SIDELIGHTS OF THE PRIMARY HELD IN TEXAS SATURDAY

MAYFIELD AND FERGUSON IN SENATORIAL RUN-OFF

Several Run-Offs for Randall County's Offices-Smaller Vote Than Anticipated Cast Saturday.

The primary election Saturday contained a number of surprises all the way down from the senatorial race to the local county races.

Mayfield and Ferguson are leading in the senatorial race, and will contend for the senatorial toga on the fourth Saturday in August.

Governor Neff won a majority of the votes cast, defeating his three opponents. Rogers developed considerably more strength than was ever thought possible.

There will be run-offs in various state offices.

Judge Henry Bishop was re-elected district judge over Perry S. Pearson of Amarillo by more than 1100 votes. Bishop carried Randall, Armstrong and Douley counties by good majorities, but lost Potter county by a small majority.

W. J. Flesher of Canyon was defeated for the office of district attorney by Lloyd Fletcher of Amarillo. Mr. Flesher carried Randall, Armstrong and Donley counties, but his opponent came out of Amarillo with a lead of 1250 votes, which Mr. Flesher was unable to overcome.

Returns nidicate that W. H. Bledsoe of Lubbock has defeated Arthur H. King for the state senate.

Word from Plainview indicates that Burke Mathes has defeated T. J. Tilson for the legislature by a large majority. Randall county was in the Plainview district until the law was

Sheriff W. C. Black was re-elected by a majority of 373.

There will be a run-off in the county judge race, Worth A. Jennings leading R. L. Lester by 32 votes. Phil Jackson polled 284.

In the five cornered clerk's race, O. W. Gano, present clerk, lead the field with 37 votes more than Mrs. Frank J. Woods, his nearest opponent. Mr. Gano and Mrs. Woods will be in the run-off.

Tom Redell lend in the assessor's 369 race, with D. Mack Stewart his closest opponent, Redell having 114 votes 509 more than Stewart. They will be in 307 the run-off.

Mrs. Myra Smith was re-elected county treasurer, getting 12 votes 360 more than both of her opponents.

W. C. Baird, P. D. Hanna and J. J. Bauer were re-elected county com-58 missioners. There will be a run-off 49 in the fourth precinct between Andy Costley and W. E. Bennett.
