President Hoover's plan for a great system of inland waterways realizes, in prospect, the hope of those that welcomed an able engineer to the White Honse.

Total expenditures planned will amount to \$525,000,000, and every dollar spent will pay for itself ten times over.

The President observes that the annual increase in expenditures will amount only to the cost of onehalf of one battleship

The President might have added that in modern war the whole of one battleship would be worth less than one-half of 10 cents, since battleships are now merely targets for submarines and airplanes. worth nothing, except to battleship builders.

about a 12-engined plane "to carry 100 people, with a machine shop on board." The Germans and the British build the planes.



McPherson, Kan.-It is the plan of Dr. J. Willard Hershey, head chemist at McPherson college, to produce artificial diamonds on a large scale.
