





Governor Neff has vetoed the Pope will which would have nuified the textbook awards of last December. This was the thing the Governor was expected to do, and the thing he should have done. The awards, no doubt, were unjustifiable at this time, but there is nothing in the law to prevent such awards, and, nothing in the record shows that the members did an illegal act when the changes were made. The fault was not in the award, but in the entire so-called free text-book system. The system is a farce from the ground ap, and should be repealed in toto. The outburst against the changes made last winter may have a good effect in the state, and if it leads to the repeal of the law, the commission will have done a great thing for Texas in making these excessive changes

In an exceptional year France raises nearly enough wheat to supply its needs, but after a mediocre harvest like that of 1922, it has to import large quantities, from abroad. On account of the rate of exchange France in 1922 had to pay seventy francs abroad for an amount of wheat that was only worth twenty-five francs at home. An agricultural congress at Paris recently organized a campaign to enable France and its colonies to raise all the wheat it will need after 1923. The campaign will urge not so much increased acreage as better methods, better seed and better fertilizer.


