County Farmers Testify Before House Committee

Carl King and Shirley Garrison, farmers, in the county, testified before House of Agriculture Committee headed by Mr. Poage and Graham Purcell, Monday, April 12 in Washington, D. C.

The two farmers were sponsored by members of local Farmers Union. King submitted a price cost figure for raising one acre of milo and what it took to raise and harvest one acre of milo to the committee. According to King's figures it takes \$61.75 per acre invested to raise one acre of milo on his own farm.

King was given four minutes to testify. King stressed that the high cost of raising and marketing milo called for a higher parity ratio and a longer program. He said, "We prefer a four or five year program enacted this legislature instead of two-year program provoked by administration so it will enable us to have a better planned program on our personal farms."

County Farmers Testify Before House Committee

King continued, "Consequently, it is imperative to receive a higher parity for milo due to fact that what farmers buy to raise crops will be costing more each year."

King asked for permission to insert the cost price figure on one acre of milo into the records of this hearing. Permission was granted.

Shirley Garrison testified virtually same thing as King. He presented to the clerk approximately 175 signatures from farmers and businessmen in this county in a petition in regards to the cost price squeeze on all commodities.

King and Garrison had a nice visit with Senator Ralph Yarborough and Congressman Walter Rogers. King also presented them with copies of the cost price figures on one acre of milo.

King stated, "We were well received and complimented by the committee on our brief and to-the-point presentation. The committee assured us of taking the facts into consideration."

The two men put in 15 hours Monday visiting and testifying to legislators. King said, "This is harder work than going to the farm and working for 15 hours."

Graham Purcell was co-chairman along with Mr. Poage of the committee. King says, "Mr. Purcell is a true friend of the farmer. He has done a lot to help the small farmer."

"In testifying we told Congressmen we're not in favor of the vast land retirement program proposed by another farm group," emphasized King. King concluded, "I won't swear to how much good we did, but I felt we did have some success."

Castro County Farmers Union will be sponsoring some men to go to Washington when the controversial cotton legislation comes up before Congress according to King.

\$120,000 Bond Election Defeated

County citizens turned thumbs down in a large turnout of voters this year on a \$120,000 bond proposal for a county Agri-Business Coliseum. All 15 precincts reported voters at the polls.

About 100 persons from communities along the 2,500 mile network of highways that stretches from Big Bend National Park, in Texas, to Prince Albert National Park, in Canada, are expected.

Most of the communities to be represented lie along U. S. Hwy. 385 which runs through Dimmitt. The extension of this federal highway number over a network of state roads that formed a well-defined route from Texas to Canada was one of the primary reasons for the association's formation in the 1940s.

U. S. Hwy 385 now runs from below Marathon in the Big Bend northward to central South Dakota, where the route to Canada changes to U. S. Hwy. 85. At the border, a Canadian number takes over, but the Saskatchewan government has agreed to designate the route leading to Prince Albert Park 385 when the U. S. road is brought to the border as that number.

Registration will begin at 1 p.m. Friday with a meeting of the Texas Division at 4 p.m. Tours will be made at 2 p.m. of Holly Sugar Refinery. A buffet dinner will begin at 7:30 p.m.

An address by Richard Pierce, travel consultant for the Texas Highway Department, will be at 10:45 a.m. Saturday.

Luncheon entertainment will be provided by Ben Gollehon, Hereford High School band director, Saturday. Afternoon sessions Saturday will be devoted to business meetings and election of officers.

They made the trip by car in order to see more of the country across Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida.

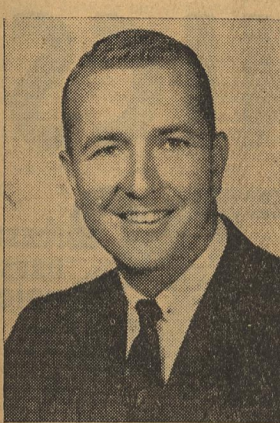

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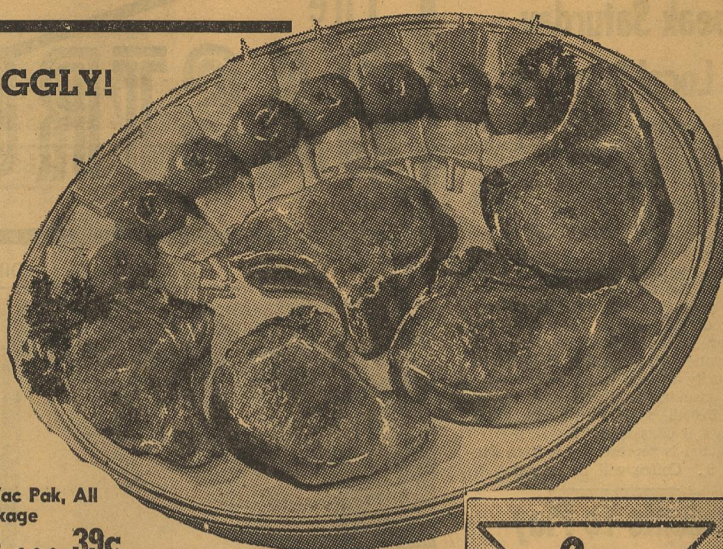

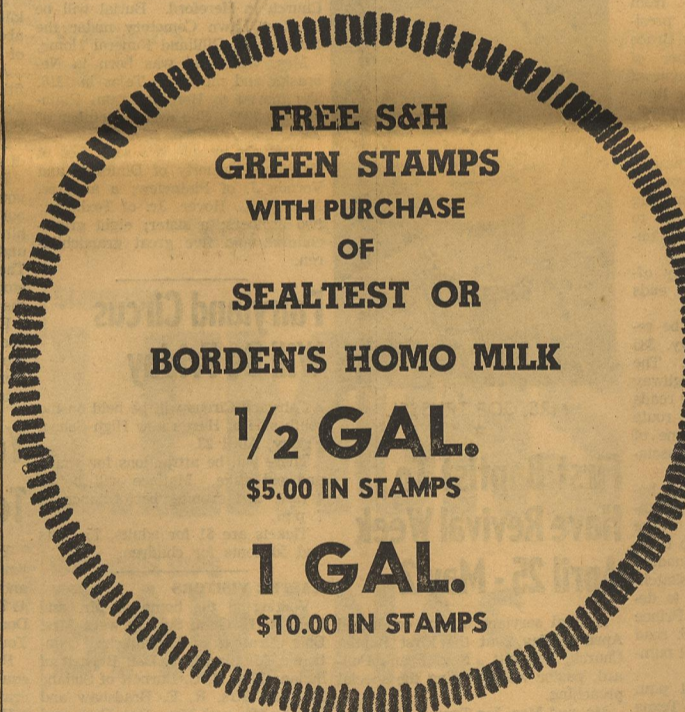

Dr. Blackburn Speaks To Young Homemakers

"Childhood diseases can sometimes cause severe complications and all precautions should be taken during convalescence," Dr. Blackburn told a group of Young Homemakers Thursday night. "The most common killers of children are accidents and poisoning." Dr. Blackburn stressed the importance of keeping drugs and strong cleaners from the reach of children. "Start at an early age to teach children to leave medicine alone." Dr. Blackburn told the Young Homemakers that although most cases of chickenpox, mumps, and whooping cough pass with no lasting complications, they can sometimes impair hearing and other senses or be fatal. Whooping cough has a high rate of mortality and is particularly dangerous for children under five years of age but there is an inoculation to avoid it.
"We wish to thank Dr. Blackburn again for helping us to understand more about the medical needs of our small children," the homemakers said.

Eleven Rural Accidents Occur Here In March

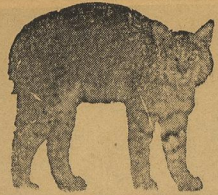

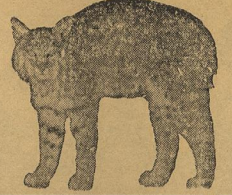

Teen Talk is a public service presentation of Channel 10 and is composed of five teenagers from various tri-state high schools. The topic for discussion will be "How Patriotic is Today's Teenager?" and the moderator will be Mr. Gene Lewis, director of Forensics at West Texas State University.

Garment Making Career Discussed

About 500,000 people working in approximately 14,000 factories and workshops are employed in the manufacture of men's and women's clothing. The ordinary scale of pay for garment trade workers depends upon ability and training. Many of the work skills can be acquired on the job with little need for more than a few weeks of formalized vocational education. One of the big handicaps in this field is the lack of steady employment. Although the weekly or hourly wages may be relatively high, long layoffs cause the annual salaries of the garment employees to shrink considerably.

The designer is the most highly paid worker in the garment trade. He originates the fashions and patterns. He must possess a great knowledge of fashions combined with an awareness of color, balance, and the other elements of design. The design is either sketched on paper or created by draping a figure. No particular educational requirements have been set up, but a two-year course of study at a fashion design school will prove a great advantage. Creative artistic ability is a necessity in this field.

The patternmaker receives the design and translates its various parts into patterns of standard sizes and shape. When these patterns are combined, they will produce the result which the designer intended. The patternmaker must reproduce the designer's idea faithfully. A knowledge of freehand drawing and applied mathematics will be very helpful in this field. Training as a patternmaker can be secured either in a private or public vocational school.

The next process is performed by the cutter who cuts the cloth according to the pattern. This operation will require great skill to avoid waste. It also requires good eyesight and the full use of both hands, with fine eye-hand coordination. Scissors, knives, and shears, many of them electrically powered, are used. You can secure training at public or private vocational schools. The cutter must have a thorough knowledge of textiles. Practical experience is necessary to gain sufficient skill to become a competent worker.

In order to make the separate parts into a complete garment, hand sewers and sewing machine operators are essential. In the custom, tailor shop, the entire garment is constructed by the tailor. In the factories, the work is performed by the sewing machine operators and the hand finishers. Often where the work is highly specialized, the hand finishers or sewing machine operators perform one type of work exclusively. You may learn to do the work either through attending a public or private vocational school or through on-the-job experience.

The finished garments or parts of the garment are pressed by either hand or machine. You will find this kind of work particularly fatiguing, requiring a great deal of physical strength. Earnings are a bit higher than those of the sewing machine operator.

Information Needed About Ex-Students

Many Americans feel that the American Educational System has been slack in encouragement to students to attain and maintain high grade averages. This is true in many cases.

The cottage is also adequate for a retired couple who do not wish to maintain a large house, he adds.

He points out that special space saving features include an undercoun-

ter water heater, a pullout bed, a wall desk, a wall-type heater with a prefabricated metal or asbestos-cement chimney, and accordion type closet doors.

The large porches and generous window areas make the cottage particularly suitable for nice views or relaxing comfort.

Boll Weevil Studied

Ground trash examinations completed in January revealed that overwintering boll weevil population had been reduced 90 per cent by the diapause control program. A second trash examination was conducted during March to determine the survival rate of boll weevils which had entered hibernation sites. In order to determine the extent of winter mortality, all locations in which weevils were found in January were re-examined during the late March.

The winter mortality rate varied from 25 per cent in Motley county to 84.0 per cent in Dickens county. During the March examination, no weevils were found in Kent, Garza, Briscoe, Crosby, or Floyd counties. Negative findings in these counties do not mean that overwintering weevils are not present, but do indicate that hibernating populations are very light. Boll weevil populations in the heavily infested areas of Dickens and Motley county were reduced greatly by the diapause control program and have been reduced further by natural winter mortality. However, records indicate that the extent of winter mortality was not as great in 1965 as in 1964.

Surviving weevil populations will be large enough in certain areas to develop damaging infestations during the summer unless good in-season control practices are followed.

The winter trash examinations were conducted by personnel of the Plant Pest Control Division USDA, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Texas Department of Agriculture.

FERTILIZER AND WATER USE EFFICIENCY

Last week, I wrote on fertilizer and water use efficiency on grain sorghum. Moisture - fertility studies conducted by the Texas A & M South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock also reflect these differences in water use efficiency on cotton.

Data from a 1958 experiment on a sandy loam soil shows that approximately 4 to 10 pounds more lint per acre can be produced from each acre inch of water if properly fertilized. This range is for four different levels of irrigation ranging from dryland to preplant, plus four summer sprinkle irrigations.

Data from 1960-62 on heavier soil shows approximately 4 to 5 pounds extra lint cotton per acre inch of water when properly fertilized. This is for varying amounts of water applied by gravity ranging from dryland to preplant plus 4 summer irrigations.

The studies showed that cotton can utilize higher fertility rates under higher moisture levels. For example, under dryland conditions or limited water, cotton fertilized with 40-60-0 yielded best and produced more pounds of lint per acre inch of water. Additional nitrogen fertilizer did not increase yields or efficiency. With a preplant plus one irrigation, the 80-60-0 fertility rate produced the highest yield and water use efficiency. Additional nitrogen did not increase yields or efficiency. With a preplant plus 2 or 3 applications, 120-60-0 gave best results. Yields of efficiency were not increased by additional nitrogen fertilizer.

Under dryland conditions, fertilizer helped to "stretch" the moisture. When compared to unfertilized cotton, the 40-60-0 fertility rate produced an additional 4 pounds lint cotton for each inch of rainfall received during the season. Since the average rainfall received during the test period was 13 inches, this meant an extra 52 lbs. lint per acre.

This data illustrates the importance of the proper moisture - fertility balance. The big problem on the High Plains is the inability to predict rainfall and the type of season. Consequently, most cotton fertilizer is applied with the idea of having an "average" season. Sidedressing of additional nitrogen can be made if the season turns out to be a good one for nitrogen response.

Candidates will be judged on appearance (40 percent), personality (40 percent) and horsemanship (20 percent).

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Weed Controls Cut Production Costs

Weed control in crops, pastures, on ranges, timberlands and even ponds and lakes is becoming increasingly important in cutting the costs of production and increasing yields.

Chemicals are playing an increasingly important role in control methods and their use is widespread. In order to give those interested in the use of chemicals for controlling weeds and woody plants of Texas, County agent Charles Hotel says a recent joint publication, B-1029 "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals" has been released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Station. Copies, he adds, are available from his office.

The suggestions in the bulletin are based on the most valid information available, the county agent said. Consideration was given by the authors not only to the effectiveness of the chemicals but also to their safe use under existing laws and regulations. The authors point out and emphasize that the ultimate responsibility for safe use and agronomic results obtained from the use of chemicals rests with the user.

Because of the wide range of suggestions offered and chemicals listed, the publication has been prepared in abbreviated form, the county agent said. Other publications are available which give more detailed information and are cited in most sections of B-1029, Hotel said.



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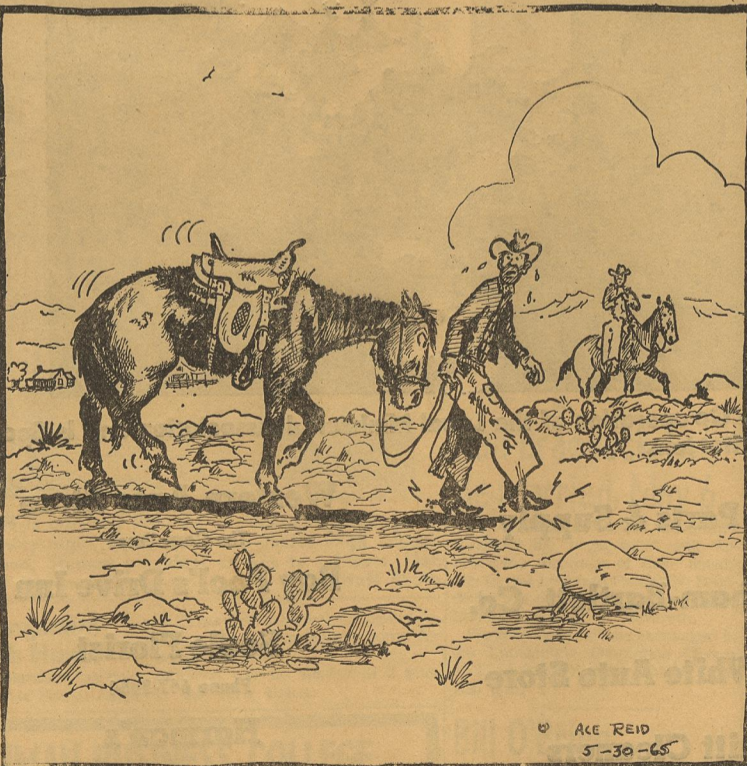

What parent wouldn't insure his child good health for life . . . if he could?

Although no parent can guarantee his child good health always, a parent plays an important role in the health of the child.

A parent can teach his child the basic principles of good health. Certain fundamentals, learned early and continued through life, can do a great deal towards promoting the health of the child.

Good health can become a habit. And this is where the parent comes in: teaching his child good health habits early in life.

A habit is an action you've done so often you don't even think about it, you just do it. Help your child develop good health habits.

Hand washing is a fundamental in disease prevention. Teach your child to wash his hands after he visits the toilet. Teach him to wash his hands before he eats.

Little hands - or big ones for that matter - go many places. They may carry out the garbage, handle a fly-germ source.

Hot soapy water can wash many disease-causing germs off hands before they enter the mouth and body where they can grow and cause the most harm.

Teach your child to make hand washing a habit.

Tooth brushing after meals is important to good dental health. Otherwise, bits of food lodge on and between teeth allowing bacteria to grow and eventually cause decay. Teach your child to rinse his mouth with water if he can't brush his teeth right after eating.

A daily bath and clean clothes are important, too. Hair should be washed often, and combed with your own comb. Head lice are no respecters of persons and can easily travel from person to person on a "borrowed comb."

Borrowing towels, lipstick, or sharing food or drinking glasses is a good way to borrow trouble - or other people's germs.

True, you may neglect to wash your hands one time, or you may skip a bath one day. But remember to teach your children the good health habit.

Area Masons To Meet Tuesday

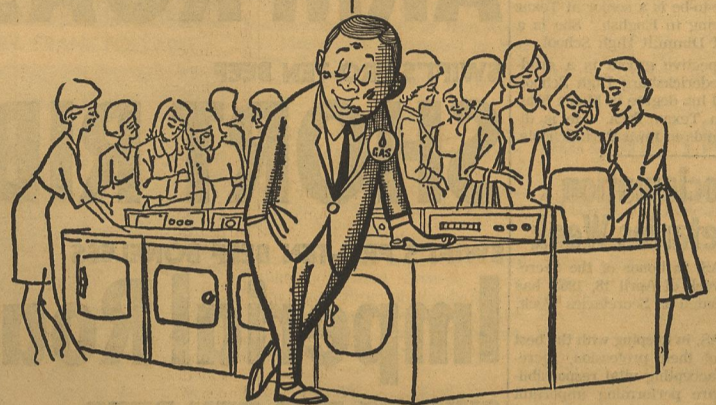

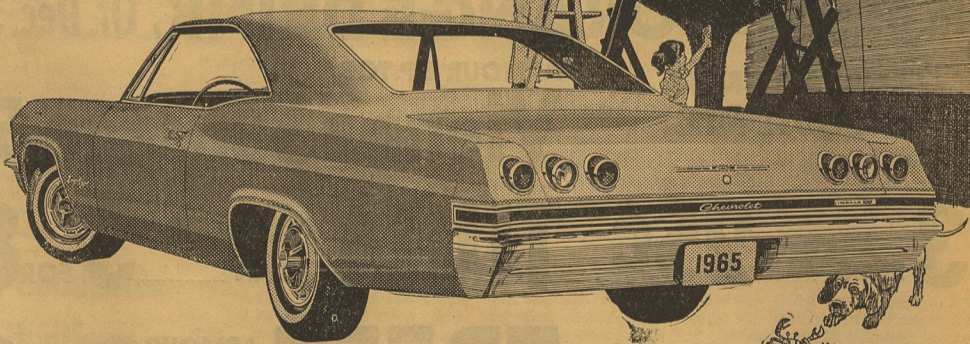
