THE "RETURN" OF GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS

Detroit Free Press: Since Grand Duke Nicholas, former commander in chief of the Imperial Russian armies, is a man as well as a Romanoff, and a great patriot and hero to boot, it is good to learn definitely that he and his wife are in safety in Italy. The experiences of the pair immediately after the rise of bolshevism, and the manner in which they made their escape from Russia is a good deal of a secret, and since the Grand Duke declines to talk, is likely to remain so for the present. It is certain that the conflicting stories of their death and imprisonment furnish little light.

The Grand Duke and Grand Duchess have been cordially received by King Victor Emmanuel, who officially recognizes their presence in his kingdom. The two unquestionably deserve all courtesy from Italy and from every one of the allied and associated powers, for the world owes Nicholas a big debt of gratitude.

Regardless of what may have been the defects of the Government the Grand Duke represented in the field, he was a great champion and supporter of the cause of human liberty; and more than once he saved the ally cause from destruction by the fight he put up against the Germans in front of him and the German agents to the rear of him in Petrograd, even in the very household of his nephew, the Czar. Indeed, all things considered, what Nicholas accomplished was wonderful and some of his exhibitions of generalship were the admiration of his foes as well as of his allies. If he had received even ordinary decent support from the Petrograd Government the war would have ended much sooner and more triumphantly than it did, the world would have been saved much suffering, and Russia would not be today in a state of horrible confusion and appalling desolation.

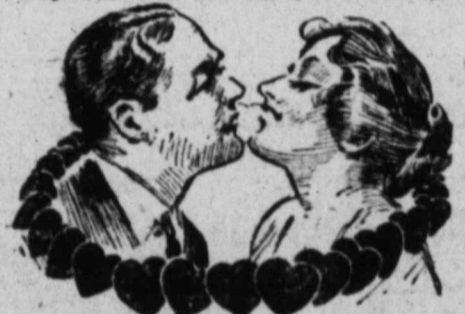

PUNISHMENT FOR "REDS"

Cincinnati Enquirer: A measure embodying proposals contained in bills introduced by Senators Sterling, North Dakota; Walsh, Montana, and others, has just been favorably reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Under this bill persons exhibiting the red flag or advocating the overthrow of the Government would be subject to Federal prosecution. It seems sufficiently comprehensive, setting forth that "it shall be unlawful for any person, to advocate or advise the overthrow, or to write or knowingly to print, publish, utter, sell, or distribute any document, book, circular, paper, journal or other written or printed publication in or by which there is advised the overthrow by force, or violence or by physical injury to person or property, of the Government authorities, or to advocate resistance to authority by force or violence so as to prevent or delay the execution of any law."

The exhibition of any flag or emblem intended to symbolize a purpose to overthrow by force or violence either the Government of the United States or all government also would be a violation of the law.

The penalties provided in the measure are \$5,000 fine and five years' imprisonment, or both; and in the case of aliens convicted of violations, their deportation would follow the conclusion of the prison sentence.

Such legislation is demanded by present conditions. Its early enactment into law will be hailed by all patriotic citizens with unqualified approval. It is time that the revolutionists who are printing, publishing and preaching propaganda inimical to the welfare of this Government be dealt with. The sooner these dangerous fanatics are placed behind bars or deported overseas the better it will be for this Nation, which gave them hav-

en and protection, opportunities which they flagrantly and traitorously have abused by seeking to wreck constitutional government and erect upon its ruins some phantasmal communism where all men and women would be reduced to a dead level of socialistic pattern; where the shop and the factory would be the only temples dedicated to the salvation of society.

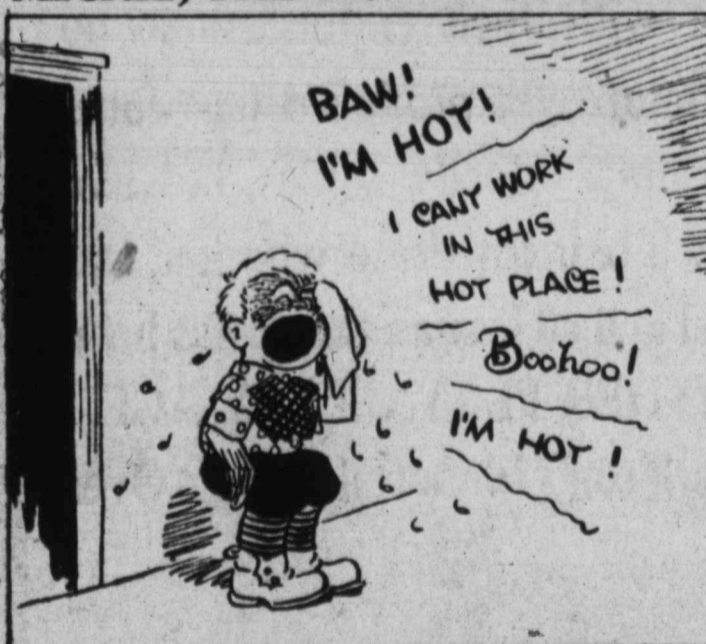


