

LLIED COUNCIL OF FOUR SENDS REPLY TO COMMUNICATION FROM GERMAN ENVOYS .

Paris.-The council of four has devon Brockdorff-Rantzau, chief of the German peace mission, relative to international labor legislation. In a note sent to the German delegation M. Clemenceau, president of the peace conference, says "that the allied and associated governments are of the opinion that their decisious give satisfaction to the anxiety which the German delegate professes for social justice, and insure the realizing of reforms which the working classes have more than ever a right to expect after the cruel trial to which the world has been subjected during the last five years."

Berlin.-The declaration by Chancellor Scheidemann in the national asembly that the peace terms were "unacceptable," brought the members of the assembly, the spectators and those in the press gallery to their feet in a hurricane of cheers and applauso.

The chancellor reached the climax of his statement on the peace terms a few minutes after he began, He paused in his address and then thundered out the word which announced the German government's rejection of the Versailles conditions.

"This treaty," he said, "is in the view of the Imperial government, unacceptable, so unacceptable I am unable to believe that this earth could fair financial return. bear such a document without a cry issuing from millions of throats in all lands, without distinction of party. If there ever was any doubt as to the relative value of history in the is a disease apparently identical with the hands of the Wellington Commerschool curriculum, certainly such doubt has been removed by the World toes or calluses from the bottom of feet, War. The history being made and interpreted properly only in the light of the past. Historical events do not take place singly today which affect small localities, or even the life has been true of the past. The world today is living very close together in one great neighborhood and its people think and act in terms of each other's welfare, or in terms of each black stem rust in this country. other's detriment. The degree to which they will think and act in each other's interests will be determined

largely by their relations in the past. Thus the World War by forcing the nations closer together has made his tory more real and more important. It is no longer a dry mass of facts, static and without life, but to thte child it has become a real, living, moving subject and he finds himself in an environment in which he can re-live t easier than ever before. It be comes easy and interesting now for him to see why the early Grecian peoples made repeated attempts to form a league of the city-states in Greece, why Rome attempted to maintain her mastery of the world, why nationalism has failed to keep the world at peace, and why the nations are still attempting to form some sort of unity that will insure peace and security in

the future. Not only is history more easily understood and interpreted as a result of the war, not only has it been made more real, but it has aroused a new interest in the past, not for the past's sake to be sure, but because it is here that an explanation of the present is to be found. The past has a new meaning for the child that it did not have before. His attitude toward his immediate environment is changed from a passive to an inquiring mind. He sees a man of his own acquaintance brought before the courts for trial and sees justice meted out to him by his fellow citizens. If he has merely a high school knowledge of history he traces this back to the habeas corpus act of the seventeenth century. He begins to inquire into his own town, city, or county government and he is at once led back to the local colonial governments of America, and to the county and municipal governments in England and on the Continent during the Modern and Mediaeval periods. And so it is with all of the institutions with which he is surrounded. Through the avenues of the past the present begins to have a new, a broader, and a deeper meaning. The child is thus led to see that he is not only a part of his immediate surroundings, but also that his group is one that goes to make



Starting A Dairy Herd With Calves. Young calves from good dairy cows are a satisfactory foundation for starting a dairy herd, in the opinion specialists. Ordinarily the method advanced is to grade up common cows with a pure-bred bull, requiring a number of years or patient selections and breeding-a period sometimes discouraging farmers, who want results too quickly, to change breeds.

It is expensive to buy mature dairy cows that are free from disease, that have good breeding and show desirable productive ability. Often, especially in new dairy sections, a farmer buys nature stock without being properly prepared to care for ft, and many discouragements follow. To a great extent most of this difficulty can be avoided by buying good grade heifer calves from herds of well-established milk production. In some dairy regions it is a sommon practice to sell the heifer calves for veal. These calves, while only grades, are usually from good producing ancestors, and carry a productive ability much greater than com-

The buying of such calves to start dairy herds has been tried in several states with excellent results. course, the cost of small calves is much less than mature animals, and the danger of disease is also greatly Tessened. In general shipping is simpler. Calves may te shipped by express at from two to four weeks of age, depending upon the distance, with good results if they are proper ly cared for upon arrical.



Produce Infertile Eggs

Poultry exparts in a position to know whereof they speak estimate that \$15,000,000 are lost annually because of the production of fertile eggs during the summer months.

Fertile eggs will not keep in warm weather at a temperature above 60 degrees, and few : le in the rural districts are in a position to keep thir eggs below this temperature. Infertile eggs will keep for about two weeks in edible condition, which gives time to gather the eggs and get them to market.

Furthermore, during the spring and summer when eggs are plentiful it is customary to eat eggs morning, noon and night until one can scarcely stand the sight of an egg, simply because they are plentiful and may spoil.

It would be much better to save these eggs for use when the hens are not laying so plentifully, at which time eggs are at a premium.

This may be done by producing infertile eggs. Drive the rooster from the flock. This will not interfere with the production of eggs. In fact expert poultrymen seem to feel that it helps the production. Kill the scrub roosters, and isolate the pure breds until fall. Do not place them in a small pen, but rather in a roomy, hady enclosure, where they may get plenty of exercise, grass and insects Eggs may be preserved in water

glass and used during the winter.


