Canyon has a real school problem. This town lacks but twenty pupils of having as many enrolled as some other Panhandle towns with a thousand more population. The independent district, with only 25 sections of land, is raising practically the same amount of school money by taxation as all of the remainder of Randall county. This district has more pupils than all of the common schools of Randall county. The public school is crowded to capacity. The tax rate was raised from 50c to 75c on the \$100 valuation at a special election in May. In order to care for the attendance in the school, the district is confronted with either building temporary buildings, or voting bonds for a new brick building. In either case, there is need of more teachers and more equipment for another year. In order to do this it looks as if there was no other way to than to ask the voters to increase their tax rate for the coming year. The district is altogether too small, and does not yield sufficient taxes without imposing the limit of rates.

Everyone used to get along pretty well under pre-war conditions. We all made a little money, saved a little, and were happy. Then came the hectic days of 1919 and '20 when everyone made about three times as much as he did in 1914, and proceeded to increase his expenses in like proportions. The producer has been forced to return to a basis below pre-war days. The rest of the world is holding on to war prices as if it were afraid an awful calamity would befall if prices were forced back to those good old days when we got along so well and around good fellow. Members of the tions cannot prevail. They should not prevail. It would be a great thing for the whole country if everything could suddenly go back to the 1914 basis.

Frank R. Jamison has resigned as secretary-manager of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce and becomes manager of the Amarillo-Daily Tribune. Jamison organized the commercial body two years ago and has been its manager ever since. Before that time he was publisher of the Canadian Record, and one of the most popular newspaper men in Northwest Texas. R. H. Nichols has been president and general manager of the Tribune since it started, in March 1920, and will now devote his entire time to the editorial end of the paper. The Tribune is to be congratulated upon procuring a man with such wide experience as Frank Jamison.

All of the big nations of the world have seconded the move made by Secretary Hughes in the opening of the disarmament conference. England has gone a little farther than this country even stopping all work in her naval construction yards. She is showing the right spirit in the matter. That big hearted American, Chas. Schwab, in whose yards most of the American ship building is done and who would suffer losses of millions of dollars if disarmament becomes a reality, has warmly praised Hughes and the stand of America for disarmament. Every day brings forth evidence proclaiming that the nations of the world are tired of war and preparations for war.

THE PORCELAIN TRIANON

Louis XIV., badly bitten by the building fever, about 1699 bought a piece of ground upon which stood a poor little hamlet containing a church dedicated to "Divae Maria de Trieno." The king had the village razed, and in the last weeks of 1670 he began to build his latest whim and the little castle rose as if by magic from the ground, together with the blossoms of the spring. And a quaint gay little building it must have been, just fit for the purpose for which it was designed ("a aller fair des collations,") as St. Simon said, this curious little china house where Madame de Montespan presided over the sumptuous suppers offered by the luxury-loving King to the brilliant members of his court; suppers at which Quinault recited his verses and Lull charmed his hearers with his music. The porcelain Trianon was built after a Chinese model; its walls were cream color and its chimneys brick-red, while blue-and-white deift tiles surrounded with wreaths and set in gilded leaden rims, gave significance to the name and color to the scheme of the King's new toy. White marble busts stood on brilliantly-colored china brackets and all along the balustrade were placed blue and white vases. The inside decoration of the house was in the same style and though the porcelain used in such profusion looked like Chinese or Dutch, it came from much nearer home and was all manufactured at St. Cloud.

"BLOC" MENACE IN LAWMAKING

The great problems that confront the American people at this time can not be settled by partisan shibboleths or by sectional clamors or class propaganda, writes Senator King in the Nation's Business. It were an unmitigated evil that the affair of state should fall within the control of any group with a propaganda, or of any class obsessed by an ism which subordinates every consideration of the public weal to the promotion of its pet and partial projects. One of the evils of these times in public life of our country is the formation of numerous groups in the country, each with some special project of propaganda, and each attempting to seize the power of the Government and make of it an instrument to impose its projects upon the people.

Sectionalism in its day was an evil thing. It was the cause of a great war between geographical divisions of the country, but sectionalism is not entirely deaf to the appeals of patriotism. The man who is obsessed with the narrow projects of a class, a group or a special party can not be appealed to from that standpoint. His country means nothing to him.

WHAT DOES EVERYBODY USE?

What is there, asks my friend Ayres, that you use just as much of whether you're rich or poor? writes Fred Kelly in the Nation's Business. I gave it up, and he declared that as good an example as any is plain table salt. If you're in the habit of putting a pinch of salt on your eggs in the morning you won't take an extra pinch after you've grown more prosperous, and if you're suddenly thrown into a state of comparative poverty, you'll still have your pinch of salt just the same. If you can't have eggs in the morning you'll probably put your customary salt ration on something else. By hook or crook you'll have all the salt you need. Now, then, that being the case, salt ought to be in steady demand year in and year out, oughtn't it? And yet an investigation found some months ago that the bottom had dropped right out of the table salt market. The producers were not selling any table salt at all. Why? Just because the public was using up the slack. People recognized that they were buying salt, as well as everything else, on a falling market. Hence, the family that had an extra sack of salt in the pantry used it up before going to the grocery for another. The grocer, in turn, used up his reserve stock before ordering from the wholesaler. And the wholesaler dealer delayed buying from the manufacturer so long as he had a grain of salt still on hand.

First Proclamation of National Thanksgiving Day by Washington

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and

Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me, "to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging, with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness;"

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 28th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good governments, peace, and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally, to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

Flavor split-pea soup with celery and onion and add to it slices of smoked sausages.

One week of manual and agricultural labor is in future to be included in the year's work of every Bulgarian school, for boys and girls alike.



Oklahoma State Banks Hasten to Nationalize

Taking This Action to Escape the Drain of the State Bank Guaranty Law.

Kansas City—Ten Oklahoma state banks have received authorization by telegraph to enter national banking system. Applications of 15 others are pending. These transfers are said to be the first ever authorized by telegraph. Object of transfer is to relieve banks from drain of Oklahoma state bank guaranty law.

Bankers of Oklahoma now operating under state charters are beginning to make efforts to nationalize to escape the drain of the Oklahoma state bank guaranty law. Only this week a committee of Oklahoma state bankers, representing some of the strongest state banks in Oklahoma, came to Kansas City in an endeavor to arrange to enter the national banking system, and to become members of the Federal Reserve system, through telegraphic arrangements with Washington. There are strong indications that this movement will spread.

Desire of Oklahoma state banks that are in a strong position to withdraw from the state charters and to become national banks is due to the effect of the growing number of state bank failures in that state. The last report of the Oklahoma state banking board, for September 30, showed that it had outstanding \$1,007,000 in warrants. There has been a heavy increase in the amount of these warrants since, the volume forced upon some banks under the state bank guaranty law, which is obligatory on every state bank, being very burdensome.

The state guaranty in Oklahoma is operated by the state banking board through the issuance of warrants. When a bank fails, warrants to cover the amount involved are issued. State banks are required to deposit collateral with the state banking board for their share of the warrants, which is determined by the deposits of each bank. Later the state board is supposed to take up the warrants through the annual assessments of one fifth of 1 per cent against the average of each state bank. But the amount of warrants being issued is said to be running ahead of the probable income of the state banking board. It is even said the board may find it necessary to appeal

to the state legislature to assist it through a special appropriation to carry out the provisions of the state guaranty law.

To avoid having more warrants of the Oklahoma state banking board forced upon them, state banks of Oklahoma have only one recourse—to drop their state banking charter and enter the national banking system.

Oklahoma has had more bank failures this Fall than any other state in the Kansas City Federal Reserve district. Nebraska is next to Oklahoma. Colorado is third and Kansas fourth in the number of failures. The Kansas guaranty fund, which is voluntary, is said to be in far better shape than that of Oklahoma.—The Wall Street Journal, Nov. 17.

THE COMMON
 Who can account for the subtleties and intricacies of words?
 Ordinarily we use "common" as a term of reproach. We say of certain people that their manners are common, their dress is common, their speech is common, meaning that they are undesirable and offensive. Our great object in life is to avoid the common in that sense, to get away from the vulgar, the trite, the mean, the everyday. Goethe made it his chief praise of Schiller that he flung behind him into oblivion the common, which enchains and enslaves us all.
 And yet, as we reflect, we feel that there is something wrong here. It should not be, it cannot be, that what is common to humanity—and what else is the fundamental meaning of the word?—is worthy only of opprobrium and contempt. We see the suggestion of a different use in the lines of Gray as to one who is recovering health: "The meekest floweret of the vale, The simplest note that swells the gale, The common sun, the air, the skies, To him are opening paradise."
 Common! The most beautiful things in the world are the commonest. The sun, as Gray says, the stars, the clouds, the swift stir of autumn winds and the quiet drift of autumn leaves, all common, and so infinite lovely. And the

simple, essential elements of human life are exquisitely common. What is commoner than death? What is commoner than suffering or hope or love? Those are the truly common things, and surely those are the things that count for all of us, as Wordsworth means when he speaks of "Joy in widest commonality spread." It is only because our hearts and lives are common, just common, that we can speak to others at all, can make ourselves understood by them. The greatest souls of the whole world, such men as Shakespeare and Lincoln, make themselves individual solely by their vast, sure grasp and understanding of the common. Genius is rooted in the common, though it soars into the unique.

The next time you call a thing of person common, stop to consider whether that very commonness does not imply something to love.

DO YOU KNOW THAT—

India produces nearly the entire world's supply of jute. Lack of cheap labor and suitable machines for separating the fiber have prevented its successful cultivation in the United States.

All the lakes in the world are estimated to contain only 2,000 cubic miles of water, as compared with 324,000,000 cubic miles of water in the oceans.

Kites with thermometers attached were sent aloft to measure the temperature of the upper air by Dr. Alexander Wilson in 1749, three years before Benjamin Franklin's famous kite-flying experiment.

Nowhere on dry land are there such vast flat plains as occur at the bottom of the oceans. The success of the submarine telegraphic cables is due in part to the flatness of the ocean bottom. Steep slopes are rare, and it is in such places that breaks in the scale usually occur.

When the natives of Nauru, in the Pacific, go fishing they bring the fish home alive and put them in lagoons or small lakes in the hills. Every village owns a lagoon and every village owns a portion of the water, fenced off with palm leaves, where the household supply of fish is kept alive until needed for food.

Certain species of bacteria growing as parasites on the roots of higher plants have the power of extracting nitrogen from the air and producing nitrogenous compounds that are of value as fertilizers.

India ink was invented by the Chinese about 1200 B. C., and was made by mixing a very fine soot with a gelatine prepared from ass's skin.

Excessive blowing of soil is sometimes as harmful a process as excessive erosion by water. The great dust storm of May 6-7, 1889, in the Middle West, removed the soil in some places to a depth of five or six inches. A case is recorded from Australia in which a foot of soil was removed over an area of 100,000 acres.
