"Buffalo" Jones Dies.

Charles J. Jones, better known as "Buffalo" Jones died in Topeka, Kans., a few days ago, age 75 years. He was quite well known in Plainview having lived over near Portales for years, and was here several years ago and made a proposition to the Chamber of Commerce to move his herd of buffaloes to pasture in Hale county, but no deal was closed.

and was a partner with "Buffalo" Bill Cody in a contract to furnish buffalo meat to the men who built the Union Pacific railroad. He killed thousands of buffaloes. He also hunted buffalo on the Texas Plains. In 1886 to 1889 he decided to try to save the buffalo from extinction, and captured a few buffalo calves, the last ones in Plainview section, and raised some of them. He sold a part of the herd several years ago to the Flathead Indians of Northwest Montana for \$36,000 and they have since increased rapidly.

In 1910 Jones was in the jungles of Africa hunting elephants, lions and other big game. He went back there on a hunt in 1914.



> The Suspended Sentence. That the suspended sentence law is

a complete and abject failure is the belief of Sheriff McFall, and it is likely that when the state sheriff's association meets next, Sheriff Mc-Fall will endeavor to induce the association to petition the legislature to repeal the law.

Within the week three men serving suspended sentences have been placed in the county jail on new charges growing out of the commission of new offenses.

Germinating New Wheat.

Frequently only a small percentage of freshly harvested winter wheat germinates readily under the conditions ordinarily used in making the germination tests even though would germinate well under these same conditions a few weeks later. In sections of the country where farmers depend upon wheat from the current crop for the fall sowing the poor germination secured with the fresh grain has made it difficult for seed analysis to give accurate information at to the quality of winter wheat offered for seed in time for this information to be of service.

In a recent investigation by the Seed Laboratory of the United States Department of Agriculture it has been found that this difficulty can be almost entirely overcome, even with wheat taken from standing plants and never allowed to dry out, by the use of a lower temperature than has been customary for making the germination tests. Thus, of 16 samples of freshly harvested wheat an average of 99 per cent began to germinate in five days at temperatures from 9 degrees to 16 degrees C (48 degrees to 61 degrees F), whereas in the same time an average of only 86 per cent germinated at 22 degrees C (72 degrees F) which is about the temperature at which germination tests of wheat are frequently made. In the case of one lot 98 per cent were germinating by the end of five days at 12 degrees C (54 degrees F) and only 16 per cent at 22 degrees C (72 degrees F). About 15 degrees C (59 degrees F) is recommended for use in making germination tests of all freshly harvested wheat. Of course at this temperature the rate of growth is slow after germination has begun.

This method of treatment was equally successful with fresh samples of spring wheat and gave good results also with oats and barley.

When the Third Red Cross Roll Call of members is completed on Armistice Day, November 11, it is expected that 2,000,000 persons in Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma-the states comprising the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross-will have rolled as annual members of the

Inasmuch as this is a decrease of 385,619 members under the record of last year, when 2,385,619 members were obtained during the Christmas Roll Call from a population of approximately-13,928,000, Red Cross officials look forward to putting the Division first "over the top" with comparatively little difficulty. The nation-wide campaign this year is expected to yield all previous campaigns, the fee for yearly membership is \$1.

Red Cross Sunday. The campaign will open formally Sunday, November 2, which has been designated "Red Cross Sunday." On that day the story of the Red Cross will be told from pulpits all over the nation. Special programs will mark morning and evening services.

Vigorous preparations are being made, as evidenced by the rapid enrollment of thousands of women workers who will serve as volunteer canvassers during the campaign. More than 1,000,000 such workers are to be obtained throughout the country, whose aid will determine to an appreciable extent the successful termination of the coming campaign.

Reports reaching the Division office in St. Louis tell also of the co-operation being extended by hundreds of soldiers, sailors and marines, who are able, many of them, to tell "first person" stories of what the Red Cross did for them while the fighting was going on. These chaps are being enrolled as speakers, writers and active workers. In addition, "four-minute" men, lawyers, newspaper men and others qualified are scheduled to address audiences during the campaign on the subject of the Red Cross appeal.

Advertising Campaign. Enthusiasm in the campaign is be ing stimulated by the appearance of thousands of posters, window displays, Red Cross flags and other adjuncts of the country-wide advertising campaign now being carried on. Newspapers are carrying page, half-page and smaller advertisements bearing the Red Cross message, while periodicals, magazines and billboards, as well as street cars, trains, mercantile estabshments and department store windows, all carry their quota of Red Cross advertising. Moving picture shows are exhibiting Red Cross films in a gigantic motion picture campaign that has for its object the education of the American people to the present-day

needs of the American Red Cross. Red Cross campaign officials have announced that the present drive is one for membership, not funds. In view of the large amount of work still to be completed abroad and the renewed activity incident to the inception in America of the Red Cross peace program along the lines of First Aid, Junior Membership, Nursing and Home Service, those in touch with the drive situation say the prospects are favorable for increasing Red Cross membership to a figure well over that

UTAH-"THE PROMISED LAND."

F IRST settled in the summer of 1847 by Brigham Young and his little band of Mormons, numbering less than 150 souls, Utah is fast coming into its own. Utah is 7,000,000 acres larger than all of the New England states combined, and there isn't much, if, indeed, there is anything-within reason-that the imagination of man can conceive or his heart wish for that the state does not yield or cannot offer.

'Tis said that Utah contains enough iron ore to rebuild most of the steel structures in the country; sufficient black marble to build a column from the earth to the moon; salt enough to supply the world for 60 years; the greatest copper mine in all the world; enough coal to supply her population for 60,000 years; clay and sand enough to make the world's supply of brick for many years; 4,000,000,000 feet of lumber and sandstone and granite in quantities equal to the rebuilding of the majority of the buildings in the United States.

Gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc to the value of \$97,000,000 were mined in Utah during one recent year. Goodly quantities of agricultural products and fruit are also produced.

Utah's climate is neither hot, cold, dry or wet, but rather a happy medium with a touch of salt air added for good measure. Her fertile valleys remind one of Italy, her pointed mountains hold a touch of Alpine beauty and great painters say that her sunsets are the most beautiful in the world.

IS OVERBURDENED

TIME HAS COME WHEN HE MUST BE RELIEVED OF SOME OF HIS OFFICIAL DUTIES.

BUSIEST MAN IN AMERICA

Chief Executive No Longer Has Any Time He Can Call His Own-All Sorts of Tasks Are Thrust Upon

By JAMES P. HORNADAY.

Washington.-Members of the prestdent's cabinet, who are the men most competent to discuss the subject, say that the time is near at hand, if not, already here, when the chief executive of the nation must be relieved of some of the official burdens he now has to carry. This observation is prompted by the recent temporary breakdown of President Wilson. The Constitution of the United States, it is pointed out, does not overburden the president with duties, but in the 130 years that have elapsed since the Constitution was adopted there have been developments that have greatly broadened the score of activities of the man who occupies the White House.

One would gain the impression from reading section two or article two of the Constitution that outside of commanding the army and navy in time of war, addressing the congress, before the opening of each session, on the state of the Union, granting reprieves and pardons, negotiating treaties, nominating persons to office and receiving ambassadors, the president has little to do. These prescribed duties, as a matter of fact, now take but little of the president's time. If he should limit his activities to the duties set out in the Constitution he would have a half holiday six times

President Has Little Rest.

Under modern conditions the president of the United States really has no time he can call his own. If he slips away from the White House for a few hours occasionally, he leaves his desk piled high with business. President Wilson has not had what might be called a real vacation since he entered the White House March 4, 1913. Before the war broke out he was able to get away for a few weeks at a time, but he was not able to put the nation's business aside. > Continually Called on for Help. Of recent years there is a tendency, it is pointed out, to call on the president of the United States for help every time a local problem of unusual stubbornness arises. If there is a controversy over wages or hours of work the president is expected to try to adjust it; if any particular line of business is suffering, the president is expected to propose a remedy; If the cost of living is too high, he is expected to find out why and lower it; If times are hard, he is counted on to discover how prosperity can be restored. In the international field, likewise, the demands on the president have grown enormously. Even before the war came on and the United States entered that war, the president's responsibilities in connection with international matters were large. Now they are almost limitless.

A president can make use of the members of his cabinet advantageously in disposing of the work that accumulates on his desk, and President Wilson has probably made use of his cabinet officers in this way to as great an extent as any of his predecessors, but there is a vast amount of work that the president must attend to himself. President Roosevelt was usually at his desk five or six hours a day. President Taft stuck almost as close to his desk, and President Wilson has averaged from eight to ten hours at his desk. The modern president requires the services of at least two expert stenographers and sometimes he uses three or four in one day. If he did nothing but dispose of the routine matters that come to his desk, matters that cannot be disposed of by his secretary or the clerks in the executive office, he would be tied to his office

HOUSE COMMITTEE IS AGREED THAT SOME READJUSTMENT IS NECESSARY.

MANY ARE LEAVING SERVICE

Emergency Legislation Is Planned to Continue Shore Quarters Allowance for Officers-They Cannot Now Live Within Their Incomes.

By JAMES P. HORNADAY.

Washington,-Increased pay for the officers and personnel of the United States navy is being considered by the house naval affairs committee in extensive hearings. Members of the committee are practically united in the belief that some readjustment of naval pay should be made because of the increased cost of living. Some of the men in the navy are resigning to accept more lucrative civil positions, while thousands who served during the war have been discouraged from continuing in the service permanently because of the small pay. In order to make a just and satisfactory readjustment, Representative Butler, chairman of the committee, has asked the navy department to send before the committee not only high officers stationed in Washington, but officers and men from all branches of the naval ser-

The navy has such a complex allowance system, Mr. Butler said, that it is impossible to get an accurate view of just what the men are receiving. from tables submitted by pay corps men here. Legislation will also be considered at the hearings to increase the number of officers in the navy. Evidence has been submitted to several members of the committee that the large reductions made by the house committee in the naval appropriation bill last June have made it necessary to cut the number of officers down to such a figure that not only the fighting efficiency of the navy, but its upkeep, is

The increased cost of living has hit the lower grade officers practically as hard as those with four stripes, and the committee apparently does not favor granting such a large additional amount to the officers of higher grades. Increases that the men of lower grades deserve would increase the salaries of the higher grades to figures above the amount paid cabinet members, it was pointed out. Mr. Butler also said he favored investigating the pay noncommissioned officers are re ceiving. Many of them, he said, are in the same position that junior officers are, and have several dependents.

The Case for the Officers. Here is the way the officers of the navy have briefed their case:

It has been eleven years since any increase in pay has been granted to officers; the cost of living has been gaining by leaps and bounds. As an actual problem in simple arithmetic, a naval officer cannot live within his income. At a recent census, taken throughout the navy, it was found that a large majority went 7 per cent of their salary in debt during the last year. The case of the naval officer is very different from that of the smallsalaried man in civilian life. At sea he has a budget of expenses in addi tion to that of his family.

In addition to the separate expense of the officers at sea, there is another problem civilians do not have to meet -the question of transportation. When ordered from one point to another, the actual fare of the officer himself is paid, but not that of his family nor of his household goods.

There is not one branch of the government service in which the employees are not asking for more pay. A commission created by congress No one thus far has proposed a more than a year ago will soon be ready to report as to the pay of the men and women employed in the executive departments. Another commission has already recommended an increase for postal employees and a bill giving the workers in that branch of the service more pay is now on its way through congress.



Does your cow pay for the feed she eats? If not, neither the cow or the feed is at fault. You can dispose of a poor cow. You can feed a good cow a balanced ration and make her more profitable.

Cows require two kinds of feed for profitable milk production. They are protein and carbohydrates. If you are not feeding the right amount of each you are wasting feed and getting less milk than you should. A cow fed on alfalfa hay, wheat bran and cotton seed meal can not make much profit because these feeds are all rich in protein and lack starch and sugar or carbohydrates. Feeding wheat pasture, cane fodder and kafir chop is not good because these are all rich in starch, and lack protein. With a protein roughage you need a carbohydrate grain and with a carbohydrate roughage you need a protein concentrate. The most common feeds for all farm stock are classified

Carbohydrate roughage-Fodder and bundle feed. Grass pasture. Grass hay.

Straw. Silage.

Carbohydrate concentrates-Corn or kafir chop.

Oats.

Protein concentrates-Cotton seed cake or meal. Wheat bran.

Hominy hearts. Tankage and meat. Shorts or middlings.

Protein roughage-Alfalfa or clover hay. Cowpea hay.

Bean straw. Balance these feeds together for the

In Letter Written Before His Illness, President Calls on People to Rally for Domestic Program.

Washington, Oct. 25. - President Wilson, in a letter written before his illness and made public today, appealed to the people of the country for support of the third Red Cross roll call, which is to be held from Nov. 2

"As President of the United States and as president of the American Red Cross, I recommend and urge a generous response to the third Red Cross roll call which opens on Nov. 2, with the observance of Red Cross Sunday and appropriately closes on Nov. 11, the first anniversary of the signing of

"Twenty million adults joined the Red Cross during the war, prompted by a patriotic desire to render service to their country and to the cause for which the United States was engaged in war. Our patriotism should stand the test of peace as well as the test of war, and it is an intelligently patriotic program which the Red Cross proposes, a continuance of service to our soldiers and sailors who look to it for many things, and a transference to the problems of peace at home of the experience and methods which it acquired during the war.

It is on membership more than money contributions that the stress of the present campaign is laid, for the Red Cross seeks to associate the people in welfare work throughout the land, especially in those communities ship. where neither official nor unofficial provision has been made for adequate public health and social service.

"The American Red Cross does not purpose indefinite prolongation of its relief work abroad, a policy which would lay an unjust burden upon our own people and tend to undermine the self-reliance of the peoples relieved, but there is a necessary work of completion to be performed before the American Red Cross can honorably withdraw from Europe. The Congress of the United States has imposed upon the Red Cross a continuing responsibility abroad by authorizing the Secretary of War to transfer to the American Red Cross such surplus army medical supplies and supplementary and dietary foodstuff now in Europe as shall not be required by the army, to be used by the Red Cross to relieve the distress which continues in certain countries of Europe as a result of the war.

"To finance these operations, to conclude work which was begun during the war and to carry out some comparatively inexpensive constructive plans for assisting peoples in Eastern Europe to develop their own

welfare organizations, the American Red Cross requires, in addition to membership fees, a sum of money small in comparison with gifts poured into its treasury by our generous people during the war.

"Both the greater enduring domestic problem and the lesser temporary foreign program of the Red Cross deserve enthusiastic support, and I venture to hope that its peacetime membership will exceed rather than fall below its impressive war member-



Cattle moving off the Midland Valley last week to the Kansas City market shrank 50 to 60 lbs a head because they had to be reloaded at Wichita. Diversion is often refused. The Santa Fe is the goat of the regional directors and federal managers from Chicago westward, simply because it had the best equipment in the United States when it was wrested from its owners at the time Mr. McAdoo took charge of the railway. It has a double track from Kansas City to Chicago, and having a double track it is penalized by having a lot of traffic dumped on

it. No material provisions have been made by the government for upkeep of roadbed or equipment. The budget for 1919 improvements was cut in half by the director general, despite the fact that the Santa Fe was one of the few roads that made any profit to the government through its operation since it was taken over by Mc-

The Santa Fe has 8,000 stock cars, most of them steel underframes, This week only 2,800 of these cars were on the Santa Fe's own lines. Old decrepit New York Central and Pennsylvania stock cars from east of the Mississippi river, wooden under framed affairs, have been worked westward.

The New York Central has been notorious for 10 years for its supply of bad equipment and bad order cars. Even in good repair these cars would not stand up under the draw bar strain of a Santa Fe locomotive drawing a long string of them, and draw bars would be jerked out continually, as these cars have not been built to stand the strain that Santa Fe steel under frame cars will undergo in transit. The same can be said of Pennsylvaina equipment, but the Pennsylvania equipment has come to its present state of dilapidation since government control came on.

The Santa Fe has 38,000 box cars of the same quality as its stock cars, the best equipment of any railway in the world, and kept good, when the Santa Fe was in the hands of its owners, though constant repair and watchfulness. Of these 38,000 box cars only 3,800 were on the Santa Fe's lines at one time this week. Of the cars from foreign lines that had been shuffled off on the Santa Fe by lines east, and by jerk water lines that tap the Santa Fe, 67 per cent were in some state of bad order this week.

No data is at hand at this time to prove how many of the government's or rather, McAdoo's, 100,000 new, standardized box cars were ever turned out. No stock cars were provided in the railway administration's car building program of last year.
