Dr. David Snedden of Columbia University addressed the institute on the meaning of "Sociology of Education" He mentioned the fact that in early times our forefathers made an effort to establish schools, but that little emphasis was placed on the preparation or pay of teachers.

Later private schools became public, and then laws were passed to compel children to go to school. At that time, according to Dr. Snedden, there was little concern as to what the schools would accomplish. Today these things are seriously considered.

Newspapers Eat Trees

The main operation is to extract - that 98 parts of water and roll and dry and press the "web" into the material on which is printed this little article, and into a modern paper manufactory, the whole operation takes but three minutes. At the far end a sheet as much as twelve feet wide is rolled out at a steady rate of 500 feet

A roll of paper one hundred miles long without a single break was once made at a paper mill at Sittingbourne in Kent, and there is one factory which turns out thirty thousand tons of writing paper yearly and every day one hundred and fifty miles of

wall paper. Nearly all our common and printing paper is made out of wood pulp, and so tremendous is the demand that the supply is running short, and paper is constantantly rising in price in

An average spruce tree makes five hundred pounds weight of pulp. A big newspaper will use as much as 150,000 pounds weight of paper in a single day, so that to produce one day's edition no fewer than three hundred trees are required. This, means the stripping of two acres of forest. In the course of a year such a paper uses up nearly a spuare mile of trees which have taken fifty or sixty years to grow.
