The long anticipated split between industry and the New Deal has occurred at last.

For almost three years Amerian business has had relatively little to say in opposition to New Deal policies. It has been aloof, polite, non-committal. Now it has definitely broken with the Roosevelt Administration, and there seems little chance that relations can be resumed on even a superficially amicable basis.

Not so long ago the United tes Chamber of Commerce adpted a number of pointed resolutions opposing New Deal thepries. At the recent meeting of the American Bankers Associaion, Administration economics were flayed right and left by prominent speakers. And the real split came on December 5, when several hundred of the nation's principal executives, delegates to the joint 1935 Congress of Amrican Industry and National Assoiation of Manufacturers, rat fied. rithout one dissenting voice, a business creed that is the direct antimesis of almost everything the Administration stands for.
