

The court refused to go into the merits of the case and settle the question of validity of the contracts, but entirely side-stepped this question. Now Comptroller Lon Smith steps in and takes up the fight started by Mr. Marrs, refusing to issue state warrants in payment of the books purchased from the book companies involved in the case. We trust that the case will be kept in court until such a time that the state has no need for these books and cannot be forced to pay for them. The contracts probably are valid, butthe entire idea of "free" textbooks is pure bunk.

The following letter from a former graduate of the Canyon high school was received this week by Supt. A. D. Payne and was greatly enjoyed by the students of the school when read to them at chapel period:

Montrose, Colorado, April 28, 1924. Superintendent, Canyon High School, Canyon, Texas. Dear Sir:

Twenty-one years ago, in May, 1903, the first class of graduates from Canyon City (Texas) high school was awarded diplomas. The members of the class were: Misses Ona Long. Belle Shotwell, Cummie Redfearn, La-Rose Bratton, Mary Wansley, and Tom Frank Wilson and Dean B. McGue. Prof A. Ernsberger was superintendent and together with his estimable wife, composed the entire high school faculty. Miss Vera Odell entering in mid-year, in 1902, was awarded a diploma that year, inasmuch as she had been a member of the graduating class in the town from which she came.

Commencement day is near once more, and although more than a score of years have passed, memory carries me-back to Canyon City, for-




