Letter From Camp Travis.
Camp Travis, Texas, Dec. 5, 1917.
Dear Mr. Warwick:—

Our Canyon bunch is getting scattered more and more each week—it seems. I guess by another month or so we can't get three of us together at once.

"Dink" Ballard left us yesterday to join the 507th Engineer's Service Battalion as a Sergeant in charge of the negroes who compose the ranks of this organization. Bill Black got into the same organization two weeks ago. They expect to go on across at once and all are in high spirits over the prospects of an early voyage.

There are only two of us from Canyon in the 47th Company now. They have all been transferred out until Ben Terrill and I are the only ones left. We are distributed around in pairs. Charley Hunt and Guy Harp are still in the Supply Company of the Depot Brigade. Marion Bishir and Kenneth Hunt are together in the Hospital corps, rolling pills to the measles patients. Bill Black and "Dink" are now in the Service Battalion together and as I said before, Ben Terrill and I are left in the Company we were all sent to when we arrived. I might add, however, that as far as my being in the 47th Company is concerned, the statement is just a little exaggerated. As a matter of fact, I am in a quarantine ward of the Base Hospital of Camp Travis with the measles and have been here since Friday morning but it was over about as quick as it hit me and so I am hoping to get out at once. There is quite an epidemic of measles here. About 200 cases break every day. There are over 1000 in this quarantine section of the Base Hospital.

The football season is just opening in army circles now. Camp Travis and Kelly Field pulled off the best football game I have ever seen, on Thanksgiving Day here at the Camp Travis Stadium. The Travis team was composed of the select material from the best college and army teams in the south. Most of them are southern men. Kelley's team is picked mostly from the north with quite as good material to pick from. It was a big struggle and attracted lots of attention. As an opening stunt, four airplanes flew over and each dropped a football on the field. Instead of pulling off the time honored snake dance between halves the Travis rooters led Kelley's goat (that they had just "gotten") around the field and with a yell the Kelley rooters took their goat back but in less than 60 seconds at least two thousand men were surging and yelling around over a spot that one would swear 100 men

could not find standing room on all trying to decide whether Travis had really gotten Kelley's goat or not. The question had to be settled by the military police at once and the referees finally decided that Travis did get their goat to the tune of 12-7. There will be a return game on Xmas day and if any one wants to see one of the really big days in football history, he should be here Xmas day.

If any of the Canyon people come to San Antonio I hope they will drop around to see us as we would appreciate a visit from some one from home. One of our friends from Canyon passed us up the other day in great fashion. He rode by in a twin six with some of his friends and merely raised his hand and spoke in passing. We are expecting an "apology" almost every day now. It is really due, we all decided, so come across!

The weather is getting rather cool now and we are slowly getting our winter clothes and we have almost decided that we really need them. The present blizzard has been on four days and there are no prospects for its getting much warmer for a while. Till now we have had summer weather all the time.

We have received several packages of eats and smokes and we will take this another opportunity to thank all who have been so kind to keep us supplied. We certainly thank all who contributed.

Lieut. Chas. Keffer and Lieut. Vayne Bentley are located together in one of the companies of negroes. They are working hard every day trying to whip the men into shape for foreign service at once. In the same

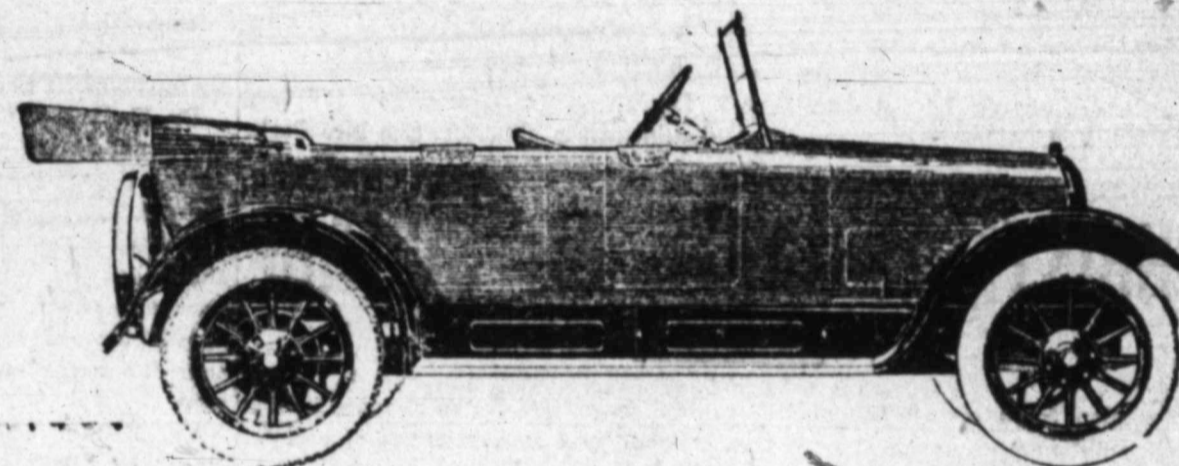

There are too many people in this county who disparage the strength of Germany and are prone to make light of the successes of the Germans in this war. It is true, that the German mind has given little to the world in science, literature or art; it is true that she has picked up what some other nation has cast aside, but only to make it a success; it is true that most of her victories has been only in cases of vastly superior numbers and lack of supplies by her enemy; but that does not change the fact that the German government is the most powerful in the world when it comes to getting the maximum from her people at home and from her armies in the field; furthermore, it does not alter the fact that Germany has already won 90 to 95 per cent of what she started out to do, and it is going to require the combined effort of the civilized world to keep her from accomplishing the full 100 per cent. Those individuals who deprecate the German forces and victories are only raising false hopes in the minds of people who do not know the real facts in the case, and by so doing, we are fearful least some of these people may be restrained from doing their dead level best to help our country win the war. Win we are, but it may be years after the fellow how is now lambasting Germany has been laid away in his grave.

This is our first Christmas in the United States since the war began. Many homes in Randall County have been so cheerful in the past. A Randall County Christmas.

The Saving Bank accounts of England has increased greatly since the war began. The people who formerly wasted, are now saving and investigating their savings in their government. Our nation is inaugurating a Thrift Campaign which will do a great deal toward saving our nation from its wastefulness. If our people will learn to buy stamps with the little amounts that have hitherto been wasted, our Thrift Campaign will be a great success and we shall emerge from the war a nation of savers, rather than a nation of spenders, as we are now accused.

The House of Representative passed National Prohibition Monday by an unexpected majority. Thus old J. Barleycorn felt the results of another torpedo. When three-fourths of the states have ratified the amendment liquor will be abolished from this country. There is absolutely no doubt of the amendment carrying in the necessary number of states. National prohibition is coming faster than most people ever thought. Our country will be entirely dry much to the satisfaction of the men and women who wish to see men as men rather than beasts.

Lloyd George says that only the greatest effort will keep the Germans from breaking through the western front. The Germans are determined to break if possible, the line before America can get much of a force on the line to bolster up the allies. THE WEST TEXAS WAY.

Mitchell County and Colorado are still in the dry belt—but we are as sure to come back as the seasons come and go. Good rains are sure to follow the drouth, when confidence will be restored to those who have lost it. But we can safely say that the sure-enough West Texas farmer or business man has never lost confidence in the future of this country. In the natural evolution of nature, a good crop is more than likely to follow this year's failure, and should it be so, the high price of all farm products will assure general prosperity, such as this country has never known.

Let us look straight ahead, and be sure our part is well done, and He who rules the universe, and sends the rain, the dew and the sunshine, will surely do His, and a wave of material prosperity will be poured out on the suffering people.

Some people from the east, decide to move to West Texas, and perchance arrive in time to get caught in a little dry spell, with the result that they hasten back east and spread the news that the west is no good as a farming country. These kind of people have not the backbone or the spirit of the pioneer. Should they pug up with a few hardships at first, perhaps a short crop or two; they would reap their reward in time, as many who have "stayed with the stuff" have done before them.

An average year is so much better in West Texas than a good year in East Texas, the farmers with a few years' experience in West Texas, will not leave it for any other territory.

We have seen malaria and mosquitos ravage the people of South Texas; boll worms and weevil eat up the cotton in East Texas; star-back ticks sap the life out of the cattle beyond the Trinity river; drouths of only a few weeks ruin the crops of Central Texas, after they were almost made; and any of these afflictions are far worse than a drouth in West Texas, yet they are not advertised throughout the state as a constant recurrence, and a detriment to these respective sections.

Not in the memory of the oldest inhabitant has West Texas been hit as hard by drouth as it has been hit this year; which fact indicates that it is a calamity and not an annual or even a periodical occurrence. While the west is much dryer than the east, the soil and climate are so in accord that it does not do the injury that similar conditions would do in the east. This being the first year since this country has been under cultivation that crops have been a total failure, only indicates that it will probably be the last.

Notwithstanding all this, if anybody imagines that the population is on the verge of starvation, he has another guess coming. Automobiles and picture shows are still running, almost the same as if nothing was wrong, and we have heard of no one crying for bread. Of course it will be a bitter experience for some families, and no doubt many will actually suffer, before the winter is over. But they will face it bravely and will come out next spring full of hope, grit and determination; and the Record hopes—and expects—that they will prosper as never before.

Notwithstanding adverse legislation and the knocks and kicks of east Texas, this country has never failed to make good; she has never been down but that she got up again (and that quickly) stronger, more hopeful and in better fighting trim than before—Is the West Texas way.—Colorado Record.

The people of Arkansas raised more wheat, corn, oats, potatoes and hay this year than in 1916. Government reports just completed show that 1,000,000 bushels more wheat alone was produced. On the other hand, the cotton and rice crops were not so large. To offset the short rice and cotton crops, farmers have been receiving higher prices for all products, both those in which a surplus is recorded and those which show a deficit. Wheat on October 1, sold for \$2 per bushel, in comparison with \$1.38 per bushel on the same date a year ago.* Corn sold for \$1.60 per bushel, in comparison with 89 cents in 1916; oats at 68 cents per bushel, in comparison with 62 cents in 1916; potatoes at \$1.40 compared with \$1.34; hay at \$15.20 per ton, in comparison with \$11.10 last year.

An overwhelming majority of the German-American press commits treason from day to day by "adhering to the enemy, giving them aid and comfort," says the Times-Picayune. These newspapers, published by American citizens as a rule, have so far found

comparative safety behind the ambush of a foreign language. And, alas, there are newspapers of a different type which manifest the same treasonable spirit, owned by Americans and printed in English; they likewise "adhere to the enemy, giving them aid and comfort." Why should America show a patience that has no precedent in all the history of warfare? The alien's case is bad enough; infinitely worse is the case of the traitor who stands within the pale of our citizenship by birth and adoption.

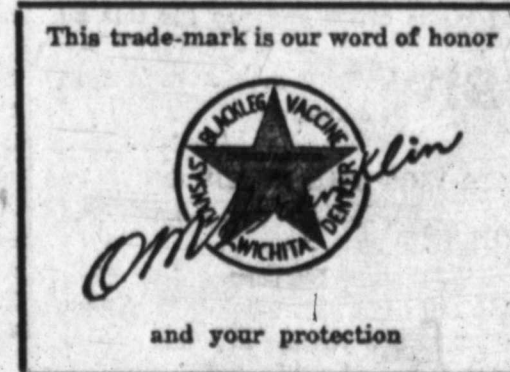

SOME OF THE NEEDS OF BUCKNER ORPHANS HOME

Nursery.
There are about 50 little children, ages 2 to 6 years, in the nursery. There are 25 little beds. Children sleep two in a bed. Sheets are badly needed, as there are not enough for a change; sheets are washed and used same day. Rubber sheeting is also very badly needed for all these beds; it is a necessity. Other needs of this department: 50 small chairs; cups and plates (granite ware preferred); quilts and blankets; combs, both coarse and fine combs; tooth brushes; soap; roller towels, 1 dozen; rollers to hold towels; furniture for hall; 8 shades for two front bedrooms, 40 1/2 in. wide by 77 in. long; 2 shades for hall, 66 in. long by 29 in. for hall door, 25 in. wide by 39 in. long; night gowns; clothes; shoes and stockings; underwear.

Hospital.
There are 18 beds in the hospital, all three-quarter beds. Need 108 sheets, 18 mattresses, 36 pillows, 18 pairs blankets, quilts, towels, soap. There are 369 girls between the ages

of 7 and 18 years, and 275 boys between the ages of 7 and 18.

The boys need 600 pairs overalls; 200 shirts; 150 pairs shoes, sizes 2 to 8; 200 pairs stockings, 7's to 10's; 200 yards black elastic, 1/4 in.; 250 sweaters (no reds); 150 belts (24 to 30 in. long). Khaki colored shirts, overalls, etc., preferred, as the boys would like to appear like soldiers. There are now more than 25 Buckner boys in the army.

There are about 18 elderly women, about 75 years old, at the Home, who live in a cottage called "Bethsan." There is only one elderly minister at the Home, who assists in outdoor work. All of these elderly persons need clothing of all kinds.

There is a remarkable opportunity here for the highest type of charity. Will you not all give most liberally to this cause?

The seven year old boys and girls are the most neat of all the home. In place of the usual Christmas tree at the Baptist Church, there will be a gift service for Buckner Orphans home on Monday evening at 6 o'clock and a short program by the children of the school. All come and bring a gift for the orphans.

The program for the series of meetings which constitutes the first systematic Farmers Short Course for this Community is as follows:
Monday night—1. "The hog in the War". 2. "Wheat in the War".
Tuesday night—1. "Seed Selection with seed Judging Contest". 2. "What shall we plant next year". 3. "Conservation of food".

Wednesday night—1. Address from U. S. Agent, B. B. Holland, possibly others. 2. "The dairy cow in the war". 3. The tractor in the war".
On Wednesday afternoon a stock judging contest will be given at which the young men and boys of the community will have an opportunity to learn what constitutes a good draft horse, a good dairy cow and a good hog.
It is the purpose of our people to make the Farmers Short Course an annual affair. To show the interest of our people in the problems before them in doing their part in supplying food in these perilous hours. I will relate for the inspiration it may be to other communities that after a discussion of how we could avoid the heavy loss in the pig crop from dust and lice, the Leader, W. D. McGehee suggested a Slogan for the coming year that should match the famous, "Save every Pod in the Patch and every Pea in the Pod". This was proposed and heartily endorsed "Save every pig in the pen and put every pound on the pig you can." The heavy loss from dust and lice makes the above slogan a most appropriate one and one that I hope may become a battle cry for every farmer on the Plains!

Couldn't Be More Expensive.
The subject of the division of Texas still predominates in the editorial columns of the Panhandle newspapers. The only argument worth while we have read against the division of the state, is, that it will cost more to keep two governments than it does one which may be fact. If a government of a new state of Panhandle cost as much as our present one it would certainly be expensive, but we believe the Panhandle is paying enough taxes to have a separate government and then have some left. The argument of one government being cheaper than two might be an argument in favor of Texas annexing Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana. The one government plan is alright, but you can get too much territory in the one government. — Miami Chief.

YOUNGEST BIG BANK PRESIDENT HEADS RED CROSS DRIVE

JOHN L. JOHNSTON OF GERMAN SAVINGS INSTITUTION IS SOUTHWEST CHAIRMAN.

WILL GO "OVER THE TOP"

Predicts That His Division Will Exceed Its Quota in Nation-Wide Drive by 1,000,000 Members.

A bank clerk at 15 years of age, a cashier and director at 19 and president of the German Savings Institution of St. Louis, the second oldest bank in the state of Missouri, at 30. This is the remarkable record in finance achieved by John L. Johnston, who is head of the American Red

Cross Christmas membership drive for 2,000,000 additional members in the Southwestern division, comprising the states of Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, which will be launched Monday, Dec. 17, continuing until Christmas eve.

Johnston, who is applying the same principles to the formation of a gigantic organization for the Christmas membership campaign as those that won for him unprecedented success in the banking world, predicts the five states in his division will pass its allotment by at least 1,000,000 members.

Spurred by his own enthusiasm over the wonderful work which the American Red Cross is accomplishing for Uncle Sam's fighting force, both at home and abroad, Johnston's co-workers are bending every energy to insure a successful opening of the big drive the morning of Monday, Dec. 17. It is expected 50,000 persons will be enlisted in the solicitation of members when the campaign is formally launched.

"If you don't belong to the Red Cross you help prolong the suffering of our soldiers over there." This is the cardinal idea that Johnston hopes to have brought home forcibly to every household in the Southwest between now and Christmas eve, when Red Cross workers and their latest converts, in many communities, will chant carols in the streets as a fitting climax to the movement which will cover the length and breadth of America.

"Over the top by one million," is the slogan of the youngest metropolitan bank president in the United States, and the manner in which Johnston is whipping into shape preliminaries of the campaign augurs well for its success.

Born in Louisville, Ky., in 1886, Johnston received his first banking experience, when he was 15 years old, by working as a clerk in the Bass-Johnston Banking Company at Ashland, Mo. He continued to work in the bank during the summers until, in 1905, he was elected cashier and a director, at which time he was still not of age.

In 1907 he went to Muskogee, Ok

where he became vice-president of the First National Bank of that city. In 1910 Johnston left Muskogee and became one of the organizers of the National Reserve Bank of Kansas City, which he served as cashier and director for five years. In February, 1915, he went to St. Louis as vice-president and a director of the German Savings Institution of that city. Oct. 28, last year, he was elected president of that institution, which has shown largely increased surplus and deposits under his direction.

Any man of ordinary ability can succeed if he sets his mind hard to it. This is Johnston's rule for success.

Membership in the Red Cross is synonymous with good citizenship. Are you a member of the Red Cross? If not you will join now, or at latest during the Christmas membership campaign, which begins Dec. 17—that is, you will join if you are a good citizen of the United States. The cost is only \$1.

Mr. Shure has been working upon this idea for some time and with the aid of Mr. Goldston, the local jeweler, his model was forwarded to Washington some weeks ago and the patent was forthcoming. Already Mr. Shure has received a number of letters from manufacturing concerns, patent attorneys and patent journals asking for information upon his patent and no doubt this novel clock will soon be put on the market, adorning the tables and desks of the literary inclined the nation over.—Clarendon News.
