

The costs shall be apportioned to abutting property and the owners thereof in each district according to the front foot plan of rule, provided that if the application of this rule shall in the opinion of the City Council be unjust or unequal, or result in individual cases in assessments in excess of special benefits in the enhanced value of property by means of said improvements then the City Council shall adopt such rule of apportionment as shall effect a substantial equality between said owners and their property, considering the benefits received and the burdens imposed; and provided further that in no case shall an assessment be levied against any property or the owner thereof for any part of the cost of improvement in any district in excess of the special benefits in the enhanced value of such property by means of such improvements in such district, each district being considered as a separate and independent unit of improvement, and the omission of any improvement in any district, or in any part of any district, shall not in anywise affect or impair assessments levied in any district, or in any part of any district where the improvements shall be constructed. Such assessments shall be and constitute the first enforceable lien and claim against the property, against which it is assessed superior to all other liens and claims, except state, county, and municipal taxes, and shall also be a personal liability and charge against the true owners of such property.

This resolution shall take effect from and after its passage.




