The tap root of the peran needs no defense in the eres of all true lovers of nature's laws and experienced men. There are some who advocate that the pecan tree will do better without the tap root. A pecan tree can be grown under favorable conditions with an about one-never. To sustain this proposition I will discuss briefly, under three heads,-What is the tap root-

Its province-Its Importance. First: The tap root of the pecan, as well as that of other plants, begins at the surface of the soil or just below it, at the crown of the tree where is always the first to emerge when the nut is planted. Most all of the concentarted food of the nut goes first to create the tap root, which descends into the earth, often two or more feet, before the trunk is formed to ascen into the air. The tap root growth is always in advance of the trunk growth and only in proportion as the tap root descends into the earth and finds food and water will the trunk ascend. The tap root will live many years after the trunk is severed and when necessary

will grow a top every year to perpetuate life. Millions of acres of cleared land along the streams of Texas, where

pecan trees have been hewn down, many years ago, are struggling to grow another trunk in verification of this statement. The trunk will die in a few hours when deprived entirely another if transplanted.
