Without some support price on cotton seed we fear that the price to the grower might reach a very low figure. This could happen despite the fact that soy beans and butter would be supported 90% because the seed are marketed in about a 60 day period and since most of the oil mills have to control the cotton seed oil and other products on the seed as received this would tend to bear the markets down to an unreasonable level, whereas, if we have a support or floor the mills can market over several months period thereby preventing the disastrous prices to the growers.

We thereby urge and request you as President of the Texas Farm Bureau to give us as members of the Legislative Committee of District II Farm Bureau your full and whole-hearted cooperation in this matter.

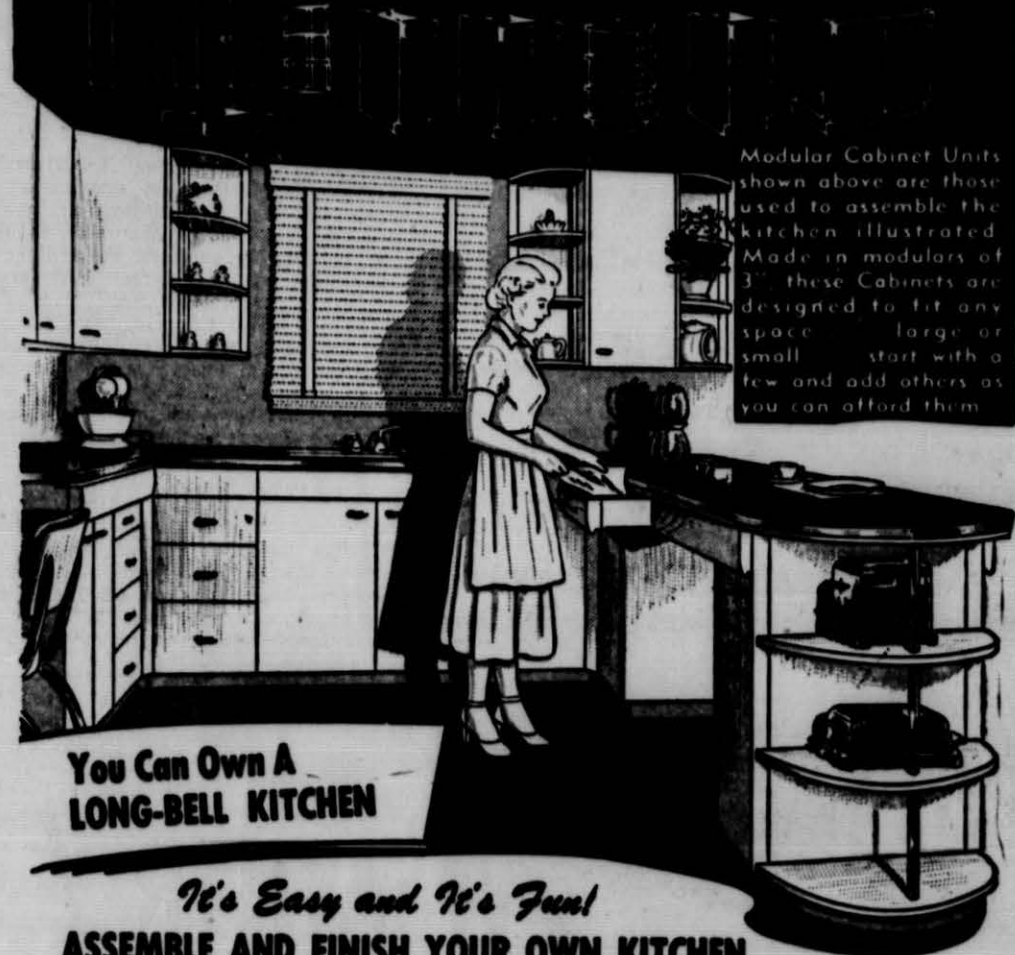
