**WORLD WAR ENDED;  
PEACE TREATY SIGNED**

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY AT ACCEPTANCE OF TREATY—ENDS GREATEST CONFLICT.

**WILSON AFFIXES SIGNATURE**

German Empire Ends Where it Began; Peace Delegates Sign Death Warrant at Versailles.

Versailles.—Germany and the allied and associated powers signed the peace terms here Saturday in the same imperial palace where the Germans humbled the French so ignominiously forty-eight years ago.

This formally ended the world war which lasted just thirty-seven days less than five years.

Saturday was the fifth anniversary of the murder of Archduke Francis Ferdinand at Sarajevo.

The ceremony of signing the peace terms was brief. Premier Clemenceau called the session to order in the hall of mirrors of the chateau of Versailles at 3:10 o'clock.

The signing began when Dr. Hermann Mueller and Johannes Bell, the German signatories, affixed their names. Herr Mueller signed at 3:12 o'clock and Herr Bell at 3:13 o'clock.

President Wilson, first of the allied delegates signed a minute later. At 3:45 o'clock the momentous session was concluded.

All the diplomats and members of their parties wore conventional civilian clothes.

There were present grizzled French veterans of the Franco-Prussian war. They replaced the Prussian guardsmen of the ceremony of 1871 and the Frenchmen watched the ceremony with grim satisfaction. The conditions exacted then were exactly reversed. On this occasion the disciples of Bismark sat in the seats of the lowly while the white marble statue of Minerva, goddess of war looked on. Three incidents were emphasized by the smoothness with which the ceremony was conducted. The first of these was the failure of the Chinese delegation to sign.

The second was the protest submitted by General Jan Christian Smuts, who declared the peace unsatisfactory.

The third, unknown to the general public, came from the Germans. When the program for the ceremony was shown to the German delegation Herr von Halmhausen of the German delegation, went to Colonel Henry, liaison officer, and protested. He said:

"We cannot admit that the German delegates should enter the hall by a different door than the entente delegates; nor that military honors should be withheld. Had we known there would be such arrangements before the delegates would not have come."

After a conference with the French foreign ministry it was decided as a compromise to render military honors as the Germans left. Otherwise the program was not changed.

Versailles, France.—The German empire has ended where it was founded. The mightiest military power the world has ever known has been shattered and humbled almost to the point of impotency.

Within the magnificent palace which in itself was erected as a symbol of the divine rights of kings, and which in the present century was rededicated to that conception by the war lords of Prussia, the democracies of the earth have foregathered and pronounced the verdict.

During the two hundred and fifty-odd years which have intervened since the erection of the famous palace of Versailles civilization has traversed a long and uncertain route, but the scene itself, which has figured so conspicuously in history and cut such a deep impression to the heart of France, is little changed in outward appearance.

**Germany Would Strike Poland.**

Warsaw.—Germany is planning to give to Poland a blow at the earliest possible date. Germany means to hit Poland so hard that its new strength will be knocked out and all chances of its rivaling Prussia in importance will end. It means to entice Poland into attacking first so it can have a seeming clear record before the allied powers and to that end is trying its best to provoke the Polish troops in and around Posen to attack.

**Czecho-Slovak Flag Flies From Capitol**  
Austin, Texas.—The Czecho-Slovak flag flew from the mast of the Texas state capitol and also from the federal building. The display of the flag was in observance of Czecho-Slovak tag day.

**Continued Rains Endanger Wheat.**  
Dallas.—The continuous rains have seriously hindered the threshing of wheat in Dallas county and there is great danger of the wheat sprouting in the shock if the rains continue.

**Dirigible to Make Flight.**  
Washington.—The British dirigible, R-34 is expected to arrive in the United States on July 5 or 6 on a round-trip flight across the Atlantic to be undertaken by a lighter-than-air craft.

**Will Not Buy Goodnight Ranch.**  
Representative Lee Satterwhite says:

It is not at all probable that the Goodnight ranch will be bought by the State at this time. Col. Goodnight has recently leased the mineral rights of the ranch to private parties and he has organized an oil company and is now about ready to begin the drilling of a well. In offering to sell his ranch and buffalo herd to the State he wishes to retain the mineral rights and this would not suit the state. At the regular session of the Legislature in the winter it was proposed to buy this ranch, with its magnificent herd of buffalo, and establish a Panhandle breeding and feeding station, to be placed under the management and control of the A. & M. College. There was a strong sentiment in the Legislature and throughout the State favoring the proposition and Col Goodnight proposed to make the sale, but oil prospects have changed the situation and there is little probability that the State will buy the property now.

## AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE OF AMERICA

PRESIDENT WILSON ASKS THAT LEAGUE COVENANT BE ACCEPTED WITHOUT CHANGE.

Washington.—President Wilson, in an address to the American people on the occasion of the signing of the peace treaty, made a plea for the acceptance of the league of nations and the covenant of the league of nations without change or reservation. His message, given out here by Secretary Tumulty, said:

"My Fellow Countrymen: The treaty of peace has been signed. If it is ratified and acted upon in full and sincere execution of its terms, it will furnish the charter for a new order of affairs in the world. It is a severe treaty in the duties and penalties it imposed upon Germany, but it is severe only because great wrongs done by Germany are to be righted and repaired; it imposes nothing that Germany can not do; and she can regain her rightful standing in the world by the prompt and honorable fulfillment of its terms.

"And it is much more than a treaty of peace with Germany. It liberates great peoples who have never before been able to find the way to liberty. It ends, once for all, an old and intolerable order under which small groups of selfish men could use the peoples of great empires to serve their ambition for power and dominion. It associates the free governments of the world in a permanent league in which they are pledged to use their limited power to maintain peace by maintaining sanctions. It does away with the right of conquest and rejects the policy of annexation and substitutes a new order under which backward nations—populations which have not yet come to political consciousness and peoples who are ready for independence, but not yet quite prepared to dispense with protection and guidance—shall no more be subjected to the domination and exploitation of a stronger nation, but shall be put under the friendly direction and afforded the helpful direction of governments which undertake to be responsible to the opinion of mankind in the execution of their task by accepting the direction of the league of nations. It recognizes the inalienable rights of nationality; the rights of minorities and the sanctity of religious belief and practice. It lays the basis for conventions which shall free the commercial intercourse of the world from unjust and vexatious restrictions and for every sort of international co-operation that will serve to cleanse the life of the world and facilitate its common action in beneficent service of every kind. It furnishes guarantees such as were never given or even contemplated for the fair treatment of all who labor at the daily tasks of the world.

"It is for this reason that I have spoken of it as a great charter for a new order of affairs. There is ground here for deep satisfaction, universal reassurance, and confident hope.

"WOODROW WILSON."

GERMAN PAPERS SAY "SCRAP OF PAPER"

"Vengeance for the Disgrace of 1919" Is Call Sounded by Berlin Paper.

Berlin.—The Pan-German Deutsche Zeitung prints the following across its front page:

"German honor will be carried to its grave in the hall of mirrors, in which, in the glorious year of '71 the German empire was resurrected in all its former splendor. Let us forget! In restless labor the German people will again strive to attain that place among the nations of the world to which it is entitled. The vengeance for the disgrace of 1919!"

The Tageblatt says:

"The German people reject the treaty which its delegates have signed, and it does not believe for a single moment that it will endure. Despite the fact that it is written on parchment, it remains a scrap of paper, because it is mockery of all the laws of reason and morals and the most disgraceful exhibit in the museum of civilization."

\$272,955 Disbursed in Drouth Relief. Austin, Texas.—In a report submitted to Governor Hobby showing administration of the drouth relief fund F. C. Weinert, administrator, shows total receipts of \$277,486.05, of which \$272,955.63 has been allotted and paid to seventy-three counties, leaving a balance on hand of \$4,530.42, which is deposited in four Austin banks.

Whitney Wins Title for Fifth Time. New Orleans, La.—Nelson Whitney of New Orleans for the fifth time won the southern golf championship by defeating Louis Jacoby of Dallas here.

Increase in Shipping Board's Fund. Washington.—Increase in the shipping board fund from \$276,000,000 to \$491,000,000 for completion of the government's authorized shipbuilding program is approved by the senate.

Reply of Daylight Saving Law. Washington.—Final approval is given by congress to repeal of the daylight saving law in the adoption of the conference report on the annual agricultural appropriation bill to which the repeal measure is attached.

The court bound Evans over to the grand jury under a bond of \$500. All of the men are employed in the Denver shops and all have heretofore borne good reputations.—Childress Post.

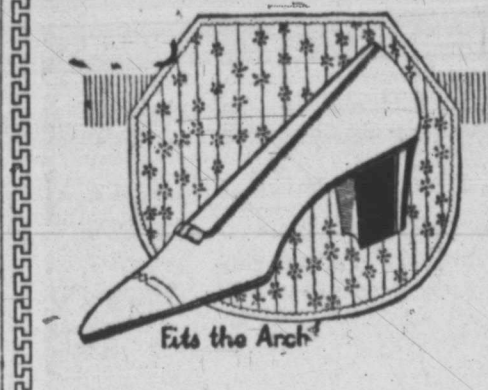

General Pershing has stated he is not seeking political position. When we heard him speak in France this spring to the men of the 79th division, Pershing's words were interpreted by ninety percent of the men as a feeler for political preferment. But the doughboy is not strong for Pershing. Neither are the officers. The bunch who went to France came home decidedly opposed to a military hero being elected president on any party's ticket. General Wood is supposed to be fishing for the republican nomination next spring. Frank Hitchcock came over to France this spring to feel out the situation. If he heard well, as he usually does, Wood will not get much of a start.

The United States went dry on the first of July. Thus the realization of dreams in the minds of the pro forces years ago has come true. It is rumored President Wilson will release the country from prohibition after demobilization is completed. But real national prohibition begins next January. We explained this fact to an old Frenchman and his wife one day while hiking about France. There is no danger of a great immigration from France into the United States from among the old people.

Those opposed to prohibition in the U. S. are going to colonize Mexico where they can have all the booze they want. Won't they have one beautiful time; first Carranza, then Villa? Why not try Germany or France? The Mexicans might get American civilization and vote out booze, but over there water is only used for bathing purposes.

The fellow who has no job can offer no excuse now. The farmers are almost willing to kidnap men in order to get help. But we always have a select few who refuse to work and would be worthless once kidnaped.

July 14th a special election is called in this state senatorial district to elect a man to fill the vacancy caused by the murder of Senator W. S. Bell last week. A number of men have signified their intention of making the race—R. L. Templeton of Wellington, W. H. Bledsoe of Lubbock, J. C. Marshall of Hardeman and W. D. Cope of Childress.

The sale of War Savings Stamps has fallen off very materially in the past few months. The people are not paying so much attention to saving as they did during the war. This is a bad sign. America was noted for her wastefulness before the war. Evidently we were not long enough in the struggle for our nation to be cured of the evil.

The Germans are much worried for fear their dear poor kaiser may get his neck cracked, as he should. First they protested against this clause in the treaty, and now von Bethmann-Hollweg takes all of the blame and wants to be tried for the kaiser. Easy enough. Hang 'em both.

While in Paris we visited the Hall of Mirrors at Versailles where the treaty of peace was signed last Saturday, and saw and laid hands upon the table that was used. There were too many guards around to knock off a chunk of it for a souvenir.

The U. S. senate will ratify the peace treaty as it was written in Paris. There may be a handful of senators who would make us the laughing stock of the world, but a majority of our senators really have good sense.

More people are going to come to the Panhandle this year than ever before. Our land is cheap. Our crops are among the best. Randall county dirt is going to worth as much as any state's land one of these days.

In signing the peace treaty the German delegates were chagrined that they were not accorded military honors. Its too bad they were not given the same dose the French had in 1870.

There will be a big time in Canyon tomorrow. Every citizen is expected to be here to greet the boys who fought for Uncle Sam.

C. college was here yesterday putting the facts before the people concerning the repeal of the county agent appropriation which the Texas Crain Dealers Association is pushing. The dealers are attempting to have the appropriation repealed and the county agents done away with because the agents have been working to get feed placed to the farmer and stockman at lower prices than they have been handling it for. The farmers of Randall county are strong for the county agent. During the past winter many thousands of dollars were saved the stockmen of this county on cake and hay, which the county agent located in other sections and had shipped here as much as \$10 per ton was saved on hay. On part of the cake even a greater saving was made through the county agent. The assistance the agent has been able to give in vaccination has been worth thousands of dollars to the farmers of Randall county. All of this service costs the farmer very little as he works in three counties. Randall county ought to have an agent working in our territory alone all of the time.

Report comes to the authorities that a few young men and boys are indulging in vulgar remarks to young women passing along the street to the extent that some young women have left the Normal rather than undergo this humiliation. So far the identity of the boys is unknown. When discovered, as soon they must be, a bunch of these young upstarts will find themselves on the way to a reformatory. It is unfortunate that every town has this class of boys. Canyon is not going to put up with such business. If these lads can't be gentlemanly to the hundreds of young women who come here for the school, the people of Canyon will see that they are put in a place where their conduct will be under control. This is published as a warning that the officials are after the boys and that the feelings of no parent will be spared should his boy be the guilty party.

The state legislature has ratified the suffrage constitutional amendment. The women will no doubt have a vote in next year's presidential election. And right that they should.

It is reported from Austin that fire rates are to be reduced in all incorporated towns. Thus we find July ushering two swats at the h. c. of l. Lower postage and lower fire rates.

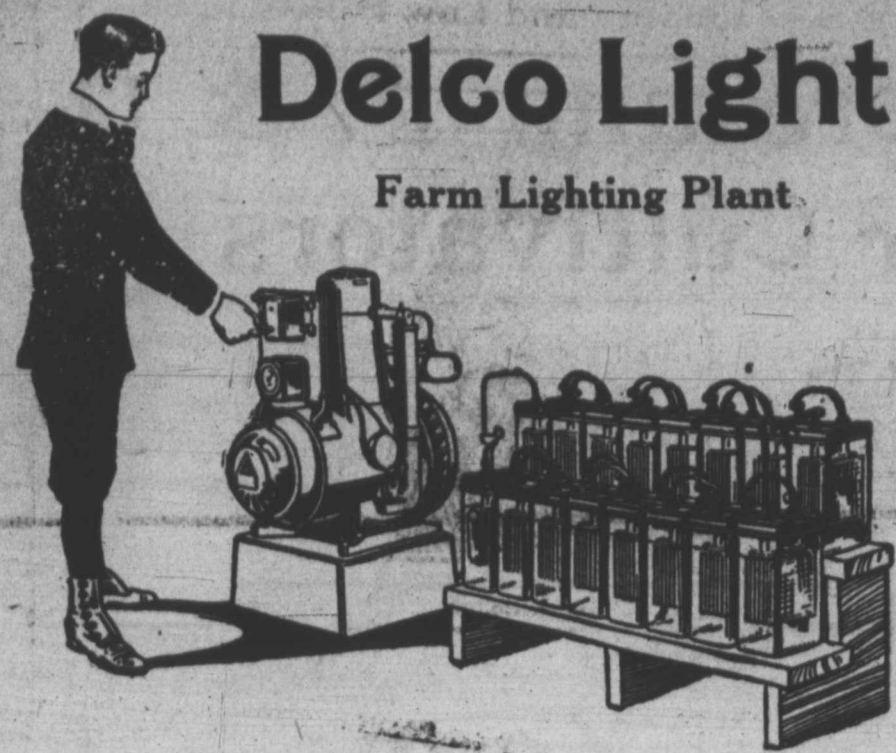

### WE HAVE IMPROVED OUR SWINE

(By W. J. Carmichael in The Swine World)

The present day-hog is of ancient lineage and has a heterogeneous collection of relatives, none of which have been domesticated and improved to the extent shown in modern swine. The wild boar, the immediate ancestor of the hog of today, has his characteristics shown to a remarkable extent in the so-called razor-back hog which is found growing wild in the Ozarks and other sections of continental United States and in some of our insular possessions. This type is a poor meat animal. The pigs usually come in small litters, have longitudinal stripes on their back and sides and show many of the characteristics of other "wild" animals. Mature specimens of both sexes are undersized as compared with those in domesticated herds, are thin in flesh, and agile and fleet of foot.

There are numerous relatives of the American hog which can be found in various sections of the world today. Among them are the Collared peccary, frequently spoken of as "Javelina" in southwestern United States; the White-Lipped peccary, found in British Honduras and Paraguay; the "Cuino," which is very popular in some sections of Mexico; the pigmy hog of the Himalayan foothills, a dwarf which seldom attains a height of over twelve inches; the Bakong hog of Austria-Hungary; the masked pig of Japan, which is characterized by the immense folds or wrinkles of skin about the face and neck; the thorny pig of the mountain, which is a small, ferocious, heavy-tusked hog found in Carpathia and Transylvania; the gray bush pig, and the red bush pig or river hog of the continent of Africa, also found in Oceania and Madagascar; and the wart hog, of Abyssini, with its three warty protuberances just below the eyes. A few of these types are of considerable local importance, but none are of very great consequence in general commerce.

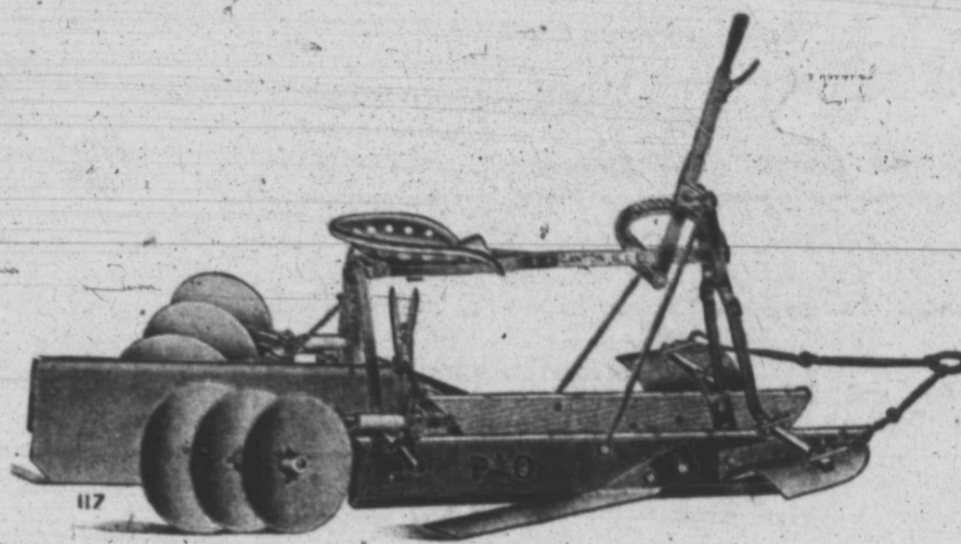
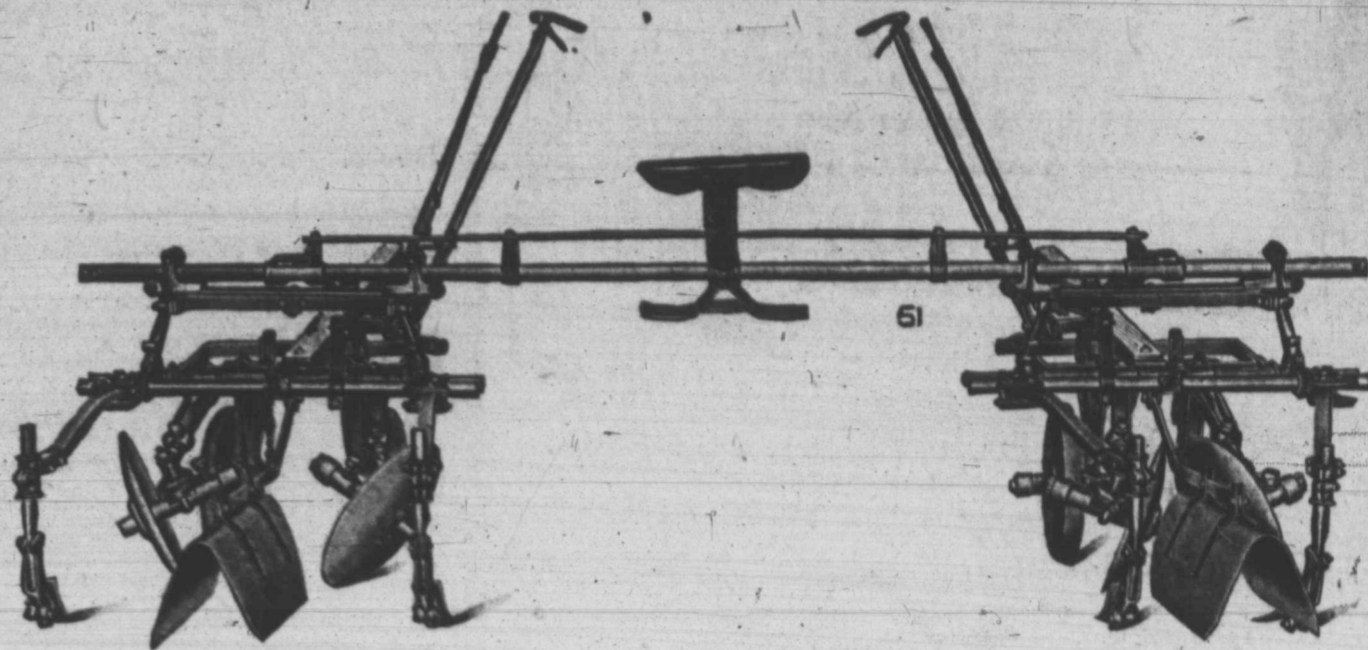
Doubtless nearly everyone has read or heard of the story of the first eating of pork, as related by Charles and Mary Lamb, in one of the essays of Elia, entitled "Dissertation on Roast Pig." From this it seems that the "home fire burning" was of greater importance to the growth and development of the swine industry than the famous lantern episode with Mrs. O'Leary's cow was to the reconstruction in Chicago.

In other early literature we find in a book on "Cheap and Good Husbandry," printed in England in 1631—some philosophy applicable to many conditions under which swine are produced today. In Chapter I of the book cited, John Harrison says, "of swine": Altho Swine are accepted troublesome, noisome, unruly and great ravenours, as indeede their natures are not much differing from such qualities, yet the utility and profit of them will easily wipe off those offences: for to speak truly of the Swine, he is the Husband-man's Scavenger, and the Housewives' most wholesome sinke, for his food and living is by that which would else rot in the yard, make it beastly, and breed no good manure, or being cast down the ordinary sinke in the house breed noisome smells, corruption and infection; for from the Husband-man he taketh Pulse, Chaffe, Barn dust, garbage and the weddes of his yard; and from the Housewife her draffe, swillings, whey, washing of tubs, and such like, with which he will live and keep in good state of body, very sufficiently and though he is accepted good in no place but the dish only, yet there is so lovely and so wholesome, that all other faults may be borne with. He is by nature greedy, given much to root up grounds, and tare down fences, he is very lecherous, and in that act tedious and brutish; he is subject to much anger, and the fight of the bores is exceeding mortal; they can by no means endure stormes, winds, or foule weather, they are excellent observers of their own homes and exceeding great lovers one of another; so that they will die upon any beast that offendeth their fellows."

From the above it seems, so far as habits are concerned, that hogs have not been changed much in the last two centuries. Nevertheless the hog has been improved. That we have created or developed new breeds is a well recognized fact. That we have improved the hogs within the several popular breeds is also generally conceded. But how can or does improvement take place? What must we do to better our stock?

One of the first requisites in livestock improvement, or any other kind of improvement in fact, is that there must be an ideal or goal which is being sought. The breeder must have a model or perfect specimen in mind, else he cannot make advancement in his breeding operations unless it is purely accidental. Ideals may and do vary from time to time and with different localities. An ideal may be vivid and yet be as incorrect as it is

vivid. Therefore utility must be an important consideration in the formation of the ideal.

The personal equation enters this problem of swine improvement from its three principal angles, altho it is of less importance in one of the fundamentals than in the other two. These three angles or links, or whatever one may choose to call them, are heredity, selection and environment.

Heredity is almost as definite as the multiplication table. Formerly it was believed that "like begets like," but so many apparent violations of this rule have been observed that we now find the rule "like tends to beget like." If we could find two hogs—male and female—alike and simultaneously pure as to all character, external, and internal we would be able to predict just what the characters of the offspring would be, even to every animal in the litter. However, such theoretical matings seldom, if ever, occur. We frequently find two animals which look alike to the eye, but which will not breed alike. Therefore it is of importance that we know the ancestry of the individuals which we use in the breeding herd.

We would not in the least belittle individual merit, but want to call attention to the pedigree as to guide in determining what the animals are really "like" outside of their outward appearance. Cross-breeds, the result of intermating pure breeds of separate breeds, usually possess very uniform external characteristics and exceptional vigor within any given cross, but if they are followed to the second or third generation one sees a heterogeneous bunch of hogs usually very ununiform and unlike their parents. The concentration on a given blood line is the only method of securing marked uniformity. Of course violent out-crosses are commonly made to accomplish a definite purpose, but such matings must be followed by a subsequent concentration

for uniformity as to the desired characteristics.

To the hog breeder, the problem of selection offers greater possibilities

for the proper application of the personal equation than either of the other angles or links to the problem of permanent improvement of swine. The

selection of the boar, and, to a smaller extent, the choice exercised in securing sows because of their less frequent purchase, offers a big problem. Efficiency in such selections is the keynote to his success. Nevertheless many a man selects hogs which he calls "good enough for his purpose," knowing at the same time that he is accepting second rate individuals, for no other reason than that they can be bought for a small sum. An undesirable boar or sow is expensive at any price for the breeding herd and a first class hog seldom sells for more than it is worth.

In making the selections, with a view of improving rather than simply multiplying swine, at least two parties should participate—the seller and the buyer. The seller is usually the producer. He, better than all others, knows the ancestry of the individual and with that in mind should consign a fair proposition of his crop

of pigs to the shambles, saving for breeding stock only those which are up to the standard which all improvers of any breed should have in mind. Second or third rate boars and gilts ought never be offered to prospective purchasers of breeding stock who will buy only in case they can get a pedigreed hog cheap. If such animals which are far below standard are sold for breeding purposes, for the good of the purebred improvement they should never be registered. Registered scrubs are altogether too common.

The third place for the admission of the personal equation is that of environment or that group of factors effecting the development of the pig after it has been farrowed. Such men will run the best pig in the world, whereas others can develop a fairly common looking one so that he will be a winner. Such conditions are difficult to imagine, but, neverthe-

less, they exist. Not a few, of the most outstanding hogs of the past have been reared in ramshackle buildings and under apparently unsanitary conditions. As one man has said, "Show me the man and not his premises and I will show you his pig." Another revised an old adage to read "Spare the feed and spoil the pig." The converse is not necessarily true however.

Hog men are born, not raised. Certain groups of individuals hate pigs and as a consequence are unsuccessful in raising them, while others always feed and care for their pigs before looking after personal needs or pleasures.

On the whole the men who have been responsible for the improvement of swine have been artists. They are not artists in the ordinary sense of the word, but thrice great artists as the late Wm. Warfield has expressed it in his lines which follow: "He who moulds the counterfeit of life may indeed be an artist of no mean art, but surely thrice greater is he who manipulates the complex nature of the living being, producing an animal in conformity with the ideal of his mind."
