## Bobcats Win District Title

The Dimmitt Bobcats were unable to mount a scoring attack in the first half here Friday night against the Dalhart Wolves, but exploded into a three-touchdown dominator of the second half to win 24-0.

Thus the Bobcats stepped into undisputed championship of District 1-AA after going through its conference schedule undefeated and untied. The same night Tulla

defeated Canyon 6-0 to take second place in the conference. The victory over Dalhart set Dimmitt up for the bi-district championship game against Olton Friday at the local stadium beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Olton comes to Dimmitt as one of the most powerful teams in this area, supporting an undefeated and untied 10-0 record for this year. Last week they belted Floydada, 22-13, to wreck that team's similar perfect record. Floydada had defeated Dimmitt 6-0 earlier in the season.

The Olton Mustangs are riding the crest of one of their best seasons in the school's history. They have averaged almost 30 points per game, racking up 279 points to their opponents 126. Dimmitt has a record of 230 to the opponents 91.

### Dystrophy Drive By Firemen Set For Monday Night

The Dimmitt Fire Department will launch its annual muscular dystrophy drive here Monday night, November 21st, with a door-to-door collection campaign.

Joining with other fire departments all over the nation, the Dimmitt department hopes to collect over \$500 this year, according to fire chief Willie John Word.

Last year's collections amounted to \$451.88. The door-to-door collecting Monday night will commence at 7:15 and will last until the town is covered.

### Judge Collects Old Gas Heaters For Poor Homes

"There are people in Dimmitt who will be cold this winter unless we give them a hand," Judge Raymond Wilson said this week.

"I have seen residences in East Dimmitt where the only warmth came from a two-burner hotplate—and that's not enough," he said.

With this in mind, Judge Wilson is asking everyone in the county with an old gas heater they no longer need to donate it to the county for use by people unable to buy one of their own.

"If people who have an old heater no longer need will give it to us we'll loan it out to the poorer people of the community for the winter. We'll pick them up in the spring and store them until needed again next winter."

Anyone having such an old heater should call the County Judge's office and someone will be out to pick it up.

"It's surprising how many people in East Dimmitt don't have any way to properly heat their homes," Wilson said.

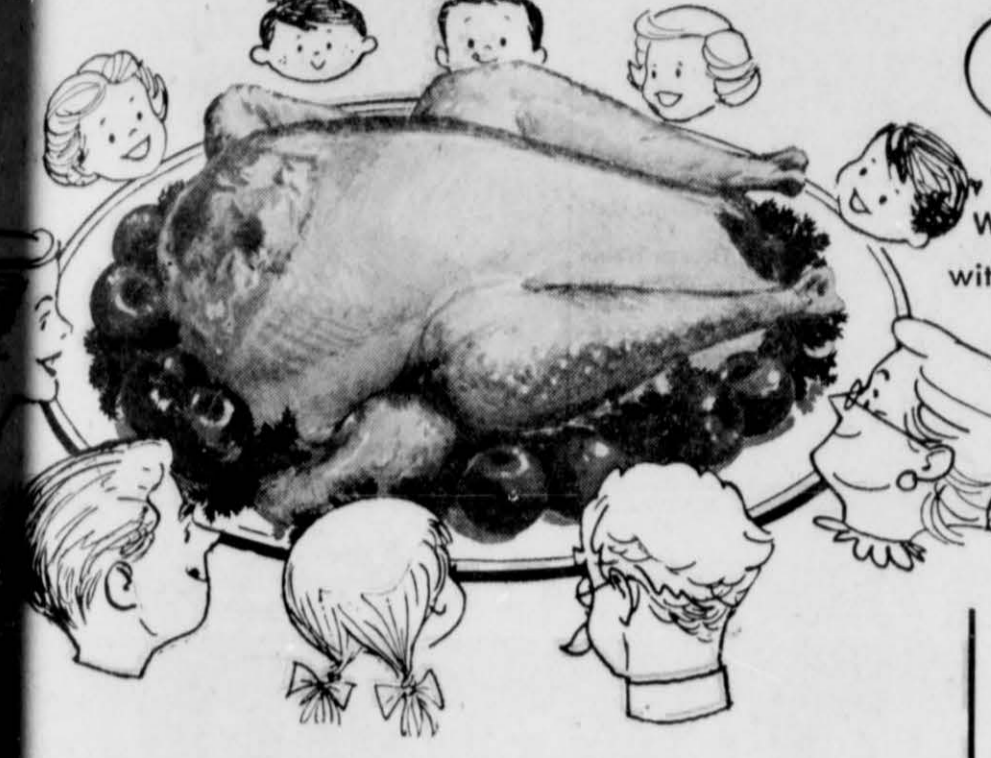

**Seven Accidents On County Roads During October**

The Highway Patrol investigated seven rural accidents in Castro County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Roger W. Sosebee, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks have accounted for one person killed, four injured, and a property damage of \$3,553.00. This brings the total for this year in this county to 3 killed, 30 injured, and a property damage of \$31,664.00.

"In 1959, eight thousand and two hundred pedestrians were killed on the streets and roads of America," Sergeant Sosebee said. That figure represents about 24 percent of all traffic fatalities in this country in one year's time. If we could eliminate this one category from our death toll, it would contribute heavily toward a general massive reduction in traffic fatalities.

True, a pedestrian doesn't have much of a chance against two tons of steel. But, if the driver and pedestrian both would use good defensive measures and common sense this type of casualty could be averted.
