## They Paid The Price

Have you ever wondered what happened to those m who signed the U. S. Declaration of Independence?
It took more than a mere signature on their part. They had to be willing to pay the price, and so they did. Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War.
What kind of men were they? Twenty four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured. They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor
Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.
Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he had to move his family constantly. He served in the army without pay. All his possessions were taken from him and he died in poverty
At least ten of the signers had their homes and properties leveled to the ground by the enemy and when they returned home, it was to find everything gone
John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. He and his children fled for their lives. His fields and grist mill were laid waste. He lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead, his children vanished.
Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild eyed, rabble rousing ruffians. They were soft spoken men of means and education. They had security, but valued freedom more.
They gave us an independent America. Can we keep it?

## FCBT shows net gain for quarter

Farm Credit Banks of Texas officials have announced a $\$ 2.6$ million net income for the first quarter of 1986. According to James Rogers, Thiexas banks, the organizations' earnings from local operations totaled $\$ 8.2$ million before $\$ 5.6$ million of these earnings were allocated to other sarious problems.

Texas, one of 12 Farm Credit Districts nationwide, is comprised of the Federal Land Fank of Texas and its 44 local

tions, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, 28 Production Credit Associations and the Texas Bank for Cooperatives.
Rogers also stated that although the system remains

So far, the request has not been approved. Rogers noted a healthy surplus and reserves of almost $\$ 490$ million for the three banks, an improvement over the $\$ 489$ million at Dec. 31 1985.

Nationally, the Farm Credit System incurred a net loss of $\$ 206$ million for the first quarter of 1986, compared to a net income of $\$ 118$ million at the same time last year. The system reported a $\$ 2.7$ billion loss in 1985.

## Cedar needs special care

y lose their natural beauty due to the weathering and mildew, and if sapwood is present, the problems. While most people know that
cedar fences and roofs will turn gray, few realize that cedar wood is not always durable, notes Chuck Stayton of Overton, wood products specialist
for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
"Only the cedar heartwood
has natural resistance to ro and insects, and one h specify all heartwood to get
this protection," points out. "Once the price of
all heartwood cedar is established, few are willing or able to pay it. This is why most cedar fences and many cedar roofs contain some sapwood to rot and termites to rot and termites."
Most owners of cedar fences Most owners of cedar fences
and roofs are now experiencing
replacement costs within 12 to replacement costs within 12 to
15 years. Except for the first year or two, they also have fences and roofs that hav
turned gray and are discolored due to mildew.
"Cedar roofs and fences can be restored and preserved to give longer service life," Stayton emphasizes. "The key is to start treatment befor cedar has weathered for more
than six years, particularly on than si
The first step to restoring both cedar fences and roofs is to thoroughly clean them, says
the specialist. In this regard the specialist. In this regard, granular chlorine in water does an excellent job in removing
mildew and discoloration due mildew and discoloration due not affected by bleach solutions can be removed using a solution of oxalic acid in water Because oxalic acid solution are poisonous, they should be
used sparingly. used sparingly.
The solution
The solution of chlorine and
water can be applied to wood with a plastic garden pump sprayer. Chlorine solutions are corrosive and should be applied
with commercial spray with commercial spray equip
ment only when such equip ment only when such equip
ment has stainless steel or plastic internal parts, cautions
Stayton. The chlorine solution should be left on the wood for 15 to 20 minutes and then
washed off thoroughly with a high water pressure spray from usually not necessary. Once the bleached cedar
roof or fence has dried, it should be treated with a preser
