For some time I have felt that the church was not going forward as it should. I have been afraid that the cause lay in my leadership and when I learned last week that some of the members of the church thought that by changing pastors the church would function better, I wrote my resignation at once to take effect on the first of May. I asked that the resignation be accepted because I could not serve longer. Sunday night the church accepted my resignation. I shall be in town but a few times on Sunday for the next ninety days. The pulpit will be filled by the pastors of the Panhandle, who have asked me to do some work for the Baptist Assembly. With the deepest love for the church and also for the people of Canyon, I shall retire from the pastorate of this church. My future course is not yet determined.

Sixty-Six Ku Klux Klansmen Paraded in Canyon Friday

The Ku Klux Klan parade scheduled for Canyon Friday night was pulled off a little after eight o'clock.

The Klansmen gathered at the stock yards between seven and eight o'clock. More than twenty automobiles were counted to come down the highway from Amarillo, while only a few men were seen going from Canyon down to the meeting place. At first unmasked guards stood at the railroad to direct the Amarillo cars to the stock yards. These were later relieved by two men in the Klan garb who stood opposite the stock yards and directed the cars to the meeting place. From all indications, at least ninety percent of the 66 in parade must have come from Amarillo.

The parade came toward town, and came onto the square at the Kuehn & Farlow garage, marched once around the square, west past Keiser's office and turned north, going back to the point of beginning. The parade was headed by a man on horseback bearing the fiery cross, followed by another horseman carrying an American flag. A man walked on either side of the two horsemen. The remainder followed in a file, two abreast. Only two banners were displayed. One stated "Law and Order," while on the other was printed, "We want a clean city." These were the banners displayed in the recent Amarillo parade.

Manager A. J. Arnold received a long distance telephone call in the evening requesting that the street lights be cut off from eight until eight thirty o'clock. This was done.

One of the biggest crowds ever assembled in Canyon witnessed the parade, cars having come from Hereford, Happy and Tulla.

The crowd did not take the parade seriously, and all seemed to be disappointed that there was no more thrill accompanied with the parade.

Parents Claiming Boy Found Their Son Was at Home; Body to Kans

A mistake in identity led to Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Mathis of Haynesville, La., to claim the body of the boy killed at the Santa Fe crossing in Canyon two weeks ago as that of their home.

Arrangements had been completed for them to leave Thursday afternoon from Amarillo with the body, when a telegram was received stating that their son had returned home.

The body of the boy was identified Friday as being Clarence Hull, son of F. H. Hull of Wichita, Kansas, and the body was shipped to Mr. Hull at noon Friday.

Murder Charge Lodged Against Man for Death Woman North of City

A charge of murder was filed against Roy Broadus of Amarillo Tuesday in connection with the death of a young woman named Georgie Pile of Clayton, N. M., as the result of an episode on the highway five miles north of town Sunday afternoon.

The woman was taken into Amarillo by two women and three men, and died shortly after reaching the sanitarium. They told the officers who investigated that the woman had jumped from the taxi while it was running and had been run over.

It happened that two women living near the scene of the accident saw the events as they occurred and reported the facts to the officers as follows: The three women of the party got out of the car and started down the road hand in hand. The car started after them at full speed. Two of the women managed to jump aside but the third one was crushed by the car. The entire party got the injured woman into the car and went to Amarillo.

The scene of the trouble was between the Newt Reeves place and the Graves home.

The driver of the car, Broadus, must face the charge of murder, while one of the men and both of the women face the charge of perjury for the testimony given Monday in which they gave first version of the accident.

Sheriff Black has filed charges of drunkenness and disturbing the peace against all members of the party, and the murder and perjury charges are in Potter county.

It is expected that between twenty five and thirty men will take part in this stock judging contest.

PLANS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF WEST TEXAS STATE NORMAL DURING NEXT FIFTEEN YEARS DISCUSSED BY HILL

PRESIDENT SUBMITS TO COMMERCIAL LEAGUE PLANS FOR NEW BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS NECESSARY FOR THE SCHOOL.

There were forty two present at the Commercial League luncheon at the Ideal Cafe Tuesday noon.

Frank R. Phillips announced that the stock judging contest to be held here on February 24th was attracting a great deal of attention. There would be a number of representative teams from Panhandle schools, and he had invited all of the county agents to bring judging teams to the contest. He asked that the people of Canyon show these young people a good time and make them feel welcome while in the city.

Mr. Phillips asked that business men who could assist in any way boys or girls to make their way through college, do so. There are large numbers of requests coming every day from students wanting some way to make their way through the Normal.

President Hill stated that he had received about two hundred requests from boys and girls wanting work in the past six months.

D. A. Shirley announced that the athletic committee of the Normal would like to sell to the people of the city season tickets for the baseball season, with eight games guaranteed. He stated that the athletic program this year was by far the largest ever attempted in the school. This year the biggest schools in this section were being met, and the cost of getting these teams had been three to four times as much as had ever been paid out for schools closer to Canyon.

The committee is searching some means of raising sufficient funds to make athletics pay out, and the sale of season tickets for the baseball season has been suggested. Mr. Shirley called attention to the great amount of advertising which the Normal is receiving in the papers of the state on which had to have work in order to stay in school.

C. F. Walker urged that the athletic program of the Normal be supported, as this was one of the best ways of advertising the school.

S. B. Orton highly approved the proposed athletic program and was anxious to see the business men assist in every way to put it over. He realized that athletics were greatly responsible for the best advertising that any school can get.

President Hill stated that he believed clean athletics was one of the best things in a college and in college life. He believed that the Normal had the right kind of a coach to direct athletics, and that he exerted the right kind of influence over the men in his teams. The school had embarked upon the big athletic program this year, and had done big things. The school can do bigger things next year, count of the athletics this year. He believed that athletics was one of the best way to advertise a school, and called attention to the record made by Centre College. Mr. Shirley stated that the school did not believe in paying athletes as some schools were known to do, as this means professionals in athletics, but some good men but would never resort to paying their athletics just to get a winning team.

D. A. Shirley, R. A. Terrill and Coach Burton constituted a committee from the Normal to look after procuring work for the boys in athletics and to sell season tickets for the baseball season, while H. C. Gamble, T. V. Reeves and C. R. Burrow were appointed from among the citizens of the town.

PHILLIPS THINKS FARMERS SHOULD HAVE MORE HOGS

Frank R. Phillips, who has the Vocational Agriculture at the Normal, thinks that farmers should have more hogs. Each boy in the Stock Judging class of the Normal Training School has to keep some kind of an animal and try out his rations, which he works out in class. From figures compiled by the class, it may be reasonably assumed that kafir fed to hogs will bring twenty five per cent more than when sold in the local market. It is further pointed out that kafir in the head is less valuable than ground kafir, but far more valuable than threshed kafir which is not ground. Good results have been secured with one part of tankage to nine parts of ground kafir.

LECTURES AT THE NORMAL.

Two lectures of especial interest are to be held at the Normal chapel period on next Tuesday and Wednesday. The speaker is Paul J. Merrill and his subject will be "The Brotherhood of Man, as related to political parties and labor organizations as agencies of reform."

There is no admission charge and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Mr. Merrill has delivered this lecture in Amarillo, Plainview, Clarendon and other Panhandle towns, and his address was most enthusiastically received.

With this issue of the News our subscription rate will be reduced to \$1.50 per year. We take this step after serious consideration of several weeks. Those of our readers who are acquainted with conditions today will appreciate that a reduction in subscription rates at this time may look foolish on the part of the publisher. The paper that this issue of the News is printed on is costing 300 percent above prewar prices. The ink we use is 400 percent above prewar prices. Labor is more than double prewar days. Postage has increased 375 percent since 1914. Taxes on this printing plant are more than double 1914. Everything that goes into making the Randall County News is more than double the price of 1914. Why then the reduction, in spite of the fact that the price of the News was increased only 33 1/3 percent over 1914? It comes from the fact that the farmer is taking the biggest loss in the history on everything he raises and sells. His buying powers have been greatly reduced over the days of 1914. The News has not suffered loss in subscriptions on account of this decrease in the price of farm products, but today has a much larger subscription list than at any time in the history of this paper. We want the farmers to be able to continue as readers of this paper, and are willing therefore to make this sacrifice in the subscription price.

It begins to look as if the Geneva economic conference will never be held. The United States will not attend, since Harding would then be indulging in foreign politics, which is against his campaign promises. The Italian government went to smash last week, and Orlando is likely to be recalled as premier. France is not going to attend unless she is given assurance in advance that her rights are to be respected, which means that she will take an impossible stand. The little Welshman from England has the problem of Europe upon his shoulders more than ever before. He is the only statesman that has been able to weather the storms of reconstruction days. It is announced from London that England will start payment of the interest due the United States upon her war loans. It is the genius of Lloyd George, which is making it possible for England to make this payment.

It is very regrettable indeed that the gamblers indicted the athletes of Illinois and Notre Dame to violate the rules of their universities, and participate in the illegal games. When a bunch of dirty gamblers put their hands on athletes, they usually succeed in hurting a bunch of men. In this case, no doubt, all of the men engaged in the illegal game, were college men who were greatly in need of funds, and being appealed to by the gamblers were easily induced to earn a little spare cash, with the result that they disgraced their universities, and barred themselves from further college athletics. The gamblers in the case are the ones who should be ferried out and made to suffer.

Jim Ferguson announces that he has wrecked the American Party, and will run for the U. S. senate as a candidate on the Democratic ticket. Jim has as unique a platform as he is a man. It may be expected that he will receive a very good following from all parts of the state as there are found in every community many men who have as radical views as does Jim Ferguson. Fortunately for the state, Jim and his followers are very much in the minority.

There are more than 60 men in Randall county who believe in a clean town and the enforcement of the laws, and they do not wear a mask to proclaim the fact. It takes more nerve to say to a man's face that he is in the wrong or a law breaker, than it does to put on a mask and gang up to make a pretense of law enforcement.

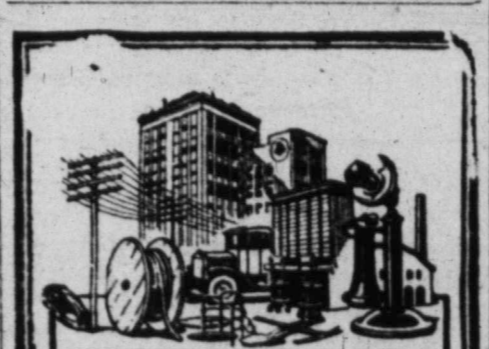

Y. M. AND Y. W. SECURE LECTURERS ON VOCATIONS

Through the co-operation of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., the students of this institution are to have a course in vocational guidance equal to that of many Northern Universities. The object of this course, as the name implies, is to give boys and girls definite information about the cost, the time required for preparation, and the returns to be expected of the various professions and trades of the present day. Prof. Frank R. Phillips, who has been asked by the Christian Organizations and faculty of the college to arrange a series of lectures for this work, announces the list of speakers secured. Mr. Frank R. Jamison, Managing Editor of the Amarillo Tribune, gave the first lecture Wednesday at four o'clock. Other speakers are Dr. Vineyard, on the profession of medicine; Mr. Guy Fallow, Manager Amarillo City Light and Power Company, on engineering; Mr. T. B. The ladies were met at the trains by members of the faculty and hospitably entertained in the homes of the town. At chapel, Friday morning, the student body enjoyed the thoughtful and practical discussion of Mrs. Phebe K. Warner on the "Joys of Service."

On Saturday morning at the chapel period Mrs. Goodman of Abernathy made a highly appreciated address and expressed her appreciation of the advantages the College offers. Short talks were made also by Misses Neal and Hamner and Mesdames Henry, Thompson, Barks, Wells, and Masterson.

The Seventh District has a wide area, consisting of fifty-two counties and likewise a large range of interests. It is the desire of the officers of this district to establish through the West Texas State Normal College Credit Courses in Club Work. The occasion of the visit was for the purpose of formulating plans with the College authorities for these courses.

The Club women went into executive session with a committee from the College who submitted a plan of study for the following credit courses: Sociology, Education, History, and English. Should the plans of the clubs materialize, inestimable benefit will be derived by this opportunity given to those beyond the College doors.

On Friday afternoon, the members of the Book Club of Canyon with the faculty entertained in the Home Economics Department in honor of the College guests. The receiving line was composed of Mrs. Hill, Club guests, Officials of the Book Club and the Women Deans of the College.

The dining room was effectively decorated in College colors of crimson and white. The soft glow of red candles with the crimson and white carnations form a harmonious setting for the musical selections given by Misses Grace Brewer, Rose Stewart, and Anadel Guenther under the supervision of Miss Clark. The music was greatly appreciated by the guests.

On Friday evening the visiting ladies were guests of the college at the entertainment given in the auditorium by the College Orchestra and Chorus.

The visitors expressed cordial appreciation of the exceptionally good equipment of the college and the advantages afforded the student-body and community.

Indeed, it seems strange, when one comes to think of it, that there has not been closer co-operation between the women's organizations and the West Texas State Normal College. There is no interest which lies closer to a woman's heart than the proper education of her children and the final end of all club activities is the improvement of the rising generation.

When a woman joins a club she expects, indeed, to derive personal pleasure and self-improvement therefrom, but she also expects that what she gets will help her to function more satisfactorily as a mother, as a sister, as a servant of the community in which she resides. In short, she expects that what she gets she will be able to give of those with whom she comes in contact—and these, for the most part, are young people. The Normal College is training teachers for the children, and next to mother the teacher is the most important factor in the life of

the child. The women, therefore, have an inherent and natural interest in the work of the Normal College.

In order to bring the Clubs and the College closer together and render them mutually serviceable, a plan was adopted by the Club representatives and the College authorities whereby the clubs may have their programs worked out by the College along definite and uniform lines.

It is also planned that under certain conditions those members of the clubs who complete the programs as outlined by the college may receive college credit therefor. This will direct many women toward college work and probably hold in the teaching profession a large number of women who would otherwise leave the profession. The State is to-day losing the services of many women who prepare themselves to teach and who, after marriage, drift out of the work for which they prepared themselves. By keeping the contact with a teacher-training institution it is believed that many of these women whose life experience has been enriched through motherhood and who are therefore better prepared to teach than are thousands of our young and inexperienced girls, will continue in the service of the schools and thus render to the state a constantly increasing return upon its investment.

The purposes of the plan as set out by Mrs. Phebe K. Warner, the originator of the idea, will be printed in a later issue of this paper.

Mrs. Carl G. Goodman of Abernathy is Chairman of this District and enthusiastically supports the plan. In fact, Mrs. Goodman has under consideration other plans of co-operation which will no doubt materialize in the near future and will mean a distinct advance in the development of the Panhandle-Plains region.

That after defendant abandoned plaintiff, there was born to plaintiff, a baby girl, who was four years old her last birthday. That her name is Frances Gaynell Hedge, and that this defendant has never furnished said child any means of support, whatsoever. That plaintiff is able and willing to care for, educate and maintain said child.

That the residence and whereabouts of defendant is unknown to plaintiff and have been unknown to her for four years next before the filing of this suit.

Wherefore plaintiff prays that citation issue in terms of the law, and on final trial hereof she be granted a divorce, dissolving the bonds of matrimony existing between her and defendant, and a decree of your Court giving and granting to her the exclusive possession, control, care, custody, education, raising and maintaining her said child to the exclusion of the defendant. To all legal, equitable, general and special relief which she may show herself entitled and for costs.

Herein fail not, but have you before said Court, on the first day of the next term thereof, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

On this 6th day of February, 1922, the City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, convened in regular session at its regular meeting place in the city hall, all members thereof, to-wit: J. D. Gamble, the mayor, and Aldermen J. W. Reid, C. D. Lester, T. C. Thompson, G. G. Foster, Grady Oldham and C. N. Harrison, being present, among other proceedings had was the following:

It was moved by Alderman J. W. Reid, and seconded by Alderman C. D.

Lester, that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the said city, who are property taxpayers therein, the proposition for the issuance of the bonds of the said city in the sum of \$20,000, for the purpose of street improvements, the election to be held on the 11th day of March, 1922; the motion carried by the following vote: Aldermen J. W. Reid, C. D. Lester, T. C. Thompson, G. G. Foster, Grady Oldham and C. N. Harrison, voting AYE; and none voting NO.

Thereupon the following Election Order was adopted:
Whereas, the City Council of the City of Canyon deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:
Therefore, Be It Ordered By The City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, that an election be held on the 11th day of March, 1922, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Canyon, in the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars, payable twenty years from the date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after ten years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of street improvements in the City of Canyon, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws passed at the Regular Session of the 37th Legislature, 1921, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of Canyon, and the following named person is hereby appointed manager of said election, to-wit: A. M. Smith.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"For the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"Against the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections. It is further ordered that if the proposition for the issuance of the bonds herein described receives a favorable vote of the qualified property taxpayers of said city, voting at the election hereby ordered, then the City Council shall issue such bonds in lieu of an issue of \$20,000 of street improvement bonds authorized at an election held in said City of Canyon on October 30, 1920, and which have not been issued and sold, it being the intent hereof that the proposed bonds shall be the same in every respect as the bonds authorized at the election held October 30, 1920, except they shall mature twenty years from the date thereof with option of redemption at any time after ten years from their date, and shall be dated on a date subsequent to the date of the election hereby ordered.

A copy of this order, signed by the mayor of the City of Canyon, attested by the city secretary of the said city, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for five weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

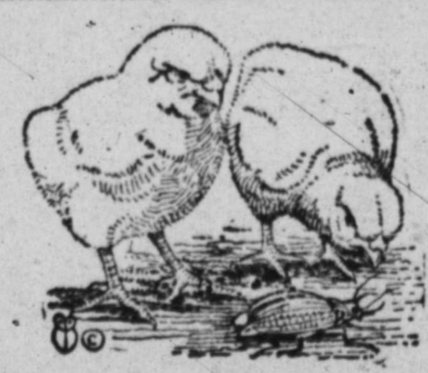

PLAN DISCUSSED DEVELOPMENT OF NORMAL BY PRESIDENT HILL
(Continued from first page)

Speaking department of the Normal gave a reading which was very highly appreciated by the members of the League.

President J. A. Hill, leader of the day, then took charge of the program and discussed the plans he had in mind for the future development of the West Texas State Normal College.

Mr. Hill stated that whenever any improvements were to be made, the question always arose as to the most advantageous place to place buildings. He had therefore secured the services of a landscape architect, who drew plans for the campus, and made locations for the buildings which he had in mind for the school. The program might take twenty five years to accomplish, but Mr. Hill believed it necessary to look ahead and plan for the future. He wanted to lay the plans before local people in order that they might be thinking in terms of the future, and assist with this plan of development.

Mr. Hill called attention to the great growth that had been made in the school during the eleven years of its history. The present equipment is worth more than three-quarters of a million dollars. There are many things needed now, and Mr. Hill wants all the citizens to understand and appreciate these needs.

Mr. Hill hopes that the next legislature will appropriate \$100,000 with which to finish the dormitory. When completed, Cousins Hall will accommodate about 200 girls. According to the architect's drawing, another dormitory would be located south of the Hall, facing the north. This additional dormitory will not be asked for now.

To the west of Cousins Hall, will be located the home demonstration cottage, where girls of the home economics department would live and put into practice the work of their department.

At the east end of the walk leading from the main building to Cousins Hall, Mr. Hill wants the infirmary located, a modern building costing \$30,000 to \$40,000. Mr. Hill stated that the school now had a temporary infirmary made from the frame building on the campus. It has ten beds and an operating room. It is a remarkably well equipped building considering the fact that it can only be a temporary arrangement. Mr. Hill hopes that the Normal will do the big thing and donate funds that a good building may be made possible for the infirmary.

Extensive plans are made for the development of the agricultural department, covering the thirty acres of land which were recently purchased.

The boiler house will be extended west and north and a second story added in order that all of the manual training department may be moved from the main building.

The plans contemplate that the president's home shall be removed from the campus, and that on this site will stand the science building. Mr. Hill does not believe that it is advisable for the president's home to be located upon the campus.

The athletic field is to be enlarged covering a part of the land recently bought. Groves of trees will be planted on the west in order to protect the field from the winds. Mr. Hill hopes to enclose the field in fence, and believes that there would have been no deficit in the athletic fund this year if it had been possible to collect all of the admissions. A larger grand stand is contemplated.

South of the grand stand is contemplated a gymnasium and physical education building costing \$100,000 to \$150,000. Mr. Hill stated that young men and women going out to teach in order to be successful must know how to direct play and games.

On the southwest part of the campus, just in front of Huntleigh Hall will be located the training school building. Mr. Hill hopes that the next legislature will give the school this much needed building. There are now more than 800 people in the main building, and it is crowded. This school was the first Normal in Texas to have a training school, and is now the only one which does not have a separate training school building. Mr. Hill will leave next week on an inspection trip to Nebraska, Iowa and Wisconsin to see some of the most successful normal colleges and study their plans of training schools.

North of the training school building would be a play ground with all modern equipment.

To the west of the main building would be the library building. Mr. Hill stated that the library has outgrown its present quarters and there is great need of a new building for the library.

To the north of the library, and between the proposed gymnasium the plans call for a boys' dormitory. Mr. Hill stated that he was not sure as to the boys' dormitory. He was not yet convinced that a large dormitory

was a better way of handling boys than in smaller groups.

Another building called for in the plans was a college cafeteria. All of the other normals have cafeterias this year, and they are highly successful.

Another improvement is that contemplated for the grounds. The inside iron fences are to be taken down, but the one around the outside of the grounds will stay. The drives are to be built up and hard surfaced. Ornamental electric posts are to be placed at the entrances of the grounds.

Mr. Hill says that a final effort is being made to save the trees from the bores, and new ones are being set in to replace those which have died.

Mr. Hill stated that he was glad to show this drawing to the citizens of Canyon and asked that each citizen take a personal interest in the program that is proposed. He wants every citizen to understand the program and help put it over. He was proud of the way all Panhandle people were behind the school and the interest that was being taken in the school by the commercial organizations and newspapers of this section. Hearty response was made to all proposals for the benefit of the school. He realized that the program might take a number of years to carry out, but with the right kind of cooperation, he trusted it could be accomplished within fifteen years.
