



MODERN mohair velvet uphol-stery as used in automobile or in furniture contains from 20,000 to 40,000 pile fibres to the square inch. This is important to both housewife and car-owner since it makes the upholstery extremely easy to clean. A whisk-broom or vacuum cleaner will remove dust or dirt, since it remains loose between the pile fibres. Grease spots and stains are broken up by the countless tiny pile fibres, and ordinary cleaning fluids will remove them. The cleaning should be done by starting well outside the area of the spot and then working in a circular motion toward the center. By repeating this process, no circle of diluted grease will be
