

Stinnett Bank Loses \$6,000 to Robbers as **Officers** Are Absent

STINNET, Texas.-Timing their attack during the absence of the county's two leading law enforcers, two men followed an employe of the First State Bank of Stinnet into the bank after it opened for business Friday and escaped with approximately \$6,000 in cash.

Shortly after Leo Franks, assist-ant cashier, had unlocked the front door, the men, both unmasked, enter-ed. One of them, a tall person, stood guard at the door while his much smaller companion forced Franks into the vault, from which the loot was obtained

After handcuffing Mr. Franks and closing the vault door, the men de-parted. The door, however, failed to lock and about ten minutes after the robbers fled, Mr. Franks made his way from the vault to give the alarm. Sheriff C. O. Moore and Depucy Sheriff Red Burton were in Wichita Falls at the time of the robbery and J. T. Peyton, cashier, who lived over the bank, telephoned Forrest Strad-ley, another Deputy Sheriff in Borger

Stradley, accompanied by Albert Mace, chief of police of Borger, hurried to Stinnett and organized a posse. The robbers, however, had covered up their trail carefully and late in the day no trace of them had been found. Officers thought it probable they headed for Oklahoma.





All the birds in entire flocks were weighed and measured, and hens and pullets compared to see if last year's toms had improved the offspring. Where such improvement was not noted to marked degree owners are planning to secure outstanding toms. The number of pullets retained for breeding varied from eight to ten per farm, every one of which went well over the standard and weighed at least ten pounds before fattening.
