## JOINER HOLDS LEAD OVER CLEMENTS IN SPIRITED JUDGE RACE

### Incumbents Win in Races For Co. Commission

All County Commissioners who stood for re-election in Castro County were re-elected Saturday.

In precinct 1, John Lilley defeated two opponents, Barber Eubanks and H. G. Connally. Lilley received 263 votes to 96 for Eubanks and 90 for Connally. It was a clear majority.

In Precinct No. 2 H. M. Horton received 193 votes to 146 for Sid Sheffy and 38 for O. C. Axtell.

In Precinct No. 3, L. A. Ricketts defeated Fred Duck Boswell, 208 to 157.

In precinct No. 4 there were only four votes difference between the top man and the low man in a three-way race. L. O. Norman led the ticket with 83, Anrew Acker was second with 80 and L. E. Beck finished third with 79.

**Constable**  
E. N. Mitchell defeated J. C. Neil for Constable in Precinct No. 3 by something like 100 votes.

Syl Birkenfeld was elected without opposition to this office in No. 1.

In Precinct No. 4, H. C. (Atticus) Webb was elected when 9 voters wrote his name on the

At ten o'clock last night R. C. Joiner had a nice lead over Judge Chas. Clements for District Judge. Joiner led in Hale county with a big majority and was ahead in Swisher county. The vote was fairly well split in Lamb county with Clements having a small lead. Judge Clements had substantial majorities in Castro and Bailey counties.

Out of about 8,000 votes, Joiner was leading by about 800 last night.

### Tarwater Has Majority Over Both Opponents

A. B. Tarwater of Plainview was away ahead in the race for Representative from the 120th District on the basis of scattered returns at 10 o'clock last night. He held a small majority over both J. N. Johnston of Floyd county and W. W. Hick Halcomb of Castro County.

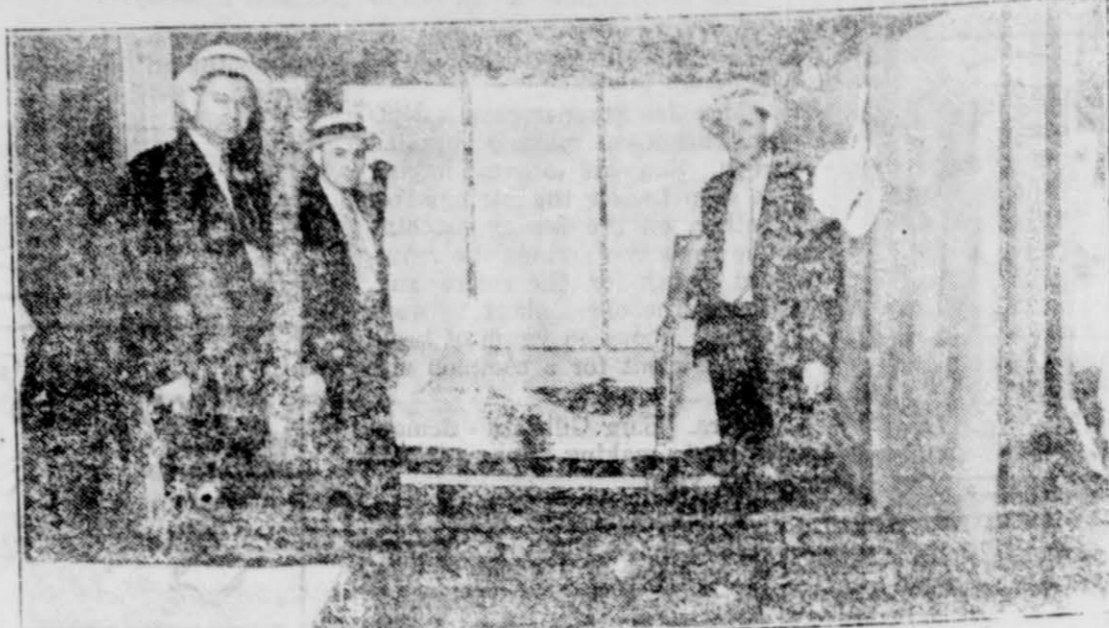

### A. and M. Man Makes Major Discovery



A discovery that may prove of major medical importance has been effected by Fred Hale of Texas A. and M. college, College Station, Texas. Working with hogs, Hale finds that deficiencies in Vitamin A in the diet of the mother causes eye defects, rather than without eyeballs after the mother sow was fed a ration devoid of Vitamin A. Thirty-five pigs from three litters have thus far been produced under these conditions. All showed eye defects and also the absence of one or both kidneys in some instances. ### FEED LOAN APPLICATIONS MADE AT COURTHOUSE

There has been established at the courthouse in Dimmitt an office where applications for Emergency Feed loans will be received. Field Supervisor J. S. Andrews announced Thursday.

Applications for loans will be accepted from farmers and stockmen for the purchase of feed for farm and range stock and to plant forage crops in Castro county, which has been designated as emergency drouth area. Miss Stella Egan is in charge of the office and the county committee consists of Bruce McLean, O. Stephens, and C. O. Brown.

In discussing the regulations that applications can be accepted only from applicants who have no means or other source of credit enabling them to undertake the production of a range crop or crops or to purchase feed for their livestock.

Loans will be advanced monthly installments, with supplemental application required for each month's requirements.
