"When a concern that has a contract with the war department for supplies has shown the board that it needs financial assistance and has been able to comply with the act by giving adequate security, the board has approved an advance payment and the money has been received; in many instances where the case was urgent the money has been paid over to the contractor the same day the application has been filed. However, the board does not act in any sense as a bank. It is only when the manufacturer has reached a point where financial assistance is needed, in addition to his banking lines, that ap-plication for advance payment for his goods is considered favorably by the

Between the time of its creation in November and January 24 the board approved advances to contractors totaling \$145,551,000.

With a view to mobilizing the educational institutions of the country for this special training there has been created in the war department a "committee on education and special training." It will encourage and arrange for the technical education of men needed by the several branches of the

A "War Cyclopedia," providing the public with information on the great war in the form of a handbook, is the latest publication issued by the committee on public information.

The salient facts of the war are briefly stated in alphabetical form in 800 pages. The cyclopedia also contains a chronology of outstanding eyents ranging from the murder at Serajevo of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, June 28, 1914, to the British national labor conference's approval of President Wilson's war alms, December

The volume may be obtained by addressing the Committee of Public Information, 10 Jackson place, Washington, D. C., and inclosing 25 cents to cover cost of printing.

While figures are not yet available on the proportionate number of \$1 and \$5 smileage books being purchased for use by men at the camps and cantonmats, the commission on training camp activities, in charge of the sale, states that there has seen unexpected demand for the larger books. Smileage books selling for \$1 contain 20 coupons good for admission to camp entertainments; books selling for \$5 contain 100

From two to five coupons are required for admission to Liberty theaters at the camps, although many of the productions are of the class which command \$2 prices in metropolitan

Plans for the aerial mail route between Washington, Philadelphia and New York contemplate the use of machines capable of carrying 300 pounds of mail a distance of 200 miles without stop. A special postage rate would be charged not exceeding 25 cents an

In reply to inquiries regarding the possibility of redistilling seized spirits for alcohol the war department has announced that the small amount of alcohol recovered, the cost of transportation, recooperage and redistillation would make the cost to the government greater than it is now paying. The average yield from confiscated liquor would not exceed 5 per cent of alcohol.

The war department now permits women to qualify as inspectors of small arms, according to an announcement by the civil service commission. \$400,000,000.

After an inspection trip to a base hospital, Secretary of War Baker made the following reply to an inquiry concerning hospital conditions:

"With Surgeon General Gorgas and Doctor Hornsby I made this morning a personal inspection of the entire base hospital at Camp Meade. The hospital is very large, fully equipped with sci-TREASURY RECEIPTS FROM THIS entific laboratories and facilities, has an adequate number of trained nurses under the supervision of a skilled superintendent; its medical and surgical staffs are made up of competent men filled with enthusiasm for their work. WAR CREDITS BOARD WORK The hospital throughout is clean and well cared for; there was an abundance of clean linen, a plentiful sup-When and Why It Authorizes Advance | ply of well-prepared and appetizing food, and every evidence of considerate attention to the patients was manifest. I talked with a large number of the patients, none of whom knew who I was, and found them cheerful and without a single complaint as to their treatment or comfort. Doctor Hornsby told me at the conclusion of our inspection that the base hospitals in the cantonments throughout the country were substantially like the one we visited this morning. It was a most rease iring visit. I have long been interested in hospitals, and if I were to have a personal illness which required hospital treatment I should be perfectly content to be sick in the base hospital at Camp Meade, satisfied that I would receive the attention necessary and under comfortable conditions.'

Altogether there will be 39 types of wartime boots. Licenses for the export or import of coin, bullion, currency, evidences of debt of ownership of property and transfers of credit will be issued by the tweasury department; licenses for all other exports and imports, including merchandise, bunkers, ships' supplies, etc., will be issued by the war trade board.

The director of athletics at one army camp has arranged a program as a means of determining the relative athletic caliber of the companies in the division. Each man is required to pass in eight of the following tests to obtain a positive mark for his unit:

Jump 8 feet from a standing position; chin 10 times; clear a bar at 4 feet 2 inches; throw a 12-pound shot 33 feet; climb a 20-foot rope in 15 seconds; dash 50 yards in 7 seconds; run a mile in 6 minutes; lift a 60-pound weight over the head with one hand; sit up from a supine position with a 50-pound weight suspended from the back of the head.







- 21/2 cups wheat flour 1-3 yeast cake
- 1 cup rolled oats.

Scald the liquid, add salt and pour ever the oats, cool half an hour, add the yeast mixed with 1-4 cup lukewarm water, and the flour. Knead and let rise until double in size. one loaf weighing 1 1-4 pounds.

### Corn Meal Gingerbread.

- 1 cup cornmeal
- 1 cup wheat flour 1 teaspoon soda
- 3-4 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ginger 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-2 teaspoon cloves
- 1 cup sour milk 1 cup molasses
- 2 tablespoons shortening.

Bake in moderate oven.



#### No Reason for Pessimism. Minneapolis Journal: Just why the

Germans have so long and persistently advertised their offensive on the western front is an enigma. It is not their custom to take the world into their confidence when about to begin an important military movement. The purpose of this advertising campaign will doubtless be disclosed in good time. Possibly their hope is to weaken the morale of the allies by keeping them in suspense as just where the offensive is to be-

But there are no signs of perturbation among the forces facing the Teutons from Flanders to Venetia. On the contrary, there is an altre readiness that promises a smashing of German hopes. The decision of the Versailles conference for a unified control of the whole front, including the "side show" at Salonika, means the elimination of the weakness that has heretofore come from divided

Here at home one may detect occationally an undercurrent of pessimism as to the outcome, an apprehensiveness that springs from ignorance of the true conditions. Perhaps this is one of the true conditions. Perhaps this is one of the effects sought by the German advertising campaign. At any rate, every American should at once cast out of his mind any such feeling, for it has no sound-basis.

After all, it must be remembered that the Germans have not yet won a single military victory of importance, except by treachery and intrigue. All their successes have been achieved in that way from the outset. They began by violating Belgian neutrality-a characteristic piece of treachery which enabled them to overrun Belgium and advance far into France. But they were stopped at the Marne and at Ypres by forces that were inferior numerically. If the unprepared English and the outnumbered French could stop them then, how can they hope to break through

On the eastern front German victor. ies have been won by wholesale corruption and intrigue. The German cabal at Petrograd early succeeded in paralyzing the Russian arms by corrupting high officials, cutting off supplies of munitions and sending the muiiks into battle without weapons to fight with. It was thus that Hindenburg won his much vaunted triumph of the Masurain Lakes; it was thus that the Russian invasion of alicia that threatened to cut off Hur gary was finally thrown back. German treachery has played a part in every step of the disintregation of Rus
