





Many of the work skills can be acquired on the job with little need for more than a few weeks of formalized vacational education. One of the big handicaps in this field is the lack of steady envelopment. ployment. Although the weekly of hourly wages may be relatively high long layoffs cause the annual salaries of the garment employees to shrink considerably.

The designer is the most highly paid worker in the garment trade. He originates the fashions and patree originates the fashions and pat-terns. He must possess a great know-ledge of fashions combined with an awareness of color, balance, and the other elements of design. The de-sign is either sketched on paper or created by draping a figure. No par-ficular educational requirements have



Ground trash examinations com been reduced 90 per cent by the dia-pause control program. A second trash examination was conducted during March to determine the sur-vival rate of boll weevils which had entered hibernation sites. 


