





Resolutions Passed By Farm Congress The annual meeting of the Inter-national Farm Congress which was held in Kansas City in September brought to that city nearly two thous-and farmers and delegates who en-joyed and will no doubt profit by the excellent addresses that were an outstanding feature of this year's ses-

The resolutions, or "declaration of principles", adopted at this meeting should awaken the conservative and loyal element in organized labor the danger of the radical and bolshevistic influences within their ranks which are rapidly causing the Unions, not only to lose the sympathy of the public but to come into such disrepute as to arouse emphatic opposition.

The resolutions first of all pledged continued loyalty to flag and country, and a continuance of that measure of increased production which has kept the world from starvation, and which will be necessary to keep it from starving yet. Then the following was directed squarely at organized labor:

While renewing to the hosts of labor our expressions of friendship and good will, we view with apprehension and disfavor the turbulent conditions existing, particularly in the ranks of organized labor. At this time, with Europe aflame, and the danger. of widespread trouble in America threatening, we call upon all loyal workingmen to join with the loyal farmers in exerting a steady influ-ence, nationally and internationally. We protest against the policy of organized labor in demanding of the farmers more production, while de-manding of its own members less production. We contend that production in factories is second in importance only to that on the farms, and hold that the obligation of labor to society is not less than that of the farmer.

We deplore the calling of strikes in times like these for any other reason than a grave emergency.

We strongly oppose the unionization of policemen or of any other officials n public employ. We demand that no soldier, sailor, marine, or peace officer undertake any oath or obligation to any cause or organization other than that to all the people he serves. We view with disfavor and alarm the growing tendency toward idleness among all classes of people. We believe that all ablebodied men should work for a reasonable number of hours each week at some constructive or useful occupation. We do not favor the further Gov-

ernment operation of railroads. We urge that the roads be returned to their owners, to be privately operated, under such supervision and regula-tion as will insure the greatest effi-ciency, together with the lowest cost consistent therewith.







Prices are high, labor is scarce and defiant; necessities will nardly go round and yet the country was never more extravagant. Tomorrow seems as uncertain as during the awful days of war.

In spite of all this, however, we have much for which to be thankfulmuch even that we have never had before.

First of all is the most abundant harvest in our history. In almost every part of the country nature seems to have done her best in the matter of production. So voluminous are our crops that labor is unable to harvest them. Particularly is this true of our own section of the country. The Panhandle and Plains of Texas has probably produced more wheat this year than has all the rest of Texas combined in any former year. The feed crop of this same region, if properly saved and cared for, would in all probability meet our own requirements for three years without the production of another. Our live stock have never blade. entered the winter in better condition and the industry has every reasonable The banks are full of promise. money and improvement goes on rapidly inspite of the high prices and the scarcity of labor and material. But our material blessings are not our most valuable ones. There is on every hand evidence of our quickened intellectual and spiritual understandings. Our colleges are overflowing with the best young life we have. The various churches have put on camsaigns for what hitherto have been considered phenominal sums and have committed themselves to comprehensive programs for world betterment. The newspapers and magazines show rather general diffusion of interest in the big problems before us and a rather pronounced inclination to settle them in terms of human justice. Public opinion was never so powerful in giving direction to governmental policy and statesmen were never so eager to know what the people think. In places, public thought has been shaken out of the rue and there is some promise that we may again be able to walk without holding to the apron-strings of our ancestors. Philadelphia Public Ledger: The great majority of the leaders of American opinion, even in the Senate, want an early peace with Germany, want very much the sort of peace framed and signed at Versailles, and want a Laegue of Nations. The great majority of the Senate itselfwhich is much more viruently antileague than any other formal body representing public opinion, such as, for example, the press-voted for ratification of the treaty with certain reservations. The majority of that same body definiely declined to amend a single syllable of the treaty, largely on the ground that any such amendment would delay peace and imperil the instrument. Thus it is fair to say that the Senate is generally speaking, for the peace of Versailles and a League of Nations much like that incorporated in the Versailles treaty.

Our "Splendid Isolation" Has Pas

But the Senate knows, and every one at all in touch with pubic sentiment knows, that there is a very large body of American opinion which does not yet understand why America, hitherto living in happy and contented isolation from the affairs of the Old World, should now bind itself to take part in them either financially, administratively or militarily. There are a lot of busy people who have not been able to give much attention to foreign news since the armistice, who have yet to be told why America, having "saved the allies" at Chateau-Thierry, should not bring her boys home now and forget all about it. Nine-tenths of the men who lead opinion in America know the answer to this. Under normal conditions, this nine-tenths would be out educating public opinion on these vital points. But we have got into such a pother and political squabble, and confusion of "cross-questions and crooked answers", over this issue, that ninetenths of their fierce debating of details have created rather the impression on the public mind that it is a question under discussion among them whether we should tie up to Europe at all or have a League of Nations of any sort.

Now this is a very dangerous condition of affairs. We can not expect the American people as a whole, taught since Washington to fear and avoid "entangling alliances" abroad, and brought up to believe that one of the great advantages enjoyed by America is her separation from the feudalism, the militarism and the gen-eral backwardness of the whole Eastern Hemisphere-we can not expect this American people automatically and immediately and without special exhortation to see clearly that the world war has changed everything and that we are now in the same boat with Europe to sink or swim. The thing to be noted is that there is a lot of opposition, and a lot more of passive inerita, in the United States toward both the treaty and the league which is not at all represented by the attitude of the men in the Senate who are fighting for "reservations." We often hear men of intelligence say: "I hope this whole league business will be beaten." There is a group of "irreconsilables" in the Senate who hope the same thing, but they do not represent even Republican opinion. The fixed and considered opinion of the great majority of national leaders of all parties is that we must have a league of some sort if we are to have peace-that America is entangled inextricably with the affairs of Europe already, and that it is only a question whether she shall be in a position to have her "say" in time to prevent war, or if she must wait again until war has come and her boys are conscripted to die in it. But if one listens closely to the under-currents of common comment, he will be disquieted by the fear that the average voter may have been misled by the opposition to the "Wilson" treaty and league into a belief that his usual leaders are really at heart opposed to any league. There should be an organized effort made by all sincere patriots, whether they are fighting this league or not, to educate American opinion up to the level of realizing that America can now desert from the long war in which she so gallantly enlisted. Only the first phases of that war were finished at the armistice. If the treaty were ratified tomorrow, only a second phase of the war would have been completed. The mighty struggle to save the civilization of the numan race would still be in progress. It was not enough merely to bring to a stop the onslaught of German militarism It is true that if that onsaught had succeeded, civilization would have been doomed-and American civilization and freedom with the rest of it. But the terrific task of stopping that raid has so strained the intricate, intertwined and world-circling machinery of civilization that we may yet come to wreck in spite of the fact that the first danger which precipated all the trouble has been dispel
