

King, Supt. Robert Ryan and tax consultant Jim Mc-Morries represented the DISD before the state appeals board Nov. 1, to challenge the evaluations established by the State School Tax Assessment Practices Board.

Per-pupil cost is formulated by dividing total school expenditures by the number of students. Dimmitt's schools had 1,623 students in 1977 and 1,600 in 1978.



Vietnam Era veterans who have 90 days of continuous service with at least one day being the period from Aug. 5, 1964 to May 7, 1975, are eligible for VA guaranteed home loans. Prior to a new law they had to have 181 days.

Also, for all WWII, Korea and Vietnam veterans the new maximum limitations have been increased to \$25,000 or 60% of the appraised value of the property to be purchased, home improvement or refinancing of an existing home mortgage loan. Mobil home loan limitations have also been increased.

The Veterans Administration is making a special effort to acquaint a quarter of a million surviving spouses of veterans as to their possible eligibility for an additional monthly benefit payment just authorized by Congress.

Waco VA Regional Office Director Jack Coker said the new added payment of \$45 a month will go to Texas widows or widowers now on VA Dependency and Indemnity Compensation rolls who are so disabled as to be confined to their homes or immediate premises, yet not so ill as to require nursing home care or the aid and attendance of another person.

Although the agency knows the identity of those receiving DIC and aid and attendance payments, it has no way of knowing how many of the DIC recipients are sufficiently disabled to be eligible for the new benefit.

Prior to the passage of this new benefit, these individuals were not covered for a confining disability that did not require nursing home care or aid and attendance, so they have never applied.

To alert potential beneficiaries, Coker said his agency has enclosed a notice of the new benefits category with its November DIC checks.

The VA official also said he's asking national veterans organizations to assist the


