

CAMPAIGN W. S. S. STARTS ON SUNDAY

Plans are rapidly developing for the great drive on War Savings Stamps in Randall County June 28th.

A number of meetings have been held this week for the purpose of getting all of the details firmly in the minds of the workers.

Saturday evening at eight o'clock there will be another very important meeting at the First National Bank at which time all of the men and women who are to go out Sunday will meet to receive from County Chairman E. H. Powell final instructions and to receive blanks and W. S. Stamps which are to be taken out Sunday afternoon.

Meetings Sunday afternoon at the School Houses of the County will be held at three o'clock.

The meeting to be held in Canyon Friday, June 28 will be at two o'clock.

A booth was put in the court house Friday and young ladies have been selling stamps there nearly every day. They will continue to be there until Randall county's quota has been fully subscribed.

Work was started this week in the organization of War Savings Societies in Canyon. There should be thirteen of these societies in Randall county. Owing to the county schools being out it was decided to attempt no organization of children outside of Canyon until the fall term opens.

Randall county's quota for the big drive is \$100,530. That is an average of \$20.00 for each man, woman and child in Randall county. The government expects each and every man, woman and child to do his part. If he does not do his part, the government is going to ask him why.

The school trustees are made responsible for the success of the meetings to be held at the school houses. Every trustee is urged by the government to get a full attendance of the people of his district at the meeting Sunday afternoon at three o'clock. At that time as many stamps will be sold as possible and pledges taken. The trustees will call another meeting of their people if they see fit. The meeting held Sunday will not be adjourned until each district has been brought up on the sales.

Friday afternoon, June 28 at 2 o'clock there will be a general meeting in Canyon for the purpose of hearing reports from every part of the county. If any district is behind with its quota, steps will be taken to bring up the quota. If any individuals are reported as having not done his part, his case will be examined and he will be reported to the government. The meeting Friday will be patriotic in every sense of the word and there will be a great program for all the people. Every school trustee should urge all of his people to come to Canyon for the meeting.

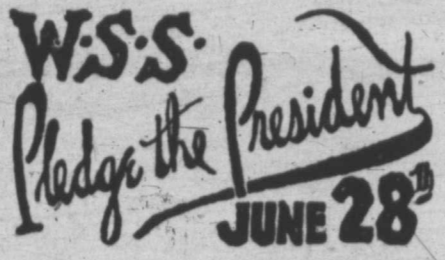

Along the Aisne, south of Albert and west of Serre, the British and Germans are engaged in nightly artillery duels, while spirited activity is noticeable along the French sectors near Montdidier and between Montdidier and the Aisne. The French continue daily to regain ground taken from them in the recent German offensive south of the Aisne and also to take prisoners in their enterprises.

SECOND PRIMARY TO BE HELD IN COUNTY

The county executive committee of the Democratic Party met Monday afternoon for the annual business meeting. Possibly the matter of most importance was that of deciding as to the second primary. The committee voted unanimously that county officers should be elected by majority vote this year, which will cause a second primary to be held in all cases where one candidate does not receive a clear majority of all votes cast in that particular race.

The state legislature provided that second primary should be held in all district and state elections where one candidate did not receive a majority.

The names of the candidates were arranged for the ticket and the costs of the election estimated and divided among the candidates. These costs must be paid by next Monday, June 24 or the candidate's name will not appear on the primary ticket.

Election judges were chosen to hold the primary election and other business disposed of.

No candidate had filed for the office of county attorney, nor any for commissioner of precinct three. J. J. Bauer is commissioner from that precinct at present, and it will be necessary for the voters to write a name on the ticket in order to elect a man from that precinct.

WOMEN MUST REGISTER TO VOTE IN PRIMARY

All women of Texas who wish to vote in the July Democratic Primary Election must register between June 27 and July 12.

The attorney general recently ruled that it was unnecessary for the women in towns of less than 10,000 population to register. However, he has now reversed that opinion and states that all of the women must register if they wish to vote in the July Democratic Primary.

There will be but one registering place in each county—the office of the tax collector. Collector Worth A. Jennings will be ready by Thursday, June 27 for the women to call and register.

Every woman in Randall county will do a very patriotic act by voting in the July Primary. Thousands of good men have been called in to the army. The unfit have been rejected to a great extent. A good governor and a patriotic legislature have enacted laws to protect the men who are training in the camps of Texas. If the women do not vote in order to retain these good officials in office,

the other bunch will elect men who will repeal the state wide prohibition law, will repeal the ten mile zone law, will turn loose upon the camps of Texas as a herd of the vilest men and women in the world.

It is up to the women of Texas to vote and to vote for clean officials.

"This whole war is a frame-up. They've had spies planted in this country and all parts of the world for forty years.

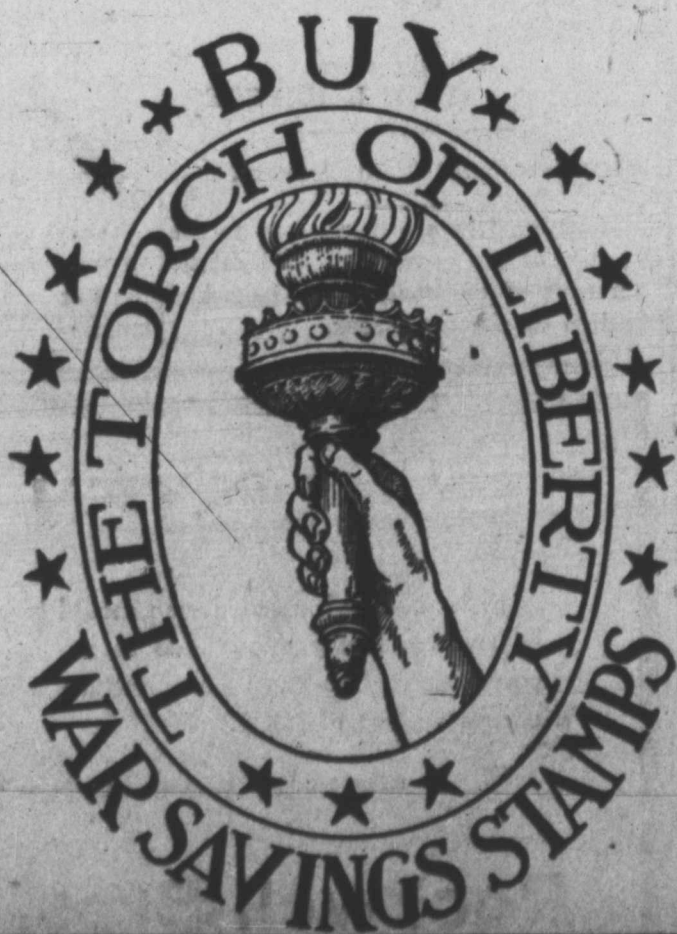
"They are the kind we've got to drag out and skin alive—line up before a firing squad.

The News man has enlisted in the Y. M. C. A. work and has been ordered to report in New York City, July 8th for overseas duty. Eight years ago next month we took charge of the News. During that time we have enjoyed every minute of the stay in Canyon and highly prize the fellowship of the people of Canyon. The paper has grown with Canyon and at all times we have tried to make a newspaper that would properly reflect with honor the town in which it was published. How that has been done is for you to say. We are in the war until it is over. We intend to stay in France as long as there is a demand for Y. M. C. A. work there. We sincerely thank the people of Canyon for the kindnesses of the past eight years and look forward with pleasure to returning to greet you when the war is over.

A telegram was sent from Miami to Claude Kitchen, floor leader of the Democratic party in the House, asking: "Is Congressman Jones considered in full harmony with the administration." The answer came back: "Yes, Congressman Jones is a loyal supporter of the administration and the party organization of the house and is making an absolute stand." That seems to put a crimp in the straw man Crudgington and his bunch have been building up. Put on goggles and you may see most anything. Look only at the faults of men and you may condemn any of them. Look only at the mistakes of men and you become a self centered, egotistical, supercritical, individual that we find in Crudgington. A look on the other side will convince any sane man that Jones has followed the administration, voting for every administration bill, and has measured up to the standard of a full rounded statesman.

The Crudgington headquarters put out a lot of hot air Sunday asking if the people wanted a kind of congressman Claude Kitchen was. Those who read the telegrams in the Amarillo News, which we publish in this edition of the News, will note that Mr. Jackson did not ask Kitchen what he thought of Jones. Kitchen replied that Jones was in full harmony with the administration. Kitchen has not always been in harmony with the administration. He has opposed some of Wilson's measures. Therefore his statement, as floor leader of the demo-

crates of the house, that "Jones is a loyal supporter of the administration," indicates of itself that Jones has not always thought about matters as has Kitchen. But when a man gets to seeing things in the dark as do the Crudgington bunch, you may expect their logic, sense and good judgment to go to smash.

It appears from an article published in the Amarillo News June 9th, that J. W. Crudgington was very much disappointed in the result of his speech at Miami, for he had stated "The date announced for Friday night at Miami had to be postponed due to the inclement weather." The News has an affidavit signed by six substantial citizens of Miami that Mr. Crudgington did speak, but there were not more than twenty five people in the house. We can readily see why Crudgington made it known that he did not speak.

Crudgington denied in his Miami speech that he ever made an anti-pro speech in Amarillo, but admitted that he made a speech against holding an election to vote out the saloons, which were damning the manhood and womanhood of Amarillo. He is like Jim Ferguson. He is a perfect Saint with persecutors on every hand. Crudgington was a good pro and let the saloons run; Jim is a great patriot and would turn loose on the soldier camps of Texas a flood of booze and vile women.

Randall county has never failed to go over the top in any drive the government has asked us to make. Our people are generally supporting the war very liberally. Now the W. S. S. campaign is on. ### Chautauqua in War Time.

(By Dr. Frank Crane.)  
Chautauqua is peculiarly an American institution.

There was never anything like it in Europe or elsewhere. Nobody invented it. It was not devised. It just grew.

Its roots run deep in the American character. They go down to the old Saxon Witenagemot, the New England town meeting and the Methodist camp meeting.

Its idea is that of a free assemblage of a sovereign people, every soul a king, every man looking upon the problems of the world, its governments and its morals, with a disposing eye.

To this is added the greatest of American enthusiasms, education. The American people are always at school. They conceive of education, not as the privilege of the few, but as the duty of the many, not alone for gentlemen and scholars, teachers, and the learned professions, but also for every man, every woman, every child.

So the farmers, merchants, clerks, housewives, laborers, together with the preachers, lawyers and doctors, gather as one great commons, to listen to the discussion of those vast issues that once were the secret themes of kings' cabinets, to discuss, to form intelligent opinion, fearlessly to decide, unafraid to take their part in the councils of democracy.

In war time chautauqua may be of invaluable service. Battles are won not only by the soldiers at the front, but also by the spirit of the people at home. #### Examples of German Kultur.

The following is an extract from an address of the Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis on German atrocities. Dr. Hillis' address is based on authentic documents:

The German philosophy has dehumanized Germany's officers and men. Later on I shall give a detailed account of the devastated regions of Northern France, but here and now let us confine the observations to the ruined villages and towns of Eastern France. Pulling his iron token out of his pocket—the exhibited Deity as a destroying soldier—the German officer and private reads the words beneath: "Smite your enemy dead. The Day of Judgment will not ask you for your reasons." Having, therefore, full liberty to loot, these Germans became the wild beasts. The plan had been "Brussels in one week, Paris in two weeks, London in two months," and then two pockets filled with rings, bracelets and watches from Paris or Nancy for the sweethearts at home.

When the German army in Lorraine was defeated by one-half its number it fell northward, passing through French towns and villages where there were no Frenchmen, no guns, and where no shots were fired. During July and August we went slowly from one ruined town to another, talking with the women and the children, comparing the photographs and the full official records made at the time with the statements of the poor, wretched survivors, who lived in cellars where once there had been beautiful houses, orchards, vineyards—but now was only desolation.

In Gerbevillier, standing besides their graves, I studied the photograph of the bodies of fifteen old men whom the Germans lined up and shot because there were no young soldiers to kill; heard the detailed story of a woman whose son was first hanged to a pear tree in the garden, and when the officer and soldier had left him and were busy setting fire to the next house she cut the rope, revived the strangled youth, only to find the soldiers had returned, and while the officer held her hands behind her back, his assistant poured petrol on the son's head and clothes, set fire to him and, while he staggered about, a flaming torch, they shrieked with laughter. When they had burned all

#### The Ferguson Case Is a Nutshell.

Former Governor Oscar B. Colquitt, in an exhaustive address on the issues of the present gubernatorial campaign at Crockett last Saturday, put the question of Ferguson's impeachment in a nutshell as follows:

"This man Ferguson is going about the state saying that he has been wronged and is appealing to the people of Texas to right that imagined wrong done him by imagined enemies. If Jim Ferguson has failed of justice it was because of his friends that justice was cheated.

"For it was the friends of Ferguson who tried him and convicted him and they did not decide against him until all the evidence was in; until the defendant himself had gone on the witness stand, until they knew from his own lips that the incriminating testimony could not be denied.

"Those state senators were friends of Ferguson. They stuck to him to the last. You cannot tell any man who knows them that they deserted a friend in need. Senator Claude Hudspeth of El Paso, Senator Carlos Bee of San Antonio, Senator John Bailey of Cuero, Senator Paul Page of Bastrop—these are the men whose votes convicted Ferguson; and no man who knows them will say or can say truthfully that any one of them ever in his life deserted a friend.

"These men hoped till the last that Governor Ferguson would go on the stand and clear up these matters; that he would controvert the evidence which painted him so black; that he would prove himself innocent—and they did not give up hope till he went on the stand and by his own testimony proved to them that he was guilty of malfeasance and the misappropriation of the public funds which were charged against him. And then when he had convicted himself of the charges against him in spite of the hopes and the prayers of these men, they went to him and told him that they could not escape their obligation under the oaths they had taken and under the testimony he had given.

"It was not the university crowd which convicted Ferguson. It was not any political crowd which convicted Ferguson. It was not his enemies who convicted Ferguson. That man today owes his downfall in Texas to his own acts."—Ft. Worth Star Telegram.

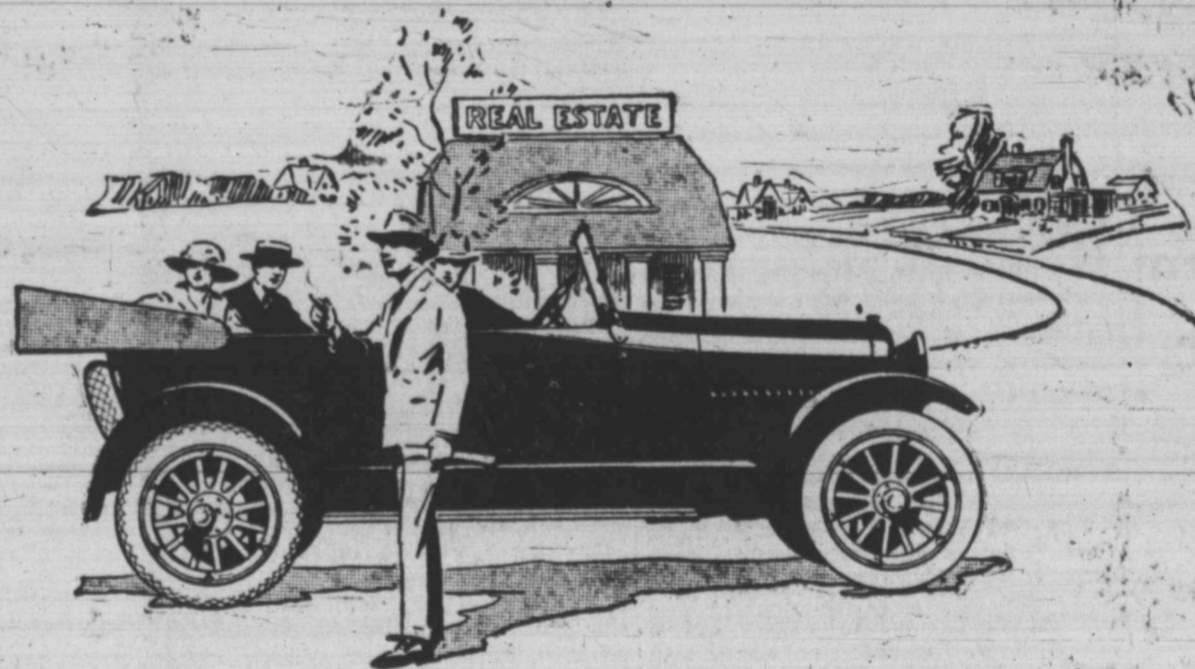

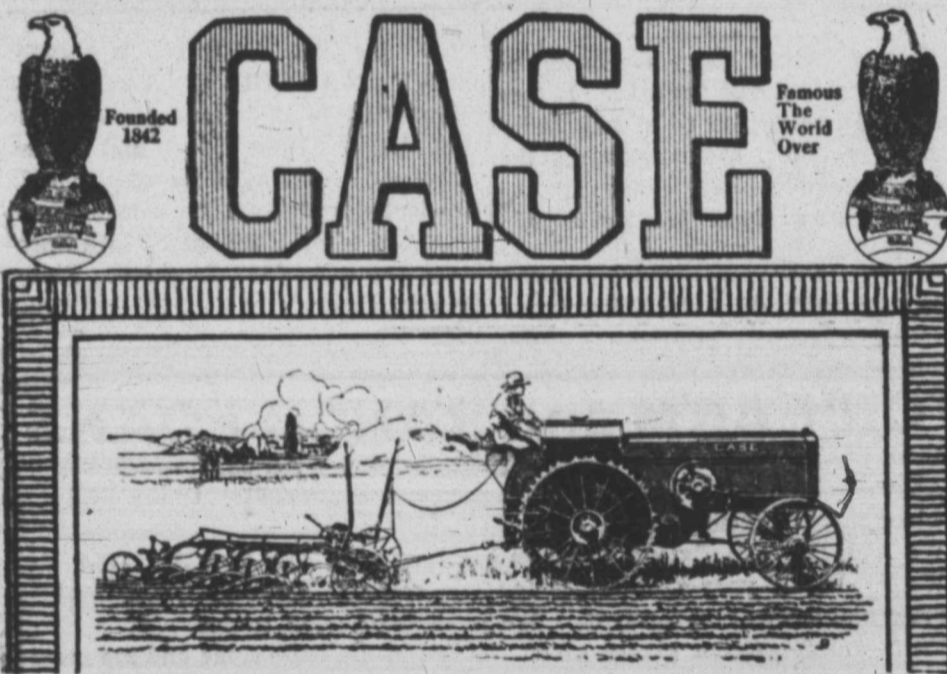

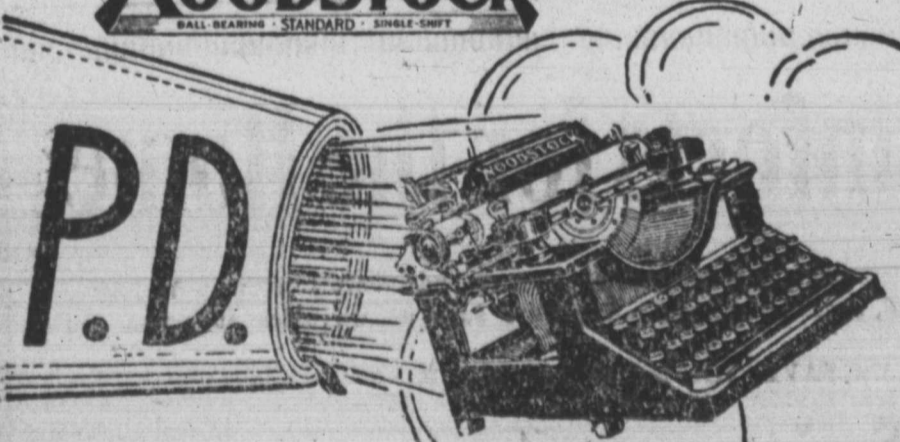

#### WHAT IS A W. S. S.

Too many people seem to think that Thrift and War Savings Stamps are for children. They are for children from one day to 100 years old. All over one hundred years old in Randall county need not buy. All others in Randall county are expected to buy. All in Randall county between one day and 100 years who do not buy will be looked upon by the government as slackers.

To begin with Thrift Stamps are in 25 cents values only. They may be bought at thirty places in Canyon. They pay no interest, but are issued as a saving proposition. When the holders gets 16 of these Thrift Stamps, he may exchange them for a War Savings Stamp, but paying a little money—which is 17 cents this month.

A War Savings Stamp bears 4 per cent interest compounded quarterly. On January 1, 1923, each War Savings Stamp will be worth \$5.00 and the government will pay the holder that much when presented.

No person may own more than \$1000 worth of War Savings Stamps. They may be cashed in at any time, only ten day's notice being necessary at the postoffice in order to get the money.

Every man, woman and child in the United States must have \$20.00 of these stamps by January 1, 1919.

The campaign will be closed June 28, and each person is to have paid in at least half of his quota by that time, and signed up for the remainder of his quota to be taken at a definite time.

Stamps may be registered at the local postoffice. By doing this the government becomes responsible for their safety, as only the owner may collect them and at the specified post-office.
