How Often Do You Use Your Telephone?

Lynch Davidson, candidate for governor, spoke twice Friday in Canyon to large audiences.

Shamrock Man Goes in Cheese Making Business As a Side Line

While doing Lyceum work about five years ago in the southern part of Idaho, A. M. Hilburn conceived the idea of a cheese factory at Shamrock. In the section through which he was inveling at that time, almost every town has a cheese factory, and he was given every opportunity to study the industry. It was not Mr. Hilburn's plan at that time to establish the factory himself, but to induce a good cheese maker to come to Shamrock. He became acquainted with the man who had the reputation of being the best cheese maker in Idaho and sought to get him to come to this city but was not able to do so.

Later, while traveling in Wisconsin, the greatest cheese producing state in the Union, he made other attempts to get a cheese maker to come to Shamrock but all the best ones were busy and prosperous and could not be prevailed upon to leave. He then decided to learn cheese making himself and devoted his spare fime between Lyceum dates to that end. He relates that he had to pay the first cheese maker he worked for. After gaining a little experience he was allowed to work for nothing. He studied cheese making from every angle and became an expert cheese maker thru practical experience in the factories of Wisconsin, some of the larger of which produce as much as 17,000 lbs., of cheese daily.

Establishes Plant Here.

At the close of the last Lyceum season he returned home and announced his intention of establishing a cheese making plant. His friends, ourselves included, thought at first that he was only joking and it was only when he made use of the Texan's office typewriter to make orders for cheese making equipment that we became convinced of his earnestness.

Mr. Hilburn has made a model factory at his home about half a mlie south of town. His present plant is small in size, but big in its possibilities he has all the equipment necessary for cheese making and has had a special cellar dug for the curing and ripening process.
