The necessity of supper was removed by a greaf prolongation of the dinner, at which each person was expected to eat all that he or she possibly could. Thrift Stamps.

Despite all that has been said and printed about the thrift stamps, a good deal more must be printed and said before the people as a whole understand the new device. The thrift stamps are something like postage stamps, and the idea is to collect enough of them to do both the collector and the Government a good turn. Four dollars' worth of these stamps, at twenty-five cents each, and twelve cents in cash are exchangeable at any bank or postoffice or other sales place for a war savings stamp. This war savings stamp will be redeemed at the end of five years for five dollars. This means interest at the rate of something more than four per cent per annum. The thrift stamps as they are purchased, whether one at a time or sixteen at a time, are to be attached to a card which will be supplied you when you buy the stamp or stamps. The card is merely a convenience for holding the stamps. The plan enables anybody with as much as twenty-five cents to lend it to the Government. 





HOW SOCIETY IS SUSTAINED

Half of Membership Fees Provides Sufficient Funds for Administrative Purposes-Where Subscriptions Go.

Hirelings of the unspeakable Kaiser have circulated more lies with reference to the American Red Cross than any other American organization One of these lies was to the effect that a big percentage of the millions of dollars subscribed for Red Cross work went to officials of the organization. This statement has no basis in fact whatever.

One hundred and twenty million dollars was subscribed for the Red Cross by Americans last June, and not one penny of this money has been spent for administrative work. When a membership in the Red Cross is issued, say for \$1, 50 cents of this amount is sent to headquarters at Washington for the administrative fund and the remaining 50 cents is kept by the chapter which issued the membership.

Where the Money Goes. Not all of the \$120,000,000 subscribed in June has been collected. Collections on Nov. 1 totaled \$79,895,-155.68. There is a pitiful shortage and winter is coming on. No natter how many knitted articles went aboard a ship, none of them would be used as mops

Still another lie is to the effect that Mrs. Frank V. Hammer, chairman of he St. Louis Red Cross Chapter, reseives \$15,000 a year for her services, and that George W. Simmons, chairman of the Southwestern District, reseives \$30,000.

Both Mrs. Hammer and Simmons dosate their services and pay their own traveling expenses. In addition, Simnons and Mrs. Hammer have each nade large personal subscriptions to the Red Cross fund.

Yarn for Sweaters Is Free. Another baseless German lie is to the effect that the Red Cross is sell-

ng yarn to women who are knitting sweaters and mufflers for the soldiers. The basis for this tale is a rule enorced by the Red Cross, which rejuires a small deposit when yarn is purned over to applicants. The deposit s refunded when the knitted garnents and left-over yarn are returned.

That a sweater knit in St. Louis for the soldiers in France was sold by Red Cross workers and identified by the woman who knit it by a piece of currency sewed into the fabric is another

Heads of the Red Cross Society in St. Louis branded this as a bald fabrication. Nothing handled by the Red Dross Society is sold.


