The Wonders of America By T. T. MAXEY

OUR NATIONAL CAPITOL.

T IS but fitting that America—the greatest nation in all the worldshould have the finest capitol building on earth. The architectural beauty of our national capitol building at Washington is most impressive and, for capipurposes, it is said to surpass every other building in the world.


The base of this immense, symrests on a level plateau, at an elevation of 97 feet above the historic Potomac river. The building faces the east and is about one mile distant from the White House. The corner stone of the original structure, which comprises the central portion of the present building and is of Virginia sandstone, was laid by President Washington on September 18, 1793-125 years ago. Later, when it became necessary to enlarge the building, two additions or wings, of Massachusetts marble, were added. President Fillmore laid the corner stone; Daniel Webster was the orator. These wings were burned by the British in 1814, but were restored. The original building was completed in 1827.

The present structure is 751 feet long and 350 wide. It covers three and one-half acres. The central portion is surmounted by one of the most graceful, pleasingly shaped and massive domes in the world. This dome is 287 feet high. It was completed in 1865. It weighs more than 8,000,000 pounds and is topped by a statue of

Freedom almost 20 feet high. The total value of the building and grounds is estimated at \$25,400,000.

In a contest just closed an elm at biggest tree in New York state. It is D. C. thirty-four feet, two inches in circumground and more than one hundred feet tall. It has no branches within fifty feet of the ground, and its circumference at fifty feet is twenty feet. The "George Washington Cherry" at Hempstead, Long Island, which must have been too big for George to cut, is fourteen feet in diameter.

UNCLE SAM'S RATS ARE EPICUREANS

Give Them Plenty and a Variety of Food if You Would Succeed in Poisoning Rodents.

A starved rat will ent anything, from a strip of lead pipe to an old boot, but a well-fed rodent, such as we have in the United States, is often inclined to be finicky in the matter of ood. Rat-poisoning campaigns often fail because the house owner does not give his intended victims a sufficient variety of edibles. Specialists of the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture urge a rat; Control campaign in America and the stress the importance of catering to the rodents' tastes.

Rat baits may be divided into three lasses: Meat foods, vegetable foods and cereals. In mixing his baits, the uccessful poisoner selects a food from each of the three classes and combines it with carbonate in the proportion of one part poison to four of food. "Then he puts a teaspoonful of each variety on a strip of paper or a bit of board. so that the rat, traveling along his runway, finds a three-course meal all id for him. Usually one of the three saits appeals to him and the rat population is reduced by one.

Poisoned baits should be watched arefully, and uneaten-baits replaced by others of the same class on the folowing veening. In this way a wide selection of foods may be used without leparting from the basic combination. All baits must be kept fresh and tempting. You can't catch rats by mearing a dab of poison on a bait of stale bread and then putting it under some out of the way corner. Barium arbonate is the poison recommended by the specialists. It is tasteless, odorless, and can be obtained at any drug store. TWO NEW WHEAT DISEASES

Symptoms: Black stripes running lengthwise in the leaf blades and sheaths are typical of flag smut. These black stripes are due to the spores produced by the fungus. The disense is commonly more injurious to the upper leaves of the plant. The stems are also infected to some extent. Infected plants are usually more or less dwarfed, and they rarely head out or produce seed. Commonly all the stalks on a disased plant are smutted, but occasionally one or more stalks show

Flag smut attacks the leaves, and therefore, is easily distinguished from the other wheat smuts which attack

Symptoms: Badly dwarfed plants occurring in distinct patches of vary These symptoms first become evident in the spring after growth of

the healthy plants is well started.

Diseased plants show the following characteristic symptoms: (1) dwarfing and, a little later, (2) abnormal dark green coloration of the fall leaves, (3) dying of the outer leaves and fall tillers and browning of crown and roots, (4) excessive development of spring tillers, or (5) some plants may be kliled entirely while in the dwarfed

Badly infested fields may have only a few healthy plants, but where the infestation is slight, it may be very difficult to find the more or less isolated diseased plants scattered among the healthy ones. More commonly, patches or spots of diseased plants show up here and there without regard to the type or condition of the soil. Most of the plants in these spots are diseased and stunted, thus giving a sharply dee fined margin to the area.

Because of the change in the personnel of the Board, there was a reorganization of the body. Hon. A. C. Goeth of Austin was re-elected President of the Board, and Hon. Martin O. Flowers of Lockhart was re-elected vices. Vice-president. The other members of the Board, all of whom were present at this meeting, are Hon. R. J. Eckhart of Taylor, Judge A. B. Watkins of Athens, Miss Margie E. Neal of Carthage, and Hon. J. J. Bennett of Stephenville, the last two being the successors of Hon. 'A. B. Martin of Plainview and Hon. John Marshall of Sherman. Mr. H. A. Turner of Austin was re-elected Secretary of the Board.

In addition to the Board of Regents all of the Normal College Presidents were present, as follows: W. H. Bruce of enton, H. F. Estill of Huntsville, C. E. Evans of San Marcos, J. A. Hill of Canyon, R. B. Binnion of Commerce, and R. L. Marquis of Alpine. These officers made reports of the progress of the work at the respective schools and made recommendations for the future.

The Board elected officers and teachers for the ensuing year and transacted usual routine business. Considerable embarrassment was felt because of the lack of an authoritative budget for the next, biennial period.
