SUMMER SESSION OF COLLEGE ENDS LAST SATURDAY

INDICATIONS GOOD FOR A BIG ATTENDANCE THIS FALL,

Students Here During Summer from 137 Counties of Texas and Eight Different States.

The College closed Saturday one of the best summer sessions in the fourteen years' history of the institution. The total enrollment for the College last year has been 2,300 students.

During the summer session there was an enrollment of 1,350. These came from 137 counties of Texas and from eight states other than Texas. There were twenty-one students from New Mexico; eleven from Oklahoma; one from Arizona: three from Arkansas; one from California; two from Colorado; one from Illinois; two from

According to a change in the plans of the College, there was no graduation exercises at the close of the summer session, but all degree people were given a place in the graduation exercises held in May. Degrees were issued to twenty-two during the this

President J. A. Hill believes that the College will have a larger enrollment in September than there was last year, andthat the growth will be more rapid the next twelve months than in any past period of the school's history.

A great effort will be made this fall by the College authorities to have every student take part in some form of college activity aside from his recitation. Young men and women will be urged to do literary society, church, Sunday School, and other work which will train them in meeting their fellow

Hill Presents Budget of College to Regents and Board of Control

President J. A. Hill went to Austin this week to discuss with the Board of Control and the Board of Regents for Teachers Colleges the appropriation for the College during the coming two years which will be presented to the legislature by the Board of Control in January.

Mr. Hill is asking for a total of \$929,025 for the coming two years. Of this amount \$321,043 is for buildings and permanent improvements,

According to the statement of the Board of Control given to the press Sunday, all departments of state are asking for \$35,497,190 for the coming two years. The appropriations of the last legislature amounted to \$24,757,-

Practically every school is asking for new buildings and salary adjustments, while the general appropriations for the various offices and departments in Austin are asking for inreased appropriations.
