STAMFORD, April 2.-The Agricultural and Mechanical College committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will meet at Eastland Apr. 3 to arrange details in connection with the campaign which the organization will immediately launch to secure the location of a standard A. & M. College in some West Texas town.

The committee is composed of B. Reagan of Big Spring, C. M. Caldwell of Breckenridge and O. L. Slaton of Lubbock. Others who will attend are President H. P. Breisford and Porter A. Whaley, manager of the organization.

At the annual convention of the organization held at Abilene Jan. 22 resolutions were adopted authorizing immediate steps to be taken to recover for the west an agricultural and mechanical college whose services would more nearly adapt themseves to the western portion of the State.

Realizing that the State institutions already maintained are limited in finances, the organization will proceed to outline a plan whereby the funds of the State may be increased sufficiently to make possible the operation of two senior A. & M. 



Just before lambing time the ewe should be put into a spearate pen way, or a portion of their way that we consider those things of little where she can see the other sheep in the flock. This keeps her from get-

ting excited or nervous. The lambing pen should be warm and well ventilated.

The wool should be clipped short around the udder to allow the lamb to find the teats.

Avoid heavy grain feeding just before lambing, as this causes udder

In cold weather lambs may get chilled and die unless prompt remedies are used. Wrapping the lamb in hot flannel cloths is a good method of warming it.

Docking or removing the lamb's tail should be done at the age of 10 to 14 days. This adds much to the appearance and cleanliness of the lamb. For this purpose use a sharp Res. Phone 2275


