TAX RATE OF **ONE DOLLAR IS** SET BY COUNTY

VALUATIONS CUT ONE THIRD FOR THIS YEAR BY COURT

Taxes Will Amount to About the Same In Money-School Rates Are Named

At the meeting of the Commissioners Court yesterday the tax rate for Randall County was set for the coming year at \$1.00 on the \$100 valuation. The rate was 76 cents for last year. However, the court ordered a reduction of valuations one-third under last year which will make the amount of money collected this year about the same as that collected last year. The following is the distribution of the tax levy :

PAY FOR ATTENDANCE UPON INSTITUTE

On July 18, 1922, I received from the Office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction the following ruling covering the attendance of teachers upon institutes:

"I hold that the repeal of this section of the law was unintentional on the part of the Legislature, for it is evident that its members were not aware that they had performed this act. It was the evident intent of the Legislature, in requiring teachers to attend county institutes, also to require that they should eceive their regular salary for the time so spent. Therefore, by the authority which I believe to be vested in me as State Superintendent of Public Instruction. I hereby make the ruling, that, until such time as the Legislature may convene in special or general session, and have an opportunity to correct this unintended repeal, teachers shall, as in the past, receive their regular salary for the time spent in attendance at teachers' institutes." 2. A record of the daily attnedance of all teachers will be sent to the County Judge or County Superintendent whose teachers are in attendance upon the Institute.

8. The program and all numbers on the program will begin and close on scheduled time. No one speaker has the right to time allotted to any other speaker. Besides, teachers of all people should be systematic.

4. An Employment Bureau will be maintained for the benefit of school authorities in need of teachers. Teachers desiring a position should report at the Prairie Office, first floor.

5. Social occasions will be arranged in order that teachers may get acquainted with each other. On Tuesday Evening at 8:30 o'clock, the West Texas State Normal College and the citizens of Canyon will entertain the teachers in the college auditorium.

6. All teachers should register immediately upon arriving. A table will be provided for this purpose just in front of the main entrance to the auditor-fum. No teacher will be considered as having "registered" who has not paid the fee (\$1.50) voted by the teachers in the 1921 Institute.

They should buy a ticket showing continuous passage to Canyon from the place to which they expect to return. Rates have been granted on the certificate plan, and teachers should request of the Agent from whom they purchase a ticket to Canyon a certificate indicating the purpose for which this ticket was purchased. They should preserve this certificate and present it to Travis Shaw (Secretary) when they arrive in Canyon. If these regulations are complied with in every particular, teachers who are bona fide attendants upon the meeting will be entitled to one-half fare on the return ticket to the point from which they purchased their tickets
