FEEDING SOLDIERS

MESS OFFICER OF THE VESSEL MUST PROVIDE 210,000 MEALS AT SEA.

SOME OF THE 180 VARIETIES

Money Instead of Merchandise Should Be Sent to the Troops in France-Dental Corps Can Care for 5,000,000

An account of how soldiers are fed at sea is given in the daily newspaper published on a transport:

"Outside of providing 210,000 meals at sea, the mess officer of the ship has very little to do. Very little.

"He is only called upon to provide, by the regulations, 180 different varieties of food. That's all. Every try And those the Zeppelins didn't get to order 180 different things to eat? Yet this is the authentic list.

"The food needed to feed several thousand men at sea ranges beyond the glutton's dreams. "And if this doesn't suit, you can bump along into 49,324 pounds of po-7,800 pounds of butter; 9,200 pounds of sugar, and 61,500 pounds of flour.

"If you can't get a meal out of this you can fall back on 4,600 pounds of sausage, 3,000 pounds of sauerkraut, 26,000 pounds of apples, 19,800 pounds of oranges, and 4,200 pounds of onlons. And this leaves out 1,600 pounds of jam and 9,400 pounds of-lima and navy

> The question of the shipment of parcels to France first came to the attention of the war department when the commanding general of the expeditionary forces cabled that congestion of such articles had reached such a point that French railroads were unable to handle the load. A board appointed by the-secretary of war and the postmaster general examined 5,000 sacks of parcel-post mail, and found that the articles being sent not only, in the main, were absolutely unnecessary, but undesirable. The investigation showed that the amount of such mail had reached a total of 500,000 pounds a week, and was steadily increasing.

Relatives and friends, according to a recent statement by the war department, will find they often can do a greater service to soldiers by sending them money for the purchase of articles. Tobacco is now being supplied as part of the army rations, and merchandise of nearly all kinds may now be purchased in France through the huge general store established by the quartermaster corps at lower prices than charged by retailers here.

The dental requirements of an army of more than 5,000,000 men can now be met by the present force of the dental corps of the United States army. Examinations have been closed and no further additions will be made to the corps for some time. The number of dental officers has expanded since war was declared from 58 to 5,810. Commissions were offered to 5,467 dentists in all parts of the country, and all but 271 were accepted.

The average number of tooth fillings in the army ranges from 225,000 to 250,000 a month. Special dental infirmaries have been established in the camps and cantonments, to which newly inducted soldiers are sent for examination shortly after arrival in

the camps. A school for dental instruction has been established, where 85 officers are assigned each month to take the two months' course.

The box-car situation is better at present than it has been at any time during the last three years, according to advice received by the department of agriculture from the railroad administration.

On May 1 box cars began to move into wheat territory, and wheat-carrying roads are expected to have on their lines more than the normal amount of cars owned by them. Cars are being parked in wheat-loading territory, which was impossible last year. The railroad administration will continue to move cars into wheat districts as long as there is any indication that additional cars will be

TEMPLETON REPLIES TO BELL

This is the second time my opponent, Mr. W. S. Bell, has felt it necessary to rush into print to explain his changed position on the Ferguson question, and, being a banker, by liberal use of his bank roll, is consuming considerable space in the daily and weekly press of this district, in a desperate Eleventh-hour attempt to cover up his wobbling position on this important issue, in order to win this election. The truth about Mr. Bell's record is out in "Black and White" and the people know it, and no lavish use of money, or spasmodic write-up in the press can cover up his

In the first place Mr. Bell knows and the voters of this district know that I have conducted a clean campaign, based solely upon my merits without any reference to Mr. Bell, except as to his admitted position on the Ferguson question and that neither he, nor any other voter that I have canvassed have heard a word from me reflecting upon his boasted reputation. Mr. Bell in this article as in his personal canvass is the one who is guilty of trying to besmirch the reputation of his opponent in order to win this election, and up to now. I have refrained from replying.

Now, Mr. Bell, let us get this record straight so that the people will know your position on this Ferguson question. You participated in the impeachment proceedings and heard the trial, and knew as much then as you do now. Early in the campaign before either of us had done much campaigning, Judge R. W. Hall, Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo, addressed a letter to both Mr. Bell and myself, asking us to declare our position on the Ferguson question. I repled by return mail saying that I would not vote to seat Mr. Ferguson, if it cost me every vote in the District, but Mr. Bell has not answered that important letter o this good hour. This Mr. Bell will not deny, and can be verified by referring to Judge

While canvassing the District Mr. Bell told me, as he admits he told others, that he would vote to seat Mr. Ferguson, if elected. After canvassing the Panhandle part of this district, and ascertaining the sentiment of the people on this question, on June 26th, just one month before the election, for the first time, made public his change of Faith on this important question, and in that letter makes this admission:

"I FIRST THOUGHT THAT SHOULD MR. FERGUSON RE-CEIVE A MAJORITY OF THE VOTES IN THE DEMOCRATIC PRI-MARY IT WOUD BE MY DUTY AS A LOYAL DEMOCRAT TO SUPPORT HIM: BUT UPON MORE MATURE DELIBERATION I HAVE REACHED THE CONCLUSION THAT THIS IS NOT THE PROPER TEST."

Mr. Bell admits writing this letter and can't deny sending it over the district to the Hobby Clubs, where a copy can be read. The above is the paragraph copied and complained of by Mr. Bell, and he cannot say it is not copied correctly. The only reference made to Mr. Bell in the leaflet is that he had changed his position on the Ferguson question, and I refer all voters to this leaflet in verification of this statement. Mr. Bell has plead guilty in this last published statement issued on July 15th, just twelve days before election, to more than I have charged him with. In this he admits as follows:

"During the EARLY PART OF THE CAMPAIGN I was not sure that the impeachment of Mr. Ferguson disqualified him from holding the office under the provisions of the Constitution, AND I FRANKLY SAID THAT IF MR. FERGUSON WAS ELECTED AND I SHOULD BE A MEMBER OF THE SENATE THAT I WOULD VOTE TO SEAT HIM, unless prohibited by the Constitution."

I ask all voters of the district to read my leaflet and see if this admission is not stroger than my statement. He pleads guilty to all we have charged him with and like Ferguson, stands convicted by his own admission, which he cannot deny in his first confession of change of faith on June 26th, Mr. Bell does not use the phrase "unless prohibited by the constitution," but uses this for the first time in his July 15th "blow hard" statement to the press. Of course, this is only an aftermath invention of Mr. Bell's in order to try to further cover up and camouflage the people on his dubious position on the Ferguson

It is on this last invented phrase that Mr. Bell makes his loud charges of false representation. Now Mr. Bell knows and every man knows he told while making his first campaign over the district that he would vote to seat Mr. Ferguson, that this phrase "unless prohibited by the Constitution" was not used by Mr. Bell, and this is a mighty weak straw to hide behind when caught cold-handed. Now, Mr. Bell heard this constitutional question discussed at the time of the trial by the ablest lawyers of the state and was a member of the legislature that impeached him, and that it took him until June 26th, just one month before election to get his mind straight on his imporant question, is mere tommy-rot and the intelligent people of this district will not accept such explanation for dodging this issue so long. The facts are that Mr. Bell was astraddle of the fence, trying to ride into office on both the Ferguson and Hobby votes, and by trying to play both both parties too long, has lost both votes. 



The Food Administration issues the The president's proclamation of May

14, requiring the licensing of those en- stock to pasture elsewhere or send Come to Canyon to Live. gaged in certain lines of business, including "operators of poultry and egg packing plants not already licensed by the United States Food Administration," has been misunderstood by some of those affected.

Under this classification anyone who sells poultry or eggs in any other way than at retail to the consumer, regardless of the amount of business done, must be licensed.

There are many country storekeepers whose business is mostly retail selling, but who buy eggs and sometimes poultry from the farmers. They have never considered themselves as operators of poultry and egg packing plants, but, in reality, that is what they are. The fact that they are in the retail business on too small a scale to require a retailer's license does not exclude them.



Fresh Beef Travels on a Rapid Schedule

Fresh beef for domestic markets goes from stockyards to retail stores within a period of about two weeks. Although chilled, this meat is not frozen; hence it cannot be stored for a rise in price.

A steer is dressed usually within twenty-four hours after purchase by the packer. The beef is held in a cooler at the packing house, at a temperature a little above freezing, for about three days.

It is then loaded into a refrigerator car where a similar temperature is maintained, and is in transit to market on an average of about six days.

Upon arrival at the branch distributing house, it is unloaded into a "cooler", and placed on sale.

Swift & Company requires all beef to be sold during the week of arrival, and the average of sales is within five days.

Any delay along the above journey means deterioration in the meat and loss to the packer.

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

Coming down to the actual details of the work of the food administration, Mr. Peden said that it had very much stabilized and lowered prices since being inaugurated, and he thanked the heads of Chambers of Commerce throughout Texas for the aid they had rendered him in his task of applying

the food laws to the State. "When the order first came to get busy," he said, "I spent considerable time trying to figure out just who to ask to help me out in this big work for Uncle Sam. After eliminating various classes of people in many vocations, I finally decided that it was the commercial secretaries of the State who could probably lend me the most aid. For I wanted aid that would be persistent, permanent, and that would not grow weary after a short time. Besides they were men trained to deal with the public. As a consequence most of you commercial secretaries are either county or district administrators, and I have not been disappointed in one of you."

He urged the necessity of the public paying more attention—as well as the merchants-to the rules of the price interpreting committee.

"You should take scissors or a knife and cut them out whenever they are printed, and carry them with you when you go shopping. These prices are based on good, fair returns to the merchant, and they should be absolutely insisted upon.

"While Texas has been a banner State, so far as the conservation of wheat and other food products is concerned, I hand the greatest amount of credit to the people themselves, who have done it by their loyalty to the cause. There, of course, have been a few who have been disloyal, but these very few have been punished-and rightly-in order that one man might not profit because all his neighbors wanted to help win the war.

"In some instances I have observed cases of men who have grown discouraged over one thing or another-or over a blue outlook for their businesses. And I always say to them: Brace up-if the kaiser could see you now it would please him. That's just what he wants to see-discouragement.' And in every case these men have gone back with their teeth set to do bigger, better, harder, more persistent work


