# 131 to receive diplomas this weekend

131 Castro County seniors will receive diplomas Friday and Saturday in commencement exercises at Hart, Nazareth and Dimmitt high

schools. 29 Hart seniors and 23 Nazareth seniors will graduate Friday evening, while 79 Dimmitt seniors receive their diplomas Saturday night.

The Nazareth ceremonies will be held at the school cafetorium, while the Hart ceremonies will be held at the school auditorium. Dimmitt's commencement will be held at the DHS Auditorium. All three ceremonies will begin at 8 p.m.

Saturday, the Dimmitt Middle School eighth grade promotional exercises will be held at

the DMS Auditorium at 5 p.m. The valedictorians and salutatorians of each school will address their respective classes. The top two graduates include Jill Smith and Donna Behrends of Dimmitt, Dale Albracht and Mike Huseman of Nazareth, and Antonia Garza and Traci Jeffcoat of Hart.

Dimmitt's seniors will be

treated to an all-night, noalcohol-no-drugs party following the annual graduation dance at the Expo Building.

"We hope we are starting a tradition," said Janice Nutt, whose daughter, Cindi, is among this year's DHS graduates. "Larger schools have been having these, and some of the senior parents talked and decided we needed to provide an alternative for our kid. We just want a safe night for our kids, to provide them with an alternative.

"We will have a 'casino night' and a white elephant auction plus some other surprises for them, and it will last from as soon as the dance is over until they're through having fun. The students will be locked in-once they're in, they're required to stay. No one will be allowed to leave and come back."

The all-night party is free for seniors and their dates, with tickets available at the DHS office. Funds to pay for the activities were donated by senior

When I visit the hospital, I'd rather it be with a bouquet or book for a friend.

But last Wednesday I landed in Plains Memorial Hospital as a bona fide inmate for the first time since I-don't-rememberwhen. (It had been so long since I had been a guest that they had to issue me a new card and number. That means at least seven years, they said.)

My malady was such that I needed both the "upper and lower GI series," as they call them in hospitalese. To those in white, that means gastrointestinal purging, probing, scoping and X-raying. To the hapless patient, it means starvation, long needles, laxatives, and multiple doses of barium by ingestion and infusion.

I left my dignity in an examination room that has an L-shaped tilting table. It's mounted on a pedestal, a la the mechanical bull at Gilly's. Nearby is a cabinet that's loaded with ominous-looking tools that I couldn't even describe, much less identify. I had never seen such a table before, but I knew right away that I was in big trouble. When they draped my bod over it and put it in gear, I realized why they had hooked me up to that intravenous stand-without it, I think I could have outrun the (Continued on Page 9)

The supreme court races feature a battle between Oscar Mauzy and Shirley Butts for Place 1, Robert M. Campbell and Jim Brady for Place 2, and Jay Gibson and Raul Gonzales for Place 4. The criminal appeals race is between Rusty

Duncan and George "Jorge" Martinez.

The GOP runoff features contests between David Davidson and Aaron Bullock for Lieutenant Governor, Roy R. Barrera, Jr., and Ed Walsh for Attorney General, Grady T. Yarbrough and M. D. Anderson, Jr., for Commissioner of the General Land Office, and Milton E. Fox and John Thomas Henderson for Railroad Commissioner.

Balloting will be held next Saturday for the runoff, with all Republicans in the county voting at the Commissioner's Courtroom at the courthouse. Democrats in Precincts 1 and 5 will vote in Hart, with all others voting at the courthouse in Dimmitt.

# Water table drop slows

Castro County's underground water table is still dropping, but the overall water table in the 5.2 million-acre High Plains Water Underground District neither increased nor decreased last year, according to HPUWD figures compiled from 950 observation wells across the region.

The measurements were taken in January and February.

Average depth-to-water measurements made in wells in eight area counties show-

ed a rise in the water table, with Crosby County showing the largest rise, 2.5 feet.

The average depth-towater in the seven other counties showed a small increase in the depth-to-water, or a decline in the water table.

Average declines ranged from .08 feet in Bailey County to 1.40 feet in Parmer County. Castro County's decline last year was .78 feet, third on the list behind Bailey and Lamb Counties (-.82) in the rate of decline.

Last year's -. 78 loss in the water table was a dramatic decrease compared to the average loss for the last 10 years, 1976 through 1986. The 10-year period showed an average decrease of 2.06 feet per year in the county, with the average change dropping to -1.65 feet from 1981 to 1986 and -1.51 feet from 1983 to 1986.

"In most counties the rate of decline in the water table has been significantly decreased, particularly in the last five years," said District Geologist Don McReynolds. "A combination of non-use, increased energy costs and fortunate rains at opportune times has allowed the Ogallala Aquifer to replenish itself."

HPUWD based its averages on observation from 89 wells in the county.

The well which showed the largest total change in the county was near Sunnyside, and dropped 43.83 feet over the past 10 years, while the well with the largest gain in water over the past 10 years, northeast of Dimmitt, had an increase of 8.85 feet.

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# They Paid The Price

Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the U.S. Declaration of Independence?

It took more than a mere signature on their part. They had to be willing to pay the price, and so they did. Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he had to move his family constantly. He served in the army without pay. All his possessions were taken from him and he died in poverty.

At least ten of the signers had their homes and properties leveled to the ground by the enemy and when they returned home, it was to find everything gone.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. He and his children fled for their lives. His fields and grist mill were laid waste. He lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead, his children vanished.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild eyed, rabble rousing ruffians. They were soft spoken men of means and education. They had security, but valued freedom more.

They gave us an independent America. Can we keep it?



Lewis will enter the Corps of Cadets and will major in electrical engineering at College Station.

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
My church choir sent a bunch of pretty balloons, and I tied them to Charlie. They made him seem much less demanding.

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
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

# **TSTI starting** feedlot program

Texas State Technical Institute will begin classes in feedmill and elevator technology (FET) with the Fall Quarter, Sept. 8.

The new program received approval of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, last winter and work on the program began immediately, according to Jim Lutes, FET program chair-

According to the FET Advisory Committee members, who hosted their first official meeting this month, job opportunities for FET graduates are excellent and salaries should start at \$6 to \$6.50 per hour.

A feedmill and elevator maintenance technician operates, troubleshoots and repairs industrial equipment found in feedmills, feedlots and grain elevators.

The training program was developed by TSTI in response to the industry's difficulty in finding trained individuals to fill feedmill and elevator maintenance technician jobs, according to Lutes.

The Texas Cattle Feeder's Association requested that TSTI offer FET and both TCFA and the Texas Grain and Feed Association were consulted in the preparation of the curriculum for the course.

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

# Workman's comp meets vague awareness

There is a general if sometimes vague awareness among farmers of the Worker's Compensation for Farmworkers Act passed by the Texas Legislature during the special session of 1984.

Although the law became effective at the beginning of 1985, published information on the law's provisions has been scarce, and there are still a lot of farmers who aren't sure whether they are subject to its workers' compensation requirements.

Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbockbased Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., who strongly advises against any farmer ignoring the law on the assumption that he doesn't need coverage or that he is protected by general liability insurance.

General liability coverage is good only if workers' comp coverage isn't required by the new law, he points out. "A general liability policy is worthless and a farmer is subject to unlimited damages in the covered by workers' comp," Johnson warns.

The law requires agricultural producers to carry workers' comp on employees who fall in three categories: migrants, seasonals, and "others."

Coverage is required on all migrant workers, defined as those in seasonal or temporary farm work which requires them to be absent overnight from their permanent place of residence. For practical purposes, PCG is told that the definition likely includes all alien workers, legal or illegal.

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
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


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

## Picante sauce is hot item

Over the years Texans as well as folks in other states have developed a taste for "hot" sauce in varying degrees, and that taste seems to be growing by leaps and bounds as picante sauces of all types are hitting the market.

"Picante" comes from the Mexican word "picoso" which means "hot to the tongue and mouth." The unique taste or flavor of picante sauce comes from its ingredients: tomatoes; peppers, including jalapenos, serrano and Anaheim-type green chiles; onions; vinegar; garlic; black and red pepper; comino; and oregano.

The first commercial picante

sauce was produced by David ing to provide educational Pace in San Antonio in 1947, and picante sauces have been a "hot" item ever since, says Dr. Al Wagner, a food technologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"There were probably only about five companies in the picante sauce business 20 to 25 years ago," Wagner notes. "Now you can find some 20 to 25 different brands of picante sauce on the market. Nineteen companies in Texas alone are producing their version of picante, with annual sales estimated at \$200 million in

More and more people seem to be getting into the picante sauce business, Wagner says, and he often gets inquiries from firms and individuals interested in developing their own brand of this sauce.

"I get calls and samples several times a week," Wagner says. "People ask me to check the taste and acidity level of the samples, acidity being a key factor in the product's safety."

While the market for picante sauce is maturing in Texas, inroads are just being made in midwestern, northern and eastern states, notes Wagner. Thus, there seem to be good opportunities for expansion of the picante sauce market into other parts of the nation.

Through Wagner's office, the Extension Service is continu-

awareness, acceptance and use. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is working on developing improved pepper varieties which should be a boon to the picante sauce industry.



# More adult children heading back home

Unemployment, divorce or simple economics is leading more adult children - and their children - back to the parents' home.

Since there are pros and cons for both adult children and their parents, the decision to return to the parents' home shouldn't be taken lightly by either, says family relations expert Dorthy Taylor.

She says that by moving in with parents, the adult child's housing costs are usually reduced or eliminated. Yet the older parents' costs increase.

A parent may also be expected to provide free child care while the adult child works or looks for a job, if that parent is not also employed outside the home.

In addition, the family home can provide a familiar environment and a strong support system for the adult child and his or her children

Taylor, who is a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program, on their time, finances, lifestyle also cautions that returning to the family home can also be a source of problems. For some adult children it will increase feelings of resentment, failure or lack of independence.

"If parents disapprove of the adult child's social life and sexual behavior or have different ideas of appropriate values and behavior for their grandchildren, it will be a stressful living situation for all," she remarks.

To reduce some of the problems in a two- or threegeneration living situation, the specialist recommends a thorough discussion and agreement between parents and adult children about the roles and responsibilities of each.

Because adult children often move in with parents at a time of crisis in their lives, it may be difficult for them to effectively communicate about these matters at first, Taylor observes.

The older parents may also be upset about the imposition departure.

or privacy.

But to avoid conflict later, it is important for adult children and older parents to eventually work out an agreement about sharing household duties, telephone and utility costs, child care and discipline of the grandchildren.

The specialist says they may also need to discuss parking space for automobiles, personal space and privacy, kitchen privileges and meal preparation, laundry and general expectations about evening hours, use and volume of television and stereo music.

Since their home is being used to accommodate the adult child, older parents should not feel reluctant to insist on the final say in setting house rules, she advises.

Taylor points out that when either the adult child or parents consider the living arrangement to be temporary or transitional, it will be helpful to establish a tentative date for

# Cedar needs special

to the weathering and mildew, and if sapwood is present, wood rot and termites add to the problems.

While most people know that cedar fences and roofs will turn gray, few realize that cedar wood is not always durable. notes Chuck Stayton of Overton, wood products specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

has natural resistance to rot and insects, and one has to specify all heartwood to get this protection," Stayton points out. "Once the price of all heartwood cedar is established, few are willing or able to pay it. This is why most cedar fences and many cedar roofs contain some sapwood which has no natural resistance to rot and termites."

Most owners of cedar fences and roofs are now experiencing replacement costs within 12 to 15 years. Except for the first year or two, they also have fences and roofs that have turned gray and are discolored due to mildew.

"Cedar roofs and fences can be restored and preserved to give 'longer service life,'' Stayton emphasizes. "The key is to start treatment before cedar has weathered for more than six years, particularly on roofs."

The first step to restoring both cedar fences and roofs is to thoroughly clean them, says the specialist. In this regard, bleaching works well. Liquid or granular chlorine in water does an excellent job in removing mildew and discoloration due to weathering. Tough stains not affected by bleach solutions can be removed using a solution of oxalic acid in water. Because oxalic acid solutions are poisonous, they should be used sparingly.

The solution of chlorine and water can be applied to wood with a plastic garden pump sprayer. Chlorine solutions are corrosive and should be applied with commercial spray equipment only when such equipment has stainless steel or plastic internal parts, cautions Stayton. The chlorine solution should be left on the wood for 15 to 20 minutes and then washed off thoroughly with a high water pressure spray from a garden hose. Scrubbing is usually not necessary.

"Once the bleached cedar roof or fence has dried, it should be treated with a preservative," Stayton points out.

# Study lease agreement beforemakingdecision

Before leasing a car, furniture or other household items, it can pay to study the lease agreement, says family economics expert Nancy Granovsky.

"Leasing may seem less expensive than buying, but can cost you more money in the long run," she explains.

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If you rented a \$400 television set for 11/2 years at \$18 a week, for example, the leasing cost would be \$1404. Your cost would definitely be lower if you bought the set.

"Even at an 18% interest rate on a credit card, the set could be paid off within a year for much less money than the

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TEXAS.

\$1404 you would pay by leasing," says the Extension Ser-

vice specialist.

The Consumer Leasing Act for personal property requires rental companies to inform shoppers on the lease agreement that they may be able to get cash or credit terms and pay less for ownership.

Granovsky says this act also requires full disclosure of all costs, including any advance payments or security deposits, the total amount of payments due and any fees for license registration, delivery charges

You must also be informed of the terms of the lease, including what insurance you will need, warranties, who is responsible for maintenance, how to cancel the lease and at what price you can buy the property you are leasing.

Leasing personal property may be a good financial decision under some circumstances, says specialist. But consumers will not know whether leasing makes good sense unless they read the rental agreement disclosures and consider their alternatives.

It is important to use high quality pigment with these products because both are green in color. The applied pigment provides a "natural" finish for roofs and fences while eliminating any greenish cast.

Tests conducted at the Texas Forest Services' Forest Products Laboratory at Lufkin show that copper nephthenate has an expected service life of five years, with excellent protection against mildew. Retreatment is necessary when mildew begins to appear.
