# New Jersey Firm Gets Western Ammonia Corp. Plant Contract

In a telephone conversation Wednesday, with a representative of the News, Mr. George H. Landreth announced that Western Ammonia Corporation of Midland had awarded the contract for the construction of their Dimmitt fertilizer plant to Foster Wheeler Corporation of Livingston, New Jersey. Mr. Landreth is president of Western Ammonia Corporation.

The Foster Wheeler Corporation, Engineers, Manufacturers and Contract-

ors, will construct the 60 ton per day capacity anhydrous ammonia plant on a site two miles southeast of Dimmitt in contract with Western Ammonia Corporation. Compressors and other long delivery items will be installed in time for production of ammonia by February, 1964, according to Landreth.

Preliminary work will begin at the plant site immediately in preparation for the arrival of the plant contractor. Office buildings will be under construction soon and railroad trackage will be laid the length of the plant site. When com-

pleted the Western Ammonia Corporation plant will represent a \$3,500,000 investment.

It is estimated that a crew of approximately 150 will be required to construct the anhydrous ammonia plant, and that a permanent crew of 30 will be employed in its operation.

Officers of Western Ammonia Corporation, other than Mr. Landreth, are Roy E. Campbell, Executive Vice President; Robert M. Leibrock, Vice President and Secretary; and F. H. Callaway, Treasurer and Assistant Secretary.

Ten high school students, three from Texas were named Friday night winners of Atomic Energy Commission Special Awards for outstanding nuclear-related exhibits entered in the 14th National Science Fair-International.

The winners received certificates of achievement at the NSFI Awards Banquet climaxing the 5-day fair which opened Tuesday, May 7. With the certificate goes an opportunity for each winner and his science teacher to attend a special "Atomic Energy Research Orientation Week" to be held in August at the Commission's Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago.

Ten other student exhibitors among which is Miss Robinson won honorable mention citations and will be alternatives for the Argonne Study-tour in the event some of the winners are unable to attend.

## Wheat Vote Plans Made

A Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum will be held Tuesday, May 21, for the purpose of determining whether or not Marketing Quotas will be in effect for 1964 Wheat.

Farmers will be able to vote at one of the following polling places between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.: Harman-Toles Elevator, Arney Nazareth Gin & Grain Co., Nazareth City Hall, Hart Community Grain, Inc. Easter Summerfield and Frio communities Sunnyside Grain & Supply Co., Sunnyside community Flagg Grain Co., INC., Flagg and Big Square community A.S.C.S. Office, Dimmitt.

Another common objection to the government wheat bill is that it represents controlled production. This is a claim that is being made extensively by the Farm Bureau. The implication is that there should be excessive production above and beyond any possible need. The same people contend that price should be established by supply and demand. The two objectives cannot be reconciled. Without some method of controlling production, on any farm commodity, the demand is going to be over supplied and the price will be exactly what the buyer wants to pay, and that has always been the very least possible. If that's what the wheat farmer wants he can have it by voting down this and other farm programs.

There is nothing evil about controlled production. Every type of industry, car, farm machinery, clothing, food processors, etc., determine to the nth degree just how much the consumer will buy and that, or a little less is what they produce. Don't you ever believe that any factory would ever crank up and run at full blast without first having a good idea of consumer demand. So far as farmers organizing and holding down production on their own is only wistful thinking. In the first place it would be impossible to have an organization of that kind, in the second place most farmers wouldn't join, and in the third place they would plant what they pleased if they did belong, and in some other place they would all go broke in the process. So would the Castro County News and every other small business that depends on an economy with agriculture as its base.

Wes Izard in the Amarillo News has been carrying on a relentless campaign for the defeat of the proposed 1964 wheat program. He has also been very friendly to the John Birch Society and he has been in agreement with Dr. Hargis and General Walker, he believes that the Disarmament Agency has already scuttled the U.S. Navy, Army and Air Corps, to him the United Nations has already replaced the government of the United States and we are all at the mercy of a gigantic conspiracy of our own government officials. Mr. Izard is sick and his illness is contagious, especially to those who are prone to let someone else do their thinking for them. He tried to defeat Walter Rogers for the Congress by supporting a member of the John Birch Society and now he is joining the same group in trying to get the farmer to vote against his own interest, and with

### TV Cable Being Considered Here

A local group of Dimmitt businessmen are trying to determine the feasibility of bringing to the residents of Dimmitt a Community Antenna System for improved television reception.

Pascally such a system would amount to a replacing of the ordinary home type antennas with one giant tower mounted with special commercial type antennas designed and built especially to pick up the desired signals on any particular frequency. These signals are amplified while undesired signals and interference are filtered out. This signal is then transmitted by means of coaxial cables strung along utility poles to various parts of town. A private line extends to your own house for as many outlets as you desire.

Besides obtaining better and more consistent pictures from the three Amarillo TV stations, the two TV stations in Lubbock would also be added and the residents could type in either Amarillo or Lubbock stations without the use of a rotor or any special equipment.

Among the advantages to be derived from use of the cable system are the following:

1. The giving of sharper detail and better quality pictures on these channels;

2. The removal of unsightly towers, guy wires, and associated equipment;

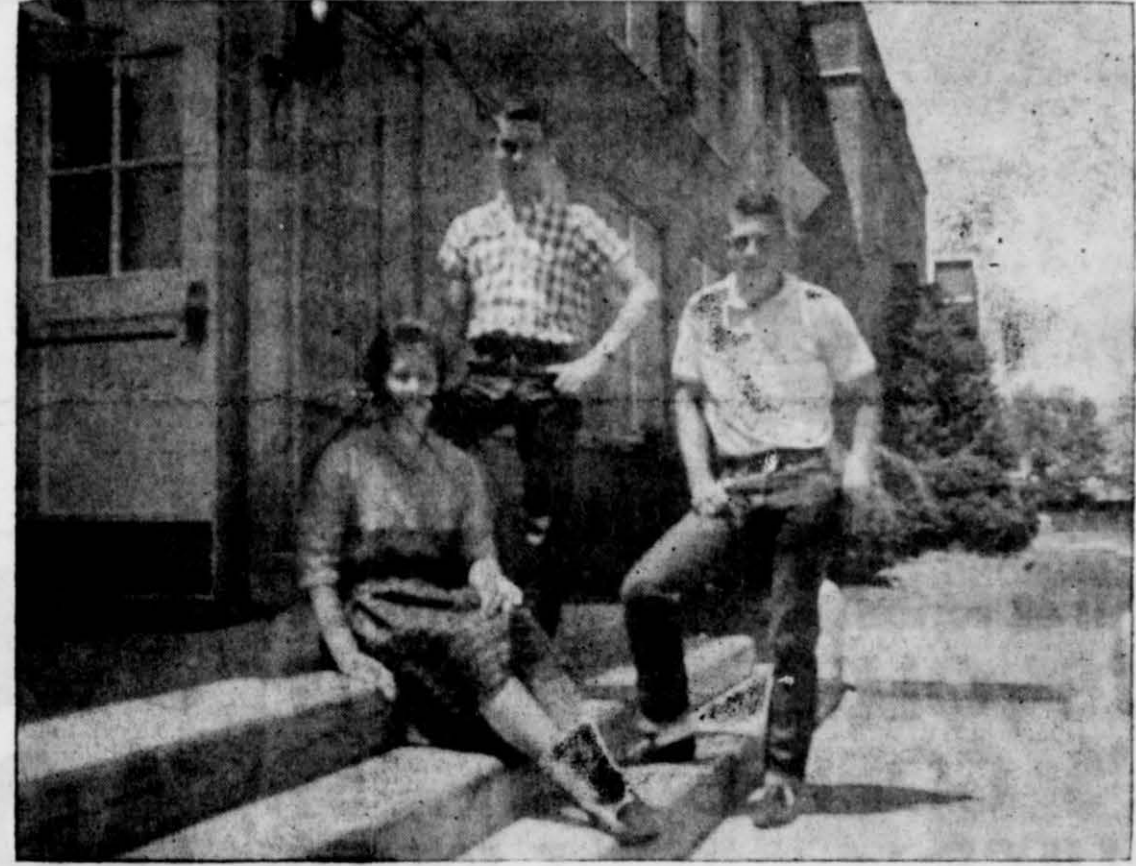
3. The elimination of many forms of interference such as car ignition systems, the operation of near-by motors, and faulty electrical signs;

4. The collective benefits obtained by use of elaborate electronic facilities to capture and strengthen area;

5. The savings to each home of expensive house top antennas, boosters, rotators and converters, and elimination of storm hazards to such equipment.

In addition to improved reception of the various TV stations, the cable system has the following special services to offer its subscribers:

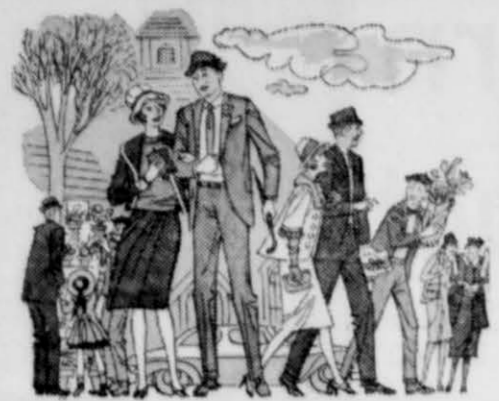

"Barney" Barnes Visits Dimmitt To Promote Hwy 385

Barney Barnes, field representative of 385 International Parks Highway Association and his wife were in Dimmitt, Thursday to promote more north-south tourist travel and to inform interested citizens about Highway 385 which passes through Dimmitt.

Barnes assistant field representative showed slides of the National Parks and recreation areas on Highway 385.

The Highway is 1,728 miles of straight, fast and excellent paved road from Big Bend National Park to the Rio Grande river to Regina, Saskatchewan, according to Barnes.

Along the highway, the tourist will see Fort Robinson in Nebraska which is a State Park and has a historical museum.

Further north on Highway 385, the tourist may visit Wind Cave National Park, South Dakota.

In North Dakota on Highway 385 is located the only Memorial Park in the United States, Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

Social Security Statistics Announced

By the end of 1962, there were 24,806 people in the Texas State handling old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits, according to Hal Golden, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

Nationally, almost 15 million people were receiving about a billion dollars a month in old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits at the close of 1962.

Castro County people participate and share in this program along with the rest of the United States. In December 1962 there were 248 monthly payments. These insurance benefits totaled \$19,717 for that month.

For the entire State of Texas, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance payments at the end of December 1962 were being paid to 785,965 persons at the rate of \$45,964,965 per month.

Carriers To Distribute Cards

Postmaster Ernest L. Davis reminds rural patrons of the Dimmitt Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Davis explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Jesse Ernest Ford, Route 1; E. L. AND C. Carpenter, Route 2; Raymond L. Hance, Route 4; Jesse Ernest Ford, Route 5.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of head and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Davis concludes.

The camera would constantly "scan" these instruments and viewers could verify weather conditions locally at anytime of the day or night.

2. FM music from some of the area FM stations will be transmitted over one or more of the channels that are not being used for TV reception or for the weather scanner. This would benefit the housewife who could not always "watch" the set during her busy hours.

(Continued from Page One) the same old scare campaign. If it is so bad to control production of farm commodities, then why isn't it wrong to control the production of oil. One is no more a natural resource than the other and in controlling production the price of the commodity, to a degree, is established. We have yet to find Mr. Izzard in opposition to established pumping allowable for oil wells, an allowable set by law. I would like to know the difference, or is it just a matter of who it affects.

We are told that if this wheat bill is defeated by the farmers in the referendum Tuesday that they will be given an opportunity to vote on a better law later on in the year. This is rather fuzzy thinking the Congress cannot devote all of its time to the agricultural program, there are many other important matters that must be taken care of before the Congress adjourns, and it is unlikely that there would be time to pass a new law when the new Congress convenes. You can rest assured that any law that is passed that would benefit the farmer would incur the opposition of the same reactionaries that are opposing the current bill.
