



#### **Our Educational Crisis**

When the price of food went up the people of Texas met it The great majority of our citizens have as much to eat today as they ever had. At least none of them are going hungry. When the price of clothing went up the good people met it. They are wearing as good clothes today as they ever did. When the price of lumber went up they kept on building homes and business houses. Every paper you pick up is full of building reports. When the price of gasoline went up, the people of Texas kept on riding. So many people are riding in Texas that it is almost dangerous to be on foot in any of our little towns or cities. There are se many automobiles lined up along our streets you can searcely get between them. And now the price of education has gone up. Mental food and mental training have gone up in price. It is going to cost us five dollars a year extra to have our children's education continued in the future as it has been in the past. Five dollars a year! for every child in the state. That is all Miss Annie Webb Blanton is asking for public education. But when she puts it in one lump she says, "We need and must have \$5,000,000 if our als are to be kept going for our 1,000,000 Texas children," men and women, too, gasp and almost faint away. But it is not unreasonable. It is not big, It is not unjust. It is common sense. It is justice. It is little\_enough. It is economy. What father or mother in this State can rd to have their children out of school, or how can they afford to have a poor school for the sake of five dollars a year for each child they have in school? Last year the Panhandle alone spent nearly \$6,000,000, keeping up our automobiles. Fifteen gallons of gasoline at present prices will pay the extra expense to furnish a good school for your child one year. One day's work at five dollars a day (and who is receiving less?) would pay the extra expense on a whole school year for one child. Is there a day laborer in Texas that could not afford to help pay this if necessary. Do not think of the \$5,000,000 as your part. Think of it in terms of your child. What has it cost you to educate your children so far? For years Texas spent only \$7.00 to \$7.50 per capita. Last year it was raised \$1.00. Everything else has increased from fifty to one hundred per cent. It is not a question of can we. It is a question of will we meet this new demand for the education of the children of our State. Think of it in terms of each individual child. Are you willing to do you part to add five dollars to the educational fund of every child in Texas? There ane about 5,000,000 people in Texas and 1,000,000 of these people are our school children. Nearly another million are our little children who will enter school within the next seven years. Can we afford to allow our schools to go down, for them to enter later on? Texas is far enough down the list in education now. A few years ago, (we do not know the present figures) Texas produced oneeighth of all the agricultural products of the United States and was thirtyeighth in education. That meant that Texas fed and clothed one-eighth of the population of our nation and in return her children were receiving an education that ranked thirty-eighth with the children of other States. In other words, Texas was growing rich by the toil and ignorance of her children. But ignorance and child labor will not hold up the reputation of a State many years. The immediate question now is will we support our schools? Will we stand by our educational leaders? Will we trust the judgment and grant the requests of those we have chosen to lead us? Are you willing for this \$5,000,000 appropriation to be allowed? If so, let your representative at Austin know it. The people of the Panhandle believe in progress. They believe in putting things across. They are not stingy. They are not little. 
#### A Clever Fly Shoo

Recently a subscriber from Illinois walked into the office of this publication and told of a clever scheme, worked out by his ten-year-old daugh-Said he: "My daughter had seen cattle walk under low-hanging branches in fly time so as to brush the flies from their backs. After watching this performance she came home one afternoon and tacked a gunny sack to the sill above the entrance to the milking stable. When the cows were driven up late that afternoon they refused to enter the barn. You see the youngster had allowed the sack to hang too low at first and the cows were afraid of the object. So I arranged the sack so that it hung about a foot above the height of the cattle and by lowering it three or four inches each day finally got it down to where it hung within a few feet of the floor of the entrance.

"The curtain was allowed to remain unrolled all during the fly season last year and once the cows learned that it would sweep off the flies, they anxiously waited the time each afternoon when they could enjoy the privilege of walking under it. The sack not only swept flies off the cow's back when she entered, but it helped keep the flies outside the barn."
