The farm mortgage bankers are asking congress to kil the federal
farm loan act by repealing the taxfarm loan act by repealing the tax-
free privilege of the farm bonds. The Smoot bill, Senate File 2426, and the McFadden bill, House Roll 7016, will kill the federal land banks deader
than a mackerel if enacted into laws. than a mackerel if enacted into laws.
Make farm land bonds subject to taxes and the earning to an investor would average three per cent or even
less; the bonds would not sell less; the bonds would not sell at three
per cent; loans to farmers per cent; loans to farmers could not
be made; the land banks would dry up and blow away, while the mortgage banker would come into his old

utit submit to it, and our western agri-
culture would suffer a set-back for culture would suffer a set-back for
want of an adequate credit system. No one who has not lost his sense of justice would say that a man who had money in a savings bank should go
