### WORM KILL MANY HOGS IN COUNTY

Postmortem Shows Cholera Has Killed but Few Hogs in County-Worms and Lice Bad

C. F. Walker stated to the News yesterday that it was his opinion that

A number of hogs near Happy have without question been afflicted with cholera, but these are the only infound a genuine case of cholera. He attributes the worms to feeding too much green feed. The hogs are afflicted with both intestinal and stomach worms.

Mr. Walker offers the following as a remedy for worms. For a pig tion in vaccination and cleaning up, weighing about 50 pounds, 2 grains he sees no reason why the disease of Santonin and 2 grains of Calomel. should further spread. This dose should be given to each hog in a capsul. The hog can be administered the dose through water, but he should go without feed for a day or two first. And so it is on the dairy farm. Few, indeed, are the inquirers who seek knowledge relative to how diseases, accidents and various afflictions can be kept away from the herd. So little do the rank and file consider this very important phase of their business that they fail to read, consider seriously and observe the precautionary recommendations for keeping their herds free from disease. That this is a fact is illustrated by the vast number of inquiries which ask how to cure the cow that has already aborted, how to eliminate garget, calf scours and other diseases that have made their appearance.


So long as the herd is healthy and milking well, so long as the acres are growing clover, and producing well, so long as affairs are moving along satisfactorily, men seldom look into the future and seek information as to how such conditions can be maintained. Neither are they sufficiently interested in the information that will help them, providing something happens, to preserve such information when it is presented to After the horse is stolen seems to be soon enough for most of us to lock our barns. We seek knowledge as to how a cure may be effected rather than how a disease may be prevented.

This is not written in the vein of criticism. It merely cites one of the most prevalent weaknesses of mankind. It will ever be thus. And, yet, it may be that the mere suggestion will aid the exceptional one to pause for a moment and take an inventory of his own peculiarity that he may come to a definite decision and assert that in the future he will seek knowledge that will prevent him from getting into trouble instead of waiting until he gets into trouble and then seek information that will get him

The old threadbare axiom, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of sure," is as true today as it was the first day it was spoken.—The Dairy Farmer.







ROPRIETY OF FURNISHING FREE TEXT BOOKS

A Waste of Money, Unsanitary, and Creates Wrong Habits.

Many states follow the questionable practice of furnishing free text books to their public schools. The amount of money required for this purpose is enormous, and the present writer believes that this outlay is a unwise expenditure of public

In the first place, the practice of having students use the same book year after year is unsanitary. School authorities install sanitary drinking fountains or private drinking cups as a precaution against germs; and yet they say that the children in the public schools shall finger the pages of the same old, dirty book year after year until it is absolutely unusable.

Another argument against furnishing free text books is, students write out solutions for their arithmetic problems, fill out all blanks or diagram all sentences in their grammars. The next fellow who inherits the book will either have a good deal of his work ready for copying, and ne will accept what he finds as correct. The first result tends to make him absolutely dependent upon others; the second often gets him into trouble, because careless students sometimes copy in-

Perhaps the most important argument against furnishing free text ooks is, students take but little care of these books. They often tear out leaves for their own convenience, which renders the book of very little service to the next fellow. leave these books in the rain, kick them around on the ground, soil them unnecessarily, abuse them in every conceivable fashion. This abuse of books becomes a fixed habit with students, and creates in their minds a wrong attitude towards books. We can teach students no more important lesson than the value of a good book. One way to impress this lesson is to develop in their minds that natural pride which attaches to ownership. I prize very highly even some of the old Latin books I used when a student in school. This pride in my text books prompted my first desire for a good library.

I have no quarrel to make with furnishing free books to needy children. But a commission should be

### The Price of Pork Chops and Bacon

Here are reasons why the fine, fresh pork tenderloins and pork chops, or savory ham, or crinkly, bacon, which you enjoy for breakfast, cost much more per pound than the market quotation on live hogs which you read in the newspaper:

An average hog weighs 220 pounds.

Of this, only 70 per cent (154 pounds) is meat and lard.

So, when we pay 15\$ a pound for live hogs, we are really paying more than 21% a pound for the meat which we will get from these animals, even after taking into account the value of the by-products.

But people show a preference for only one-third of the whole-the pork chops, fancy bacon, and choice cuts from juicy hams.

This means that when we are selling Premium bacon at 431/24 per pound wholesale and Premium hams at 30%, there are other parts for which we get as low as 6f or 8f per pound. The net result is an average profit to us of less than 1/ a pound.

The choice cuts are higher because of a demand for them.

Another thing: Only 35 pounds of the entire hog-or about 1/6th-is usually marketed at once. The rest must be pickled, cured, or smoked. This takes months, and adds to the costs which must be met.
