On Saturday, the VFW will also host the annual Castro County Chili Cookoff (see related story).

Several patriotic musical selections will be performed by an ensemble from the Nazareth Swift Band. A rifle salute and playing of "Taps" will conclude the program.

The Legion and Auxiliary will host a breakfast for members and guests in the Legion Hall immediately following the program.

Seniors from Dimmitt and Nazareth will celebrate the culmination of 13 years of studying Friday night when they walk across the stage and accept high school diplomas.

Each school will have commencement exercises Friday at their respective

football stadiums, weather permitting. Dimmitt High School will graduate 91 seniors at 8 p.m. at Bobcat Stadium while Nazareth High School will present diplomas to 13 seniors during its graduation ceremonies at 7:30 p.m. at Swift Stadium.

County okays \$22,000 attorney fee payment

County Commissioners gave approval for line item transfers that were needed to arrange payment of \$22,000 in attorney fees for the plaintiffs in the 1992 redistricting lawsuit that had been filed against the county and settled in 1994. A higher payment had been requested by the plaintiffs' attorneys, but was rejected by US Federal Judge Mary Lou Robinson of Amarillo, and her decision was upheld on appeal to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

County Auditor Maretta Smithson told the commissioners that \$9,500 had been budgeted in attorney fees. She recommended transferring funds from other budget categories that will not need the full amount budgeted, including \$5,500 from retirement, \$500 from commodities, \$2,000 from office rent, \$2,000 from loss control, and \$3,000 from courthouse capital outlay in the general fund.

In another matter, Pct. 2 Commissioner Larry Gonzales made the motion to accept a bid on a used 1987 model John Deere 410c backhoe for his precinct for \$18,900 from West Texas Equipment Co. of Amarillo. The motion was seconded by Pct. 3 Commissioner Bay Baldridge, and all voted in favor.

Gonzales said he would like to period if possible. He said he would like the down payment to come out of the 1997 fiscal year budget, which will not be set until Oct. 1.

In other business, the commissioners accepted a bid for \$13,233.46 from Randy Schumacher to make improvements to the kitchen and restrooms at the Expo building to bring it up to standards under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Expo supervisor Howard Smithson said no other bids were received.

Schumacher showed the commis-

At a called meeting Friday, Castro sioners a sample of the material that will be used for the restroom stalls. He said it is impervious to marking devices and is even difficult to scratch with a sharp instrument.

The project will include taking out most of the items in the kitchen to install new flooring, and reworking of the placement of the ice maker, etc., as well as doing some caulking to help cut down on dirt that filters into the building.

Smithson said there is enough money left in the Expo building budget to cover the project.

The commissioners approved a policy that lays the groundwork for an alcohol and drug abuse prevention program for county employees, including random blood testing, etc.

County personnel appeared before the commissioners to protest any change to the current no-smoking policy that is set up for the courthouse. The current policy allows for two designated smoking areas—one in the coffee break room upstairs and one in the Sheriff's Dept. downstairs.

A petition signed by 12 county employees asked that the commissioners consider making the whole courthouse smoke free. County Judge Irene Miller said that on occasion she has smelled smoke in her office in the courthouse to the extent that it "gave (her) a headache."

After discussion, the commissioners agreed to leave the policy as it currently stands and look into installing air filtering and circulating fans that would help cut down on smoke migrating to other areas of the court-

The commissioners voted to cancel their scheduled meeting that would have fallen on Monday, which is Memorial Day. They also voted to reschedule their Nov. 11 meeting that would have fallen on Veterans Day, moving it to Nov. 12, instead.

"The new farm law offers a oneshot opportunity to sign up for the new seven-year program," said Trish Elliott, county FSA executive director. "Once the May 20 through July 12 sign-up period closes, only farmers with land coming out of the Con-

law will bring to farm operations. "The farm bill places a lot of responsibility squarely on the shoulders of farmers and there is little time left to get all of the information needed to make some important,

long-term decisions," Elliott said. Local FSA staff members briefed local participants on the technical provisions of the new farm program.

"Included with the new planting flexibility are some options-and some risks-farmers haven't had to face before," Elliott said. "Crop insurance has been 'de-linked' from the program, but disaster assistance is gone. This means that with few exceptions, farmers are out of luck if weather ruins their crops."



USDA offers early-out program for CRP acres

An early termination program for farm acreage enrolled in the federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is being offered by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and is drawing keen interest across the state.

Additional incentives included in the 1996 federal farm bill make it important that farmers look carefully at this "early out" option before May 31, say economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The decision is especially critical for High Plains farmers who have in the CRP some 45,000 acres of land with a history of high yielding corn production, says Dr. Jackie Smith, professor and Extension Service agricultural economist.

"The most complicating factor in deciding whether to use the early out is uncertainty about the future of the CRP program," Smith said.

To be eligible for the CRP early out option, the land must have been in the CRP for at least five years, have an erodibility index of 15 or less, and meet certain other require-

County offices of the USDA Natu-

ral Resources Conservation Service carefully at the early out option bewill determine which land qualifies. An application to terminate a CRP contract on eligible acres is filed at the local office of the USDA Farm Service Agency.

Producers who terminate their CRP contracts under this early out program can also sign up for and receive a transistion payment under the 1996 Farm Bill, the extension economist noted.

But to receive the transistion payment for 1996, a producer must file by May 31 the request to terminate the CRP contract.

All landowners with a CRP contract that has a crop acreage base will be eligible to sign a production flexibility contract and receive transistion payments for 1996.

"This means that for 1996 only, those who request the early out by May 31 will, if approved for termination, receive most of their 1996 CRP payment as well as their transition payment under the new Farm Bill," Smith said.

"The incentive of receiving both payments makes it necessary to look

fore May 31."

The CRP program was intitiated in 1986 to remove from crop production acres that are classes as highly erodible.

Landowners who signed contracts with the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture to remove those acres and institute certain environmental measures then received payments at the price con-

In Texas, 4.1 million acres were contracted with the CRP. More than 800,000 acres of this was "nonbase" acres, on which historically the crops grown were not in federal crop support programs.

"CRP land with a corn base is the most likely to come out," Smith said. Most of the cotton acres placed into CRP won't qualify for the early

out option becuse of erodibility re-

strictions, he noted. Thirty counties have an average yield for CRP corn base above the 79-bushel-an-acre break even point at which the new transition payment

The economist said it is likely that much of these higher yield acres put into CRP were on irrigated land where the water had declined to a marginal level for corn production.

"With the increased flexibility of the 1996 Farm Bill, these acres could easily support irrigated production of other crops requiring less water while still receiving the corn transition payment," Smith noted.

Hale County, with 11,354 acres, has the most corn base land in CRP. Smith said.

"The average yield of the corn base acres temporarily removed from production in Hale County (under CRP) was 133.8 bushels. For that average yield, the first year projected transition payment would be \$27.30 and the second year would be \$52.32.

"That is without allowing for any post-CRP income from the land. The annual transition payment would average about \$35 an acre for the remaining five years (under the '96 farm bill), with the freedom to graze the land or produce almost any crop except fruits and vegetables."



Not very many people know Florencio Lopez by name, but if you say Floyd at El Sombrero, they immediately think of delicious Mexican food. Everything on the menu at El Sombrero, except for the tortillas, comes from secret family recipes that are closely guarded among family members. Each item is made fresh daily, from the hot sauce to the guacamole, and even the chile rellenos.

"Many places use frozen rellenos they order from someplace else," Floyd said. "But we make our own, and use our own special batter mix to coat the chiles before deep frying them."


He wouldn't even reveal where he buys the tortillas he uses in his cooking and to make the chips that are served daily. He said part of what makes the chips so good is the type of cooking oil he uses-another secret.

Customer satisfaction is important to Floyd, and he has surveyed those who visit the restaurant, asking if they would like to see any changes in how he prepares the food. "They always say 'No, keep it just like it is'," Floyd said.

Floyd does most of the cooking, but his daughter, Lupe Rodriguez, and his son, Floyd Jr., both are able to fill in for him.

Floyd has lived in Dimmitt since 1954, except for a brief span when he moved away. He, along with family members, previously owned the Charro Cafe on North Broadway; then he worked a short stint for "Mr. Walt" at Dimmitt Thriftway, before opening El Sombrero at its present location in 1978. He remodeled the building in 1980, and again in 1983, when a vehicle accidentally demolished a portion of the southeast wall. Now there's a window on that wall.

Between Floyd's children and their in-laws, the restaurant is mostly a family operation. It is open Tuesday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5:30 to 9 p.m., and on Sundays from 11 a.m.

The restaurant has a seating capacity of 95, including a separate area that can be closed off for parties of up to 32. Floyd said on occasion he has had the whole restaurant reserved for large parties.

While his children were growing up, Floyd became a supporter of many school and community activities, and he has continued that support to the present, donating to stock show buyers' clubs, Kids Inc. sports programs, and many other worthwhile projects.

He said he learned generosity from "watching Mr. Walt," and really appreciates the small town atmosphere in Dimmitt, where people are ready to help each other.

People just seem to keep coming back to El Sombrero—for the good food, the good service, and the hometown atmosphere.

American Corn Growers Report Because of Mexico's economic

May 20 to July 12 has been established as the dates for corn producers to sign up for the 1996 farm program.

In early May, producers will receive farm base and yield notices from the Farm Service Administration (FSA). These will be the basis for computing commodity payments under the new bill.

Thirty days after sign-up, producers will receive their advance payment. An advance of 50 percent will be available within 30 days after their contract is approved. The remainder of their 1996 payment will be made by Sept. 30, 1996.

In following years, payment will be made on Sept. 30 with producers having the option to receive half their annual advance payments on either Dec. 15 or Jan. 15.

Sign-up for the seven years of the farm bill must be made between May 20 and July 12. Congress mandated that there be a one-time only sign-up period for the entire 1996-2002 period. Producers who miss this signup will not be eligible to enroll their farm in the program at a later date.

For the first time since 1989, USDA announced that the United States has entered into a farm trade gap with Mexico because of NAFTA.

man Steve Stockman of Texas and Congressman Randy Tate of Washington would hurt the future of the ethanol industry and stifle any new growth in oxygenated fuels demand. Congressman Stockman has intro-

duced a provision to the Energy and Petrochemical Release and Job Preservation Act. This measure would eliminate the oxygen requirement in Reformulated Gasoline (RFG).

Under current language of the Clean Air Act, oxygen is blended at a 2 percent by weight level as part of RFG. This has allowed oxygenates such as ethanol, MTBE and ETBE to play a major role in reducing high pollution levels in many of America's major cities. Oxygen is added to gasoline to make it burn cleaner and more efficiently.

Congressman Tate has introduced fare Act of 1996." This act would eliminate part of the 54-cent ethanol excise tax exemption.

By ending tax exemption, ethanol would find it increasingly difficult to compete with cheap imports of foreign oil. In turn, this legislation, if passes, would curtail any new ethanol expansion and could lead to the closure of some ethanol production

The ACGA will do everything in its power to prevent both these misguided measures from passage. They would be extrememly harmful to seeing the continued growth in ethanol and oxygenated fuels.

ACGA President Gary Goldberg addressed an international conference on the use of ethanol, oxygenated fuels and reformulated gasoline at the Far East Conference in Singapore on May 16. The conference was sponsored by DeWitt and Comhis "Drive Away from Ethanol Wel- pany of Houston. He was the first American Farm leader invited to address this international gathering of industry leaders.








She added, "If a person doesn't tell you what it is you're doing wrong, how are we to know? Any person would assume that everything is all right." The committee took no action. Sanders told Velasquez later that there were no plans for changing the evaluation forms, she said.

Velasquez said that Sanders informed her on April 12 that her job had been terminated by the school board. On April 28, she told Sanders

Mike Smith gave her a complaint form when she requested to be placed on the agenda for the next school board meeting, and she informed Sanders that Smith had given her the complaint form. She said she did not want to file a formal complaint, but only wished to state her case before the school board.

Velasquez said Cheryl Smith asked her to administer the TAAS test to some students on April 30. She said she called the Texas Education Agency to inquire if a paraprofessional could administer the TAAS, and was told that the only way an assistant can help with the TAAS is as an interpreter, and only then if a certified teacher is in the room. She said she consulted TEA on an anonymous basis, and refused to say which school she was employed with.

Smith said he contacted TEA immediately as soon as he was aware there could be have been a problem with the administration of the TAAS

"I don't anticipate a problem with it," Smith said. "It is a decision TEA will have to make."

Sources have said that a spokesman from the TEA said that the matter of the TAAS testing incident is "under investigation."

Smith said he feels Velasquez has been treated fairly, and noted that it would be "unprofessional" for the school administration to comment on an employment matter.

Velasquez said she has been taking classes at Wayland Baptist University since 1988, working toward her teaching degree with a specialization in English and English as a Second Language (ESL) certification. She said she plans to complete her degree by 1998, and would like to seek employment with the Hart schools.

"I want my good name given back to me where it belongs, although I have been told that it will be very hard for me to get a job here because of my 'pattern of irresponsibility'," Velasquez said. She has requested that the evaluation from this year be destroyed, with documentation showing that it has been done.

Helen L. Wright, 68, of Borger, formerly of Summerfield, died last Thursday, May 16.


