McCuen, chairman of agriculture engineering of Ohio State University, aptly expressed it: "Instead of going to a vicious circle of growing more mules to raise more corn to feed more mules the tractor has released man and mules from the farm." If for no other reason the farmer should rejoice in a form of power which reduces the number of farmers and transforms competitors into consumers of his products. Contrast with a decrease of 7 million or more in the horse and mule population during the last 10 years the 22 million or more dependent upon the automotive industry for their living, all of whom consume farm products. While a human does not eat as much as a horse it requires about the same acreage to feed and clothe him

Horses replaced oxen because it was possible to do faster work. Power machines replace horse-drawn machines for the most part because it is profitable to make
