AMENDMENT TO PEACE TREATY IS ADOPTED BY A VOTE OF

Washington-By a vote of 9 to 8, as adopted an amendment to the eace treaty by which German rights Shantung province, China, would go to China instead of Japan.

All the democratic members and Senator McCumber (Rep.) of North Dakota voted against the amendment. Chairman Lodge offered the amendnent under which the word "Japan" would be stricken from the Shantung sections of the treaty and the word 'China" substituted.

The committee also instructed Chairan Lodge to request President Wilon to send the senate the treaty beween the United States and Poland, igned June 28 at Versailles, and such information as he has regarding the treaties now under negotiation with Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey, without taking up any other proposed amendments to the treaty with Ger-

The committee, the chairman said, was making every effort to reach a eport as soon as practicaable, but had been hampered because it had been been compelled to get information here and there which should have been in its hands officially weeks ago.

DISTRICT OF MALMEDY IS RESTORED TO BELGIUM

Territory Taken From Belgium and Given to Prussia Over 100 Years Ago.

Paris.—Belgium authorities have taken official possession of the distict of Malmedy, which was ceded to Belgium by Germany under Art. 34 of the peace treaty.

The Malmedy district is a small strip of territory near the southern end of the boundary between Belgium and Rhenish Prussia, with its western extremity forming an indentation in the Belgium province of Liege. The territories of Malmedy and Eupen were separated from Belgium in 1814-15 and were assigned to Prussia.

HOUSTON WINS OUT IN PRE-WAR PHONE RATES

Judge Jack at Shreveport Denies Injunction Asked by Telephone Company.

Shreveport, La. - A temporary innction restraining the city of Hous on, Texas, from enforcing its ordinance retaining prewar telephone rates was refused the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone company in an opinion rendered by Judge G. W. Jackin the United States district court here following the conclusion of argument for and against the issuance maintain the status between Houston and the telephone company as it was, and rates prescribed in a city ordinance were effective before the government assumed control of the telephones are operative.

AMMUNITION BEING SHIPPED TO MEXICAN PORTS

Detectives Claim Ten Trunks of Contraband From New York on Way.

New York.—Ten trunks containing arms and ammunition were shipped from this city to Mexico on the steamship Morro Castle, which sailed last week for Havana, Progreso and Vera Cruz, according to information obtained by detectives attached to the bomb squad. The trunks were shipped from a Broadway hotel. The department of justice and navy department gunboats will be sent out to intercept

Boats Needed to Move Texas Wheat. Fort Worth, Texas.—Shipping facilities provided by the United States shipping board are only adequate to remove about half of the Texas wheat crop, according to E. P. Byars, traffic manager of the Fort Worth freight bureau. Mr. Byars said that there are 2,000 cars tied up in Galveston which must be returned to west Texas at once if the grain crop is handled to any degree of satisfaction.

Barry Miller's Name Before Palmer. Washington. - Attorney General Palmer has received the recommendations of Senators Sheppard and Culberson for the appointment of Barry Miller of Dallas as a member of the federal court of appeals for the fifth district in place of Judge R. L. Yantis.

Hammering the Hun line until it bent and broke, bearing the Kaiser and his clans down to inglorious defeat have been notified and it is expected the American soldiers used one weapon in greater numbers than any other. It was a weapon they had never used before, one that had been obsolete for centuries—the hand-grenade—but when the brawny lads from the U. S. A. sent the old "eggs," as they were called, spinning into dugout and pillbox, the only Boches remaining on the ground were those ready to be buried.

Grenades were known to have been used five centuries ago. In 1427, at the siege of the Fortress of Casmaggiore on the River Po in Italy, the defenders used a primitive grenade, made of a glass bottle filled with powder. For a time, grenades were made out of heavy paper, then out of glass and then out of metal. With the close of the eighteenth century the grenade began to be discarded and little use had been made of it un til the Russo-Japanese war in 1904

SHOPMEN'S STRIKE

GOVERNMENT. IS GIVEN THIS TIME TO BRING DOWN HIGH COST OF LIVING.

Washington. - Industrial peace in the United States, according to the legislative council of the railroad shop crafts, depends on the results the government can show in pext 90 days in its campaign to reduce the cost of living.

That time limit as tacitly set by the council in suggesting to union locals Wilson's compromise offer in response to their demand for higher wages should be accepted pending the outcome of the effort to restore a normal

If the cost of living does not come crafts would reserve the right to strike for more money, and with them probably would be associated the remainder of the 2,500,000 railroad em-

Washington. - Railroad shopmen throughout the United States will begin voting immediately on whether they will accept the wage uroposals made by President, Wilson and Director Hines or go out on strike to enforce their demand for a general advance in pay.

On the outcome of the balloting hinges industrial peace of the government controlled railroads. If the 500, 000 shopmen decide to accede to President Wilson's decision that there shall be no general wage advance until the government shows what can be done to control the rising cost of living sufficient time to effect some change in the price levels probably will elapse before other unions press their demands for more money.

GARY HAS REFUSED UNION REPRESENTATIVES A HEARING

Head of United States Steel Says His Corporation Will Not Deal With Unions.

New York .- Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel corporation, made public a communication sent by him to a committee of the American Federation of Labor which is organizing workers in the iron and steel industry, asserting that his corporation would decline to discuss business relations with trade unions as such.

Before receiving the reply of Mr. Gary members of the committee intimated that they would make an ar peal to President Wilson if they failed to get a hearing from officials of the steel corporation

Mr. Fitzpatrick declared that no strike date had been set. Other members of the committee asserted that they would not discuss a strike until all efforts to adjust differences amicably had failed.

AMMUNITION VESSEL BLOWS UP AT SEA

Rescued Crew Says Ship, Owned Orange, Texas, Ignited From Lamp.

Yarmouth, N. S.-Twelve members of the crew of the four-masted auxiliary schooner Elmer Roberts have arrived here and report that their ship loaded with ammunition, caught fire

and blew up at sea. The schooner, a vessel of 695 tons net, was owned in Orange, Texas, and was returning from Bordeaux to New York on her maiden trip. A lamp exploded in the engine room and the flames spread so rapidly the crew had only time to escape in one of the boats, losing all their effects.





This farm was improved about three years ago and is known as the Brocks farm. Mr. Geries rented it about two years ago, moving here from South Texas. After one year of farming on the Plains he was so favorably impressed with the possibilities here that he bought the place and is not only making the farm pay for itself but is making money besides. There is probably no happier or contented people in the State than farmer Geries and family.—Farwell State-Line Tribune.

Straw Makes Humus.

A large part of the lands here in the west are lacking in humus, in fact some parts are starving for want of it. Straw spread on the ground and turned under makes humus. It is hu-mus that makes poor soil fertile; sandy soil more compact and not so much given to blowing; adobe soil mellow and open, and every kind of soil better able to hold moisture and produce crops. Did you ever notice how rank wheat will grow around an old straw stack? It generally gets too rank because there is an excess of plant food there. Straw spread as a mulch on winter wheat increases the crop value many times more than the cost of spreading. The straw while on the surface prevents the rapid evapora-tion of water, but later in the sea-son the humus which it forms serves as a wick to bring up moisture to the little rootlets. Humus formed by straw absorbs a large amount of water and gives it up readily to the growing crops on hot and windy days.




