

Woodward, division engineer talking from his Waco office Mon day morning, Mr. Lane was 8.5 ay morning, Mr. Lane was as-sured that an allotment had been and for an asphalt surface on All Street, from the bridge over he Boaque to a connection with lighway 67 at North 2nd Street. The material has already been bought, Mr. Woodward said, and it hoped that work may start in ten days. This matter has been pending since last Fall, when an asphalt surface was put on High way 67 through the business sec-tion, and it was planned to finish Highway 66 at that time, but cold weather interfered.

Mayor Lane went to Austin Tuesday morning on matters per-taining to highway business, relief funds and other public service, but received the assurance referred to above before he left.

Allotment Increased

At the same time, Mr. Lane was informed that the appropriation of \$25,000 for building Highway 67 from the Bosque County line into Hico had been increased to \$70,-000. This increased allotment will take care of a fine bridge over Jack Hollow, and it is hoped that the road will be hard-surfaced in its entirety across this county.
