engaged in the war. It is stated that with no more than 2,000,000 of American manhood enlisted, the total military strength of the Allies is 33,000,000, against a total for Germany, Austria, Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey of 20,000,000. The population of 14 Entente Allies, from which the ranks of their Armies may be replenished is altogether 1,300,000,000, against a population of less than 150,000,000 in the Central European nations.

The developed national wealth of the Allies is placed at \$600,000,000 by the bank, while that of the Teutonic powers is given at \$130,000,000,000.

The largest surplus from postal revenues in the history of the government, \$9,000,000, was paid into the treasury Friday, October 26th, by the postoffice department. The second largest surplus was \$6,000,000, paid in last year.

The German officers are said to be losing control over their men. It is hoped that the lists of atrocities will now decrease.—Philadelphia North American.

Lashes on the bare back, tar and feathers and notice to go and keep going—all this is rather highbanded proceeding. The citizens of Tulsa who chose this method for getting rid of a bunch of I. W. 
### Strange But True

The following letter from Easton Allen, in France, was received this week:

October 27, 1917.

Dear Father:—  
I haven't received a bit of mail since I wrote last, which was some time ago.

I wish I could tell you lots of things about what we are doing and everything, but I guess the censor would cut it out because it might tell spies too. If I could, you wouldn't worry about me.

Eggs are 80c a dozen and apples are about 8c a dozen. On most things, however, the prices are not so different from the United States. Candies and things of that kind are about twice as high. The people around here don't seem to be suffering any. I have been in one home several times to get the old lady to cook me a supper or make me a hot chocolate (and she sure can make fine "dope") and they have as contented a home as could be, with about the same conveniences that our farmers have.

In the larger cities things are in general much cheaper than in the "country." However, there is no such thing as we would call country. The farmers live in groups with their farms surrounding the village. I don't believe there is a man in this village who isn't a farmer, except the priest. And when you hear talk of the loose morals of the French, except the villagers who form a large part of the population of France, in that line an American village of the same size would do well to come up to these people. (Soldiers are good authority on matters of that kind.)

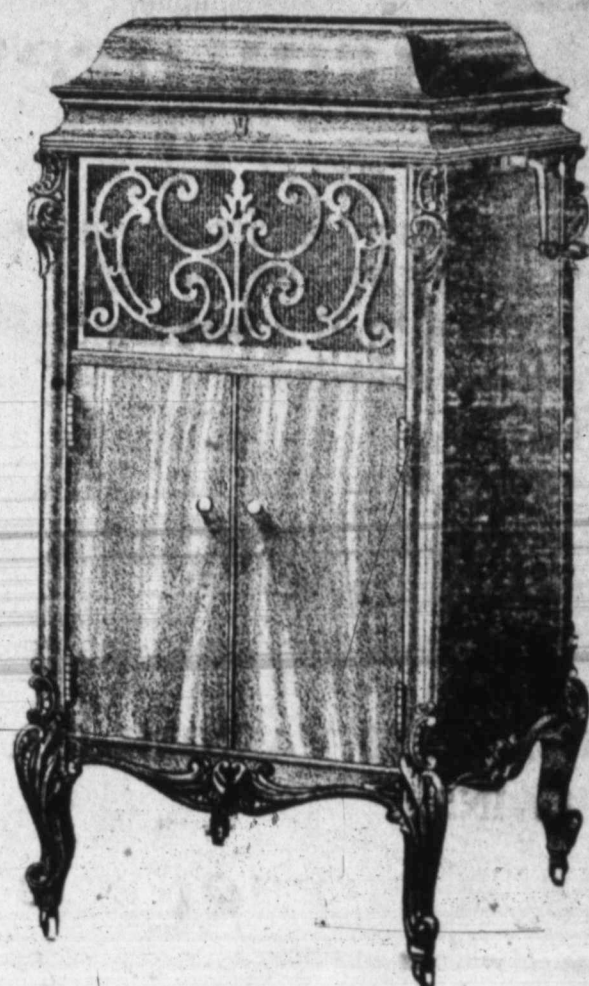
