valuable information regarding the planting of trees:

Tree holes should be four feet in diameter:

Holes should be three feet deep;

When the tree is set, only top earth should be placed around the root, and there must be no frozed earth placed next to roots;

If the roots are broken, cut away injured parts;

Place roots in natural position; Place tree about same depth as it shows to have been before; Pack top earth firmly around the roots;

In filling holes, leave ground sloping to the trees in order to hold all the water:

To have cut this much from the cost of the building, would have meant one of two things-first, a fire trap building, poorly constructed; or in the second place, a building far too small for present needs, to say nothing about the future needs of the district. Without a doubt, the trustees did the right thing in accepting the bid on the new high school building at the time, even though it has become necessary to ask for this additional small bond issue to pay for the equipment in the building.

The \$15,000 asked for in this bond issue is not a cent more than is needed right now to finish up the school equipment. A great deal more equipment is really needed, but the trustees are running the school just as economically as possible, and will not spend a cent more in the equipment of the building than is necessary at this Canyon got at least a ten thousand dollar bid on the new school building than was made on any high school job on the Plains this year. Canyon has the biggest school problem of any town in Texas. Canyon has the highest per capita public school attendance of any town in Texas.
