To discuss the merits and demerits, in detail of a bill, of necessity as complicated as the one to be voted on Tuesday, would be more than space or time would allow. There have been numerous meetings and forums held throughout the country in an effort to acquaint the farmers of the nation with the mechanics of the proposed program. I attended one such meeting and apparently the farmers present understood the provisions of the bill, and had little apprehension of any harm that would come in its passage.

A very strenuous campaign has been waged, by a number of organizations, to defeat the bill in the referendum. In the forefront of the opposition has been the State and National Farm Bureau organizations, the Republican party, the United States Chamber of Commerce, the American Manufacturers Association, the American Medical Association, and the John Birch Society, to name a few. Supporting the measure has been the Farmers Union and the De- THIRTY SIXTH YEAR mocratic party. Looks like the odds might be stacked.
