The better self of an individual, community or nation usually prevails even though at times it seems that the other self is paramount. It sometimes takes the most radical to awaken us to our senses. America turned down Woodrow Wilson and his idealistic plan of politics, yet America applauded him as no other public man has been applauded, even though the occasion was in a funeral procession. Carry Nation had to sacrifice the ideals most women have, but her campaign against booze will in time manish whiskey from this land. Just after the war the nation went mad over jazz, and yet today jazz shows receive little patronage from the general public. The state teachers association resolved against bobbed hair and short skirts. If they are wrong, they are mere passing fads which will soon pass out. Fads never get people any place much, and when we do return to our sense, we seldom go astray for a second time. More and more we are convinced that the people of America, once given all the facts, will always do the right thing.

It is remarkable the number of peddlers and salesmen who are out today after business of various lines. There is a certain commodity used by two institutions in Canyon, and seldom by more than one institution in other towns. Yet six different firms have sent salesmen here this year to sell this one order. The expenses of the six salesmen will amount to nearly as much as the original orders placed. Street peddlers are prolific. Stay by your home business men, who are staying by you when you need credit.

Possibly the faint chances for a wheat crop next year will prove a blessing to this country after all. Wheat has been planted all over the Indian corn belt, owing to the low price of corn this year, and the fair price of wheat. If these sections raise a big wheat crop next summer, wheat will be worth 40c or less, and there will be a demand for feed. The Panhandle can raise a big feed crop on very little rain. Seeming defeat may prove a victory to this section.

Henry Ford broke into print again this week, declaring that there is a movement on from the big cities to the little country towns. The excessive expense of shipping the raw materials to the city, and returning the finished products to the country is given as this movement, according to Ford. Some sense to it too.

Conditions in the armament conference are more hopeful than at any period since its beginning. Lloyd George is coming to take charge of the English situation. He is going to break the Anglo-Jap alliance. ## Report of Canyon Independent Schools

To the School Board, Gentlemen:

The past month has been a very pleasant one in the school work. Our teachers have been energetic, painstaking and successful. Our attendance has been good.

Very little sickness has been reported among our pupils. Extravagant rumor as to contagions have disturbed some of our patrons but only a few cases have been reported by the health officers and these cases have been quarantined and pupils not allowed to reenter until a written release is given by the attending physician. Every precaution is taken by the teachers and authorities to prevent the spread of any contagion.

We are pleased with the increasing seriousness shown by our Senior classes concerning their work, only a few seem to ignore the necessity of home study and close application. Our young people of the graduating class are all planning attendance at college after this year.

Our equipment is growing steadily into the requirements set by the state inspector and the remaining charts, maps, source books, etc. are ordered.

The open weather so far has left little complaint as to the heating of the several rooms and two of the large heaters have not been placed but will be where the greater need shows itself.

Literary societies are beginning their work in earnest and preparation for the interscholastic work is being planned in all departments.

A source of great help and inspiration is now presented in our splendid Parent-Teachers' Association. We hope that all parents will enlist in this work for the real benefit it may be to their own children. Real problems and practical solutions are handled and real results are to be accomplished.

Many features of the work are below our ideals and every effort is being made to improve. We are open to any suggestions that may improve conditions and better our school.

We feel that a fine spirit of cooperation is among the people and nothing but pleasant and favorable criticism for the teachers and the School Board is reaching us.

Two great and serious problems are facing us as parents and teachers. The smoking evil among the young and the increasing tendency toward gambling displayed by our boys and girls. The smoker among our boys cannot command but 60-75 percent of his mental force and many are mere drags in their work while the spirit of taking chances grip the boys with a force that is very detrimental to every moral element. Chances to indulge in these evils are too easily found. May we not plead that the parents and friends give serious thought to these two evils and rally at the call of the school for their suppression.

PLUCK AND PERSEVERANCE

The life history of Elmer Brown is a convincing illustration of how pluck coupled with perseverance may win in the fight for an education. This young man entered the West Texas State Normal College in the fall of 1914. Just off the farm, his intellectual outlook upon life had many limitations. But he had not been a student long in this institution until his latent talents began to manifest themselves. However, his means were very limited, and he husbanded every resource in order to remain in school. He did not scintillate like some stars, but his light had a steady and ever increasing glow. He had caught a vision, and his ambition for an education would brook no denial.

After he graduated with us he attended the University of Texas where he won distinction in the field of chemistry, being sent several times to New York to assist chemical experts in the solution of difficult problems. It was this young man who assisted Dr. Bailey to discover a solvent for aspirin tablets.

In June 1922 he will take his Ph. D. degree at Yale. For his thesis he has been assigned the difficult task of discovering a cure for tuberculosis. He will doubtless perform his task well. That a young man should be able to win for himself such signal honors at every stage of his career and at the same time earn enough money to defray all his expenses is a noteworthy achievement. Think of it—only seven years from a country boy with a meager education to a doctorate in one of our leading universities, and every step rewarded with honors and the end holding promise of high pecuniary emoluments! Is this all not worth the price?

CARE OF MILK AND ITS USE IN THE HOME SUBJECT OF NEW FARMERS' BULLETIN

The consumer, rather than the producer, the distributor of milk, or the manufacturer of dairy products is the person for whose use a new Farmers' Bulletin No. 1207, Milk and Its Uses in the Home, has recently been issued by the United States Department of Agriculture. Milk is indispensable in the diet of children, because its solids are in such form that they can be easily utilized by the body, and because it is one of the best sources of the lime needed to build bones and teeth, and of vitamin A, a substance essential to health and normal growth. For adults also milk is an important supplementary food. It should be given scrupulous care in the home.

Milk is an important food, because it contains proteins for tissue forming fat and sugar for body fuel, and minerals, particularly phosphorus and lime, for building and repairing bones and other tissues. Milk is much richer in lime than most other common foods. A cup of milk, says the bulletin, contains at least seven times as much lime as two medium-sized potatoes, and nearly twenty times as much lime as two slices of white bread or four ounces of average beef. This is one of the reasons why it is such an excellent food for children for bone and tooth building.

Vitamins are recently discovered constituents of food. Relatively little is known about the nature of vitamins save that they are indispensable for normal health and growth, and that if they are left out of the diet for a long period so-called "deficiency diseases" may develop. Absence of vitamin A is believed to induce rickets. Vitamin B is thought to prevent polyneuritis and beriberi. Milk is exceptionally valuable for providing vitamin B in abundance. Perfectly fresh raw milk often supplies vitamin C, but its scurvy-preventing power may be lost when it is heated or aged.

Each child should have a full quart of milk a day, if possible, is the advice given in the bulletin.

While certified raw milk is usually the cleanest milk obtainable, it usually costs a little more than ordinary milk. Good pasturized milk is satisfactory for children, if the juice of oranges, canned or raw tomatoes, or certain other vegetables and fruits is given to provide vitamin C. Directions for home pasteurization are given in the bulletin, together with an explanation of how bacteria get into milk the harm they cause, and the effect of careless handling upon them. A great many kinds of bacteria have

been found in milk. Some of them cause the formation of lactic acid, which gives sour milk its characteristic flavor, while others cause milk to putrefy if allowed to stand long enough. The bacteria that cause serious diseases may also get into milk, and are sometimes spread in this way, resulting in epidemics. Especial precautions as to cleanliness on the part of those who produce and handle milk are strongly urged.

NORMAL COLLEGES AND TEACHERS' ASSOCIATIONS

More and more the Normal Colleges of Texas are coming to receive due recognition in the Texas State Teachers' Associations. At the Dallas Convention, the ex-students of practically all the Normal Colleges of Texas held a "get-together" meeting, and three of these institutions gave luncheons. Plans are already on foot to have a meeting, at the next Association, of all ex-students of Texas Normal Colleges.

The following men and women from the various Normal Colleges of Texas were on the program: President J. A. Hill, President R. B. Binnion, President-Elect A. W. Birdwell, President C. E. Evans, President W. H. Bruce, President R. L. Marquis. Several faculty members from the Normal Colleges were elected as officers for the next meeting of the Association. From our institution Miss Mary Hill was elected chairman of the Library Section, and Miss Edna Haines, chairman of the Kindergarten Section. President Hill is a member of the Executive Council of the Association.

It is fitting that the Normal Colleges function in every phase of the Texas State Teachers' Association. These institutions have undertaken the important work of preparing teachers for all phases of public school work, and for this reason they are vitally interested not only in what the public schools of Texas are doing but also what they should further attempt. A close cooperation between the public schools of Texas and the Normal Colleges is essential to the welfare of both.

The greatest development in the school, however, has been in acquiring the degree of College Spirit which has been attained. At the beginning of the term this spirit was somewhat dormant, but with each week momentum was gained until the climax was reached on Thanksgiving day, when the Normal Buffaloes fought the Clarendon Bulldogs to a 14 to 14 tie. Never in the history of the institution, or in the history of the Panhandle, has there been such a spirit shown. And it is this spirit that will make the West Texas State Normal College known and felt throughout the West in the next few years.

The team was composed of the following: Harro Johnson, Ira Jenkins, Foy Terry, Joe Lancaster and Everett Key, all of Canyon; Grady Burson, Clyde Whitacre, and Howard Leonard, of Hale Center; Carl Scott and Delbert Bivins of Tulla; Charles Byrd and Roy Golden of Snyder; Dan Sanders of Wheeler; Otis Mitchell of Floydada; Blake Bolton of Wichita Falls; Clifford Henry of Portland; Otto Studor of Canadian; and Clyde Gordon of Mountain View, Oklahoma.

As shown by the following results, the team has made a good showing against all teams played, no team being able to go through the Buffalo defense for more than four touchdowns. The team scored a total of 134 points against a total of 114.

### E. B. BROWN ASSISTANT AT YALE

The other day I had a long and very interesting letter, from Elmer Brown, a 1915 graduate of the West Texas State Normal College and this year at Yale for his Ph. D. degree. Among other things, he said: "You probably will be surprised when I say that of all the places where I have worked I still rank the time I spent at Canyon as the most valuable in my education or 'evolution.' I mean by this that I believe I obtained more of the worth while during my sojourn there than during any period of equal time since."

After expressing a great desire to see his old Alma Mater again, he continued: "I came here with the understanding that I was to teach part of my time as a side issue. But, to my surprise, instead of a class room I was assigned the head Professor's private laboratory for a workshop, and my full time as his private research assistant. We have been quite successful; we have succeeded in publishing one article, and we have another in the press. I have been awarded the National Tuberculosis Association Fellowship and the problem of investigating the chemistry of the tubercle bacilli. This fellowship meets my financial obligations; and the two pounds of tubercle bacilli which accompanied it furnish material to keep me busy the remainder of the year."

To-day I was notified that I had been admitted to candidacy for the doctor's degree next June. The hardest part has been put in—my written exams are over. I still have to face the department and defend my thesis next spring.

After telling of several important occasions which he had attended—

notably the inaugural of President Angell and the conferring of a degree upon Marshal Foch,—he closed with the heartiest good wishes for our institution and the faculty members whom he knew while here in school.

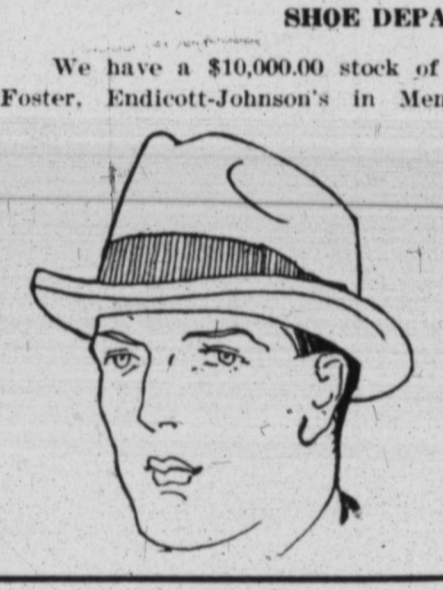

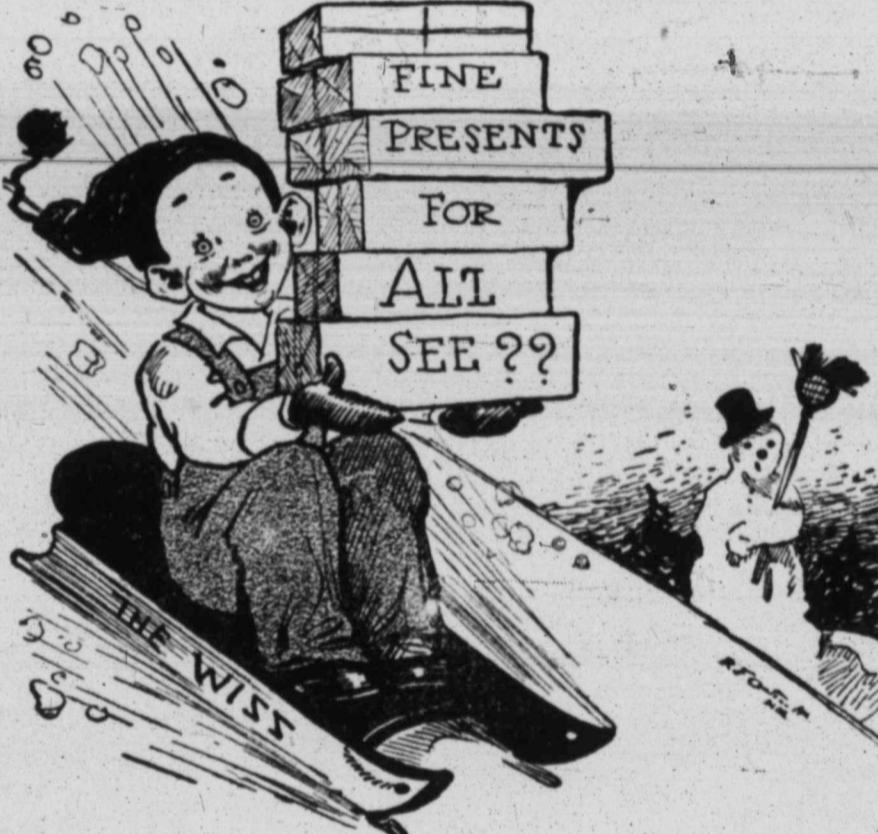

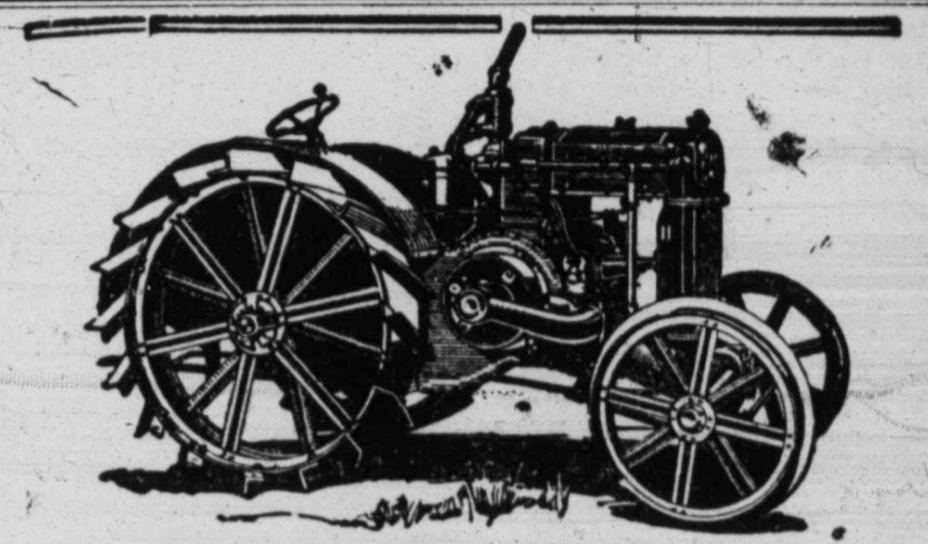

**COMMISSION FORM OF GOVERNMENT DISCUSSED**

 courts to be appointed by the Governor and ratified by the legislature. The bicameral system offers the politician a splendid hiding place from the glare of public criticisms, but the single-chambered legislature will make it more difficult to shift responsibility and escape public censure. We need not become alarmed and think that such concentration of power will lead to autocracy in government; for whom we confer authority on a public official at the same time we will be clothed with another power equally as great; viz. the recall.

"These are not new and strange ideas. They are familiar to every one of you. Our magazines and newspapers have been giving us articles on this subject for the past fifteen years. It is a matter of common knowledge that a machine does not exist as an end in itself, but as a means to an end. Its efficiency is tested not by the beauty of its arrangements but by the goods which it produces. A democratic government is judged not by the machinery which it has installed but by the products which flow from it. The products of a good government may be measured in terms of law enforcement, public service utilities, wise expenditure of public funds, and the development and creation of such instrumentalities as will bring happiness, and prosperity to the inhabitants of a state. There is no agency which human beings can devise that will be perfect, but there is such a thing as making improvements in human agencies which will more nearly satisfy the ends in view. The end of democratic government is the rule of the people and whatever device we adopt it is simply an agent which will give us that rule.

"What are the characteristics of the commission form of government? In the first place it may be interesting to you to know that over 400 cities in America are now using this system in one form or another. These cities range in size from 1000 inhabitants to that of several hundred thousand. A few cities have tried it, Denver, being one of them, and proved failures, but in spite of these reverses the enthusiasm for this form of government in cities and towns have continued to grow until it has reached the proportions mentioned above and in addition the states of Iowa, Kansas, North Dakota, Mississippi, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Oklahoma have passed laws authorizing their municipalities, under certain conditions, to adopt the plan. The outstanding characteristics may be summarized as follows: the city is considered as a business concern; from three to seven commissioners, depending upon the size of the town, are elected from the town at large to control its affairs in the same manner as a board of directors manage a bank or any other corporation; commissioners are elected without any reference to their political affiliations; these commissioners employ all of the officers of the town government; they also employ in many cases a city manager who is entrusted with the power to appoint, remove, and exercise general control over all subordinates. It may be of interest to note the advantages which are found in this form of government by commissioners who appoint a manager to run the business of the city. These are simplicity, efficiency and economy in organization, centralized authority, fixed definite responsibilities, business method, interest shown by a higher type of citizens in community service, the abolition of politics from the administration end of the government, and the co-ordination of the taxing and spending powers, thus overcoming the maladjustments so common to American public finance."
