

Seasoning The codfish should be carefully picked over and allowed to soak warm water for an hour.





It looks now as if there was little chance of the general manufacturers' sales becoming law, although a strong and vigorous new drive in favor of it is being felt on Capitol Hill. There are very serious doubts arising as to whether the excessively high taxes on large incomes and inheritances will yield anything like what they have been estimated to yield. The extent to which incomes of the supposedly very rich have been cut down in the past couple years is just beginning to be realized, as the income tax returns for 1931 are being analyzed by the Treasury. Not only individual incomes but corporate incomes have fallen off so much that this situation is furnishing new ammunition for the advocates of the sales tax.

President Hoover in his address to the Conference of Governors called sharp attention not only to the necessity of cutting down governmental expenditures, but al so to the need of finding new and less burdensome methods of taxa tion. He pointed out that local and state expenses have increased in far greater proportion than Federal expenses, and that total expenditures for all governmental purposes now represent probably more than twenty percent of the national income. Before the war he pointed out, every man worked twenty-five days a year for the National, State and local Governments, while today's taxes take

sixty-one working days out of every worker's year. Too much of the local and state tax burden is carried by real estate and its improvements, he pointed out, and too many state and local taxes, draw from the same sources as the Federal Government does.

summer until last Monday night when it began to rain and continued until about 12 o'clock the next day. I never witnessed just such a time in my life. It seemed to me that the whole elements. had given away. The whole surface was covered with water. The Bosque began to rise early in the morning and by 9 o'clock i was all over the bottoms, sweep ing everything before it. The rain continued to fall until about 12 o'clock. It was a sad day to us all. All in the lowlands had to leave their homes and seek shelter among those who were living on higher lands. Some waited until their houses were entirely surrounded with water and one man above here put his family in his wagon and started out. He got into swimming water and had to swim about 100 yards. The farms all along the Bosque are almost ruined. A great deal of corn and cotton were entirely washed away. There are six miles of railroad track on in this section washed off. We have had no train since the rain. I learned yesterday that there were 13 drowned at Blum and 9 at Cleburne, Iredell is almost ruined. Several houses washed away but no lives lost. I might write you until tomorrow night telling you of the destruction caused by the rain and then only give you a faint description of it suffice it to say that it was the most terrible overflow I ever saw.


