Crops have never looked better in Castro County at this season of the year. The two major crops, cotton and corn, give promise of a bumper crop year provided there is a reasonable amount of cooperation by the weatherman.

A trip to Lubbock with only a highway view of crop conditions, between here and there, convinced me that we have much better chance for a good crop than our neighbors to the south and east.

Though 1980 is an election year many of the political decisions and much of the electioneering will be done before the dawn of the new year. A number of potential presidential candidates have already tested the water and decided that it was the wrong temperature for a plunge.

The republican ticket is still wide open, and undoubtedly many of the more widely known republican candidates will make an active effort for the nomination. They all have my blessings in the nominating procedure, and may the best man win. The democrats have always preferred to take on the best the opposition could offer.

President Carter will be nominated and reelected on the democratic ticket. So far the congress, the press and the public have thrown every conceivable roadblock possible in his way as he attempted to govern and lead the nation. I haven't agreed with all of the president's decisions, but in the main I believe he deserves a much better grade than he is getting from the political punsters and so-called polls.

The proclaimed lack of leadership by this administration, if true, could possibly, in large part, result from the tendency of the public to refuse leadership. A president, any president, deserves more cooperation than has been given to President Cart-

People in this country should pay attention when the president warns that the oil companies have too much influence with congress.

Newman told the city commissioners at their last meeting that five of Dimmitt's six police officers may soon be looking for better jobs since the commission refused to grant a pay raise.

Asked if problems other than pay existed in the police department, Newman said, "Pay is the only problem that I am aware of. I felt a raise was due to the police department, and the only objective was to ask for a pay increase. It was not granted, and I think that should be the end

City Manager Garnett Holland said, "One thing I am for is a raise for all city employees. With inflation the way it is, a raise is needed. People are having a hard time making it, but I don't think one department should get a raise without all of them getting

The last increase in the police pay scale was in November 1977. Only one officer who was on the force at that time is still employed

by the department. Elmer Youts's motion for a police pay raise at the last commission meeting, Commissioner J. R. Brown said, "We declined to allow for raises in the budget (adopted in June by unanimous vote) because of the state of the economy, and I don't see where the situation has im-

proved any. He added that he felt there would be "problems galore" if a raise were granted to policemen and not to other city employees.

Mrs. Lee was a member of the Church of Christ.



### **Energy tax break bill** introduced by Hance

Hance (D-TX) has introduced major tax incentive legislation which provides for depreciation of "qualified energy" refinery facilities over a five year period.

"I think this type of legislation is what we need to get us out of the energy crunch" said Hance. "If we can create a real incentive for private industry then we will have accomplished something toward solving the energy crisis. However, we will never get anywhere if we don't create some major programs very

Hance's bill calls for tax breaks for the production of "qualified energy" which includes synthetic fuels, solar and wind energy, diesel, heating oil, fuels from shale and coal and alcohol-related fuels.

The bill also provides tax incentives for the production of unleaded gasoline for motor vehicles from any re-

The legislation by the Texas congressman allows private industry to receive accelerated depreciation on any qualif-

U.S. Representative Kent Also included are facilities used for research, bulk storage and equipment used as an integral part of qualified energy production.

> "What the bill does is allow private industry to amortize or depreciate their facilities over a five year period," he added. "Not only will this give us increased fuel supplies, but it will build up additional tax bases in communities where otherwise this would not happen without this type of incen-

> 'If we are truly interested in declaring 'war' on the energy problem then we need to stop talking and start acting," said Hance. "The fastest way to get new and added forms of energy is to provide a real reason for private industry to get involved. My bill does just that."
